A note from the Board Chair, Laura Emery

Despite the unrest in Guatemala, another successful school year has drawn to a close. As you may be aware, the academic calendar year in Guatemala begins in January and runs through the start of November. Our students are now on their "summer vacation" which lasts until the third week of January.

All thirty-two sponsored students have done well in school and will be ready to move up, as well as the five kindergarten and first graders that we helped to start school.

So far, Atitlan Alliance has expanded through word of mouth and our website. And the word is spreading rapidly. Our 10/12/23 Donor Appreciation Event was a big success. Our goal for the 2024 school year is to sponsor fifty students, plus provide backpacks, school supplies and shoes for twenty "pequeños" or young kids so they can start school.

School is especially important because the main language in San Pedro is a local Mayan dialect. Once in school, kids learn Spanish, which greatly expands their opportunities and opens doors in their future.

We can't save the world, but with your help we are making a big difference in the lives of these children who would not otherwise be in school.

Starting in 2000, I spent 14 years visiting Guatemala, studying Spanish and volunteering. I fell in love with the people and this beautiful country but Guatemala is one of the poorest countries in the western hemisphere. Few children make it pass 6th grade. I want to give others the opportunity that was given to me.

An update on the political situation in Guatemala

This has been an extremely challenging year for Guatemala and its citizens. In brief, Bernardo Arevalo, running on an anti-corruption platform from, won the presidential elections in a landslide victory. Protests over interference in the outcome of the presidential brought the country to a standstill and had an impact on the end of the school year for our students. Democracy and political stability

in Guatemala are essential to regional and US interests, including migration and drug smuggling.

On October 23rd Guatemalans shut down roads and other vital links for commerce to protest those in the government who appear to undermine democracy in the Central American country. The protests lasted for a number of weeks and continue sporadically. Specifically, the protesters are asking for the public prosecutor, Maria Consuelo Porras to resign. She has been leading a group in the government to stop the transfer of Presidential power to Mr. Arevalo. She is also accused of corruption by the US government.

Echoing events following the 2020 US elections, those in power are claiming without evidence that the elections were fraudulent. When the ballots were recounted and the results remained the same, they suggested Mr. Arevalos's party, Semillas, was fraudulently formed and should be dissolved.

Though the courts are divided on the fate of Semillas, hopes are that Mr. Arevalo will be sworn in on January 14th, 2024. Business leaders are supporting him, and fears of US and European sanctions are putting pressure on the elites to allow the transition of presidential powers to occur.

However, the struggle continues; on November 17th, prosecutors filed a request to strip Arelavo and his running mate Karin Herrera of their political immunity and be prosecuted for supporting student protests at University of San Carlos, Guatemala's sole public university, through social media posts.

In late November, a high-level group of government officials from the US traveled to Guatemala to encourage the democratic process to proceed without interference. Then, on December 11th, the US government-imposed visa restrictions on nearly 300 Guatemalan officials for persistent attempts to annul the victory of Arevalo.

There is a glimmer of hope. After the prosecutor's office sought to annul the election results amid accusations of an "attempted coup", Guatemala's electoral court last Friday insisted the results were "unchangeable". Blanca Alfaro, the head of the Supreme Election Tribunal in Guatemala, affirmed that Arevalo and his vice president, Karin Herrera, would take office as planned. "At this moment, there is no way that the Supreme Electoral Tribunal is going to repeat the elections."

The Atitlan Alliance helps students in an indigenous community of Guatemala located on the shores of Lake Atitlan. The Atitlan Alliance Board is made up entirely of volunteers.
