What You Need To Know

Sexual Violence

Ensure you know the information to help make informed choices

Regina and Area Sexual Assault
Response Team



It is recommended that individuals who have experienced a recent sexual assault seek immediate medical care for their physical health

Medical care consists of emergency contraception (morning after pill), antibiotics to prevent STI's, medication to reduce the risk of HIV infection, and treatment of physical injuries. Individuals can receive medical care without having evidence collected

If the individual is 15 and under, care will be referred o the child abuse team.



A victims confidentiality will be maintained except:

- with their consent to share
- in the case of a court order
- if the person is under 18
- if a child was harmed, or is at risk of being harmed



Third Option allows a victim to have a forensic medical exam to collect evidence and have the evidence stored up to 6 months before being destroyed

Third option is for those who need more time to decide if they want to report to police. Third option can be a good option for some; however, other evidence (such as at the location of the sexual assault) may be lost as time passes and can decrease the chance of charges or conviction.

Individuals must be 18 years of age or older to choose third option.

Anonymous Reporting

Anonymous Reporting is an alternative means of communicating information about sexual violence to the police

The Regina Sexual Assault Centre (RSAC) Has been designated to take Anonymous Reports about recent and historical sexual violence.
Individuals can call the Centre to make an appointment to report.
During the appointment, a staff member will go through a form that asks for specific details about the event.

If clothing or other evidence is available, RSAC will provide a paper bag that can be used to store items.

RSAC will attach a file number to the report and send the report (without names or other identifying information) to the police. The police add it to a system that allows them to track trends, including similar suspect descriptions. The report is kept by RSAC fir 5 years before being destroyed.
