

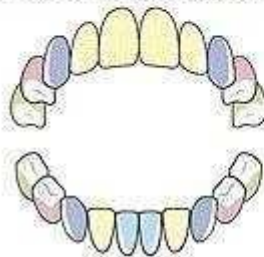

### Child Dentition

#### The permanent teeth

From around 6 to 13 years of age, the primary teeth are successively replaced by the next set of teeth, the 28 permanent or adult teeth. The first permanent molar emerges right behind the last milk tooth at the back of the mouth. It can be difficult to detect and clean, and the biting surface is irregular and extra sensitive to caries, so it is important to brush properly.

#### Give the teeth time to recover

Always go to bed with clean teeth. During the night, there is less saliva in the mouth, which makes the teeth more vulnerable to cavities. Every time your child eats or drinks, bacteria starts producing acids that corrode the teeth.

After about half an hour the saliva has helped neutralise the acids.

Let the teeth rest avoid eating between meals. If your child is thirsty between meals or at night time, serve water.

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## School Children

### *School children*

Supervise and help your child to brush until the age of 10-12. Brush with small movements and be sure that the filaments reach the gumline.

Always brush in the same order, for example the inside, the outside and biting surfaces of the teeth, to make sure no surface is forgotten.

Give some extra attention to the new molars which emerge behind the last milk teeth. Their biting surfaces are irregular and extra sensitive to cavities.



*When it's time to brush for school children.*

The slightly older child can sit in your lap, leaning the head on your arm. Brush with short movements and be sure that the filaments reach the gum line area. Always brush in the same order, for example the inside, the outside and biting surfaces of the teeth, to make sure no tooth surface is forgotten. To reach all surfaces, it helps to hold out the cheek and lip with your finger.
