ing that night," she said.

The chapter will also be offering a single \$5,000 "platinum ticket," which, if purchased, will consist of a chef in the home, servers, a wine and spirits bar, luminaria, dinner for ten, floral accents and a limo ride for guests to be conveyed to the host home.

While this novel benefit approach carries uncertainty and uneasiness, the chapter is also keenly aware that it presents an opportunity to raise awareness for its cause and engage newcomers that would not otherwise be able to attend a Butterfield benefit, capped at roughly 300 guests.

"It was a hard change, because we're so used to what we do," Alsman said, "but I actually think a lot of positives can come out of doing it this way."

Because the benefit will feature a virtual component, it is not confined within any specific geographic boundaries, offering homeowners well beyond Clarendon Hills and surrounding communities the
