The XYE Cree Speakers' Society is now planning for the 2024 pimācīhitatān nēhiyawēwin: Keep Our Language Alive conference to be held on May 13 & 14, 2024 at the Dakota Dunes Resort on Dakota Whitecap First Nation. In conjunction with the conference, a pre-conference workshop will be held on May 12, 2024, for up to 30 participants who are interested in creating connections between Cree language outcomes and indicators and the Saskatchewan provincial learning outcomes.

This conference and workshop come at the request of participants who attended the May 2023 pimācīhitatān nēhiyawēwin: Keep Our Language Alive Conference. They requested more information on the subjects and topics covered at the 2023 conference, and more learning opportunities on how we can best meet provincial curricular outcomes while keeping the Cree language as the foundation.

We are seeking your financial support in working towards addressing the needs expressed by these grassroots Cree speakers and educators.

Other feedback we received from conference presenters and participants is that retaining the Cree language and culture is vital to the success of Indigenous People. They also communicated the dire situation that exists in some communities when it comes to Cree language retention, and the lack of leadership and resources in addressing the issue. There is a clear desire for more collaboration and strategic work to support Cree Language retention and strategy development while engaging youth in the process.

In this time of reconciliation, Indigenous peoples are seeking partnerships and support to address historical wrongs and to build a healthy society where all benefit. Supporting the foundation of Cree peoples' language and culture is one way to meaningfully demonstrate true reconciliation. Introduction

The YXE Cree Speakers' Society was founded in 2021 by Milton Tootoosis, a nêhiyaw of the Poundmaker Cree Nation in Treaty Six Territory. The primary goal of the YXE Cree Speakers' Society is to revitalize, enhance and strengthen culture through the Indigenous language of the region. Its objectives are to:

- · Preserve, develop and expand the local Plains Cree (Y) dialect;
- Establish a network and action group of concerned and committed fluent/advanced Cree speakers;
- · Develop and promote effective and innovative products and services for the diversity of learning styles;
- Establish a long-term sustainability strategy to keep the language thriving for the benefit of future generations of Plains Cree speakers;
- · Fulfill the spirit and intent of Treaty Number Six;
- Enact The Indigenous Languages Act, 2019:

"Whereas the recognition and implementation of rights related to Indigenous languages are at the core of reconciliation with Indigenous peoples and are fundamental to shaping the country, particularly in light of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission of Canada's Calls to Action."

- Contribute to the implementation of the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples, Articles 13, 14 & 16; and
- Create an opportunity for reconciliation as set out in the Truth & Reconciliation Final Report: Calls to Action 13, 14, 15 & 16.

Rationale

Indigenous language programming and funding has been in place for well over 30 years in various forms and with various levels of financial commitment from funders. In 2021-22 the YXE Cree Speakers' Society sought funding to access grassroots information on the lessons from past and current programs. The focus on the Plains Cree (Y) dialect was intentional as it was noted that most organizations attempting to further Indigenous language development have limited funding with their broad mandates of including all Indigenous languages.

In addition, The Smithsonian Magazine reported that the following will occur when a language dies:

- 1. We lose the expression of a unique vision of what it means to be human.
- 2. We lose memory of the planet's many histories and cultures.
- 3. We lose some of the best local resources for combatting environmental threats.
- 4. Some people lose their mother tongue.

All are critical in a global environment where interdependence is necessary for growth. This project will present the findings from the consultations with grassroots Plains Cree language speakers, research gathered and the supports required for aspiring speakers at a conference in 2023.

pēkopayi (awaken) Sponsorship Level - \$20,000

To awaken the creator given language, is to breathe life into the peoples of whom the language was gifted. "Awakening" the language is a step toward decolonization where the donor's contribution marks a significant commitment to acknowledging the truths of a colonial history with their own awakening.
