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Thoughts From Father Michael "The Power of Humility"

February 2020

"Humility" is a word seldom heard in today's public square. Rather, we are immersed in a culture that is just the opposite; a culture of pride, self-esteem, and winners. Rarely, if ever, do we see or hear in the media, in sports, in education, or in the pronouncements of public officials any acknowledgement about humility.

Yet, humility is one of the main characteristics of a religious life. Both the Old and the New Testaments contain references to humility and to becoming humble, and in the early years of America it was common for public figures to acknowledge God's beneficence and to humble themselves by calling for a day of prayer and fasting.

At the nadir of the War for Independence, for example, in late September, 1777, the English had seized Boston, New York, and Philadelphia. George Washington was crossing the Delaware after suffering a major loss. The prospects were dire when twenty of the original fifty-six men who a year earlier had signed the Declaration of Independence met in York, Pennsylvania to ponder their fate. Sam Adams of Boston on whose head King George III had demanded he along with John Hancock be arrested and hanged ever defiant gave a rousing address. He called upon his colleagues to stand fast, to put their trust in God because God will reward those who honor Him as the Sovereign of the Universe. God will bless them as He did the ancient Israelites when He rescued them from Pharaoh, and He will rescue us from the tyranny of the British. In less than a month the tide of war turned at the Battle of Saratoga when we captured 5,000 British soldiers. The French were now convinced to come to our aid. Adams then requested that the Continental Congress hold throughout the colonies a Day of Prayer and Fasting on December 18, 1777 (*continued*)

thank God for His help. Can you imagine a politician speaking like that today? [Ira Stoll, <u>Samuel Adams</u>, "Prelude"]

Moreover, Our God and Savior, Jesus Christ in His Sermon on the Mount blesses the "poor in spirit," the "meek," and the "pure in heart." Christ Himself as St Paul tells us in Philippians: "…humbled Himself and became obedient to the point of death, even the death of the cross." [2:8] Christ humbled Himself! We can too; and we begin to cultivate the virtue of humbleness in our prayer life.

The root of the word "humble" is the same as the root of the word "humus," a rich soil. By humbling ourselves we are reminded that we were formed from the earth, and to the earth we shall return. In our Orthodox tradition we are reminded of this connection to the soil when we make a metanoia before crossing ourselves. We touch the ground and then make the sign of the cross. When we do prostrations, we humble ourselves even more by kneeling and touching not just our hands to the ground but our foreheads. These actions express humbleness.

Here are a few references to humbleness found in Scripture:

Sing praises to the Lord, ... He does not forget the cry of the humble. [Ps 9:12]

The humble He [the Lord] guides in justice, And the humble He teaches His way. [Ps 25:9]

The Lord lifts up the humble; He casts the wicked down to the ground. [Ps 147:6]

For thus says the high and lofty One who inhabits eternity, whose name is Holy: I dwell in the high and holy place, and also with those who are contrite and humble in spirit [Is 57:15]

The sacrifices to God are a broken spirit, A broken and contrite heart – These, O God, You will not despise. [Ps 51:17]

# Presentation of Our Lord & Savior, Jesus Christ

Forty days after the Birth of Our Lord & Savior Jesus Christ occurs on February 2nd. On this day we remember His parents, Mary and Joseph, taking Him to be presented to God in the Temple as the law as found in Exodus 2:23 required. As Luke [2:22-24] reports: "they brought Him to Jerusalem to present Him to the Lord (as it is written in the law of the Lord, '*Every male who opens the womb shall be called holy to the Lord*'), and to offer a sacrifice.

This event is celebrated as one of the twelve great feast days in our Orthodox world. It is on this day that Jesus' parents continue to do what the law required as at the eighth day He was circumcised according to the Law. Jesus had said He came to fulfill the Law and the Prophets.

An important occurrence on this day was that the devout and just Simeon who had been promised by the Holy Spirit that he would not die until "he had seen the Lord's Christ" takes the baby in his arms and said this prayer that we chant at every Vesper Service:

Lord, now let thy servant depart in peace, according to thy word, for mine eyes have seen thy salvation which thou has prepared before all peoples, a light to lighten the Gentiles and the glory of thy people Israel.

"Then Simeon blessed them, and said to Mary His mother, 'Behold, this Child is destined for the fall and rising of many in Israel, and for a sign which will be spoken against (yes, a sword will pierce through your soul also), that the thoughts of many hearts may be revealed." [Luke 2:25-35]

We continue to "church" a new born on the 40th day of his or her life in accordance of following Christ. Yet, for Jesus the occasion is one of soberness for Mary as she is alerted to her Son's death on the Cross. Simeon's prayer alerts us to Jesus reaching out to the Gentiles and establishing a new covenant that will include all people.

The Apostles incorporated Christ's humbleness in their lives; two of them – Peter and James - in their Epistles quote from Proverbs 3:4:

Likewise you young people, submit yourselves to your elders. Yes, all of you be submissive to one another, and be clothed with humility, for "God resists the proud, But gives grace to the humble" [I Peter 5:5]

And from James

But He gives more grace. Therefore He says "God resists the proud, But gives grace to the humble." Therefore submit to God. Resist the devil and he will flee from you. [James 4:6-7]

In our Orthodox world we are ever conscious of the reality of the devil, and the dynamic of his trying to trip us up in our journey to the Kingdom. St James shows us that by humbling ourselves we can resist the devil so that he will flee from us.

In our secular world we tend to think of humility as weakness, but it is most powerful in that it can turn the devil away from us. Humility is powerful!

This power is expressed most explicitly in one of the saying of St Macarius the Great, one of the founders of Egyptian monasticism in the fourth century. Here is one of his sayings:

Abba Macarius was once coming from the marsh to his own cell carrying reeds when here the devil met him on the way, carrying a scythe; he wanted to strike him but could not. He said to him: "There is a great force about you Macarius, for I cannot get at you. See, whatever you do, I do too. You fast, I do not eat at all; you keep watch, I do not ever sleep. There is only one thing in which you are better than me." "What is that?" Abba Macarius said to him, and he said: "Your humility; because of that I cannot get at you." *(continued)*  How do we cultivate humility? Well, Christ gives us an example in Luke 14:7-11:

When you are invited by anyone to a wedding feast, do not sit down in the best place, lest a more honorable than you be invited by him; and he who invited you and him come to you and say to you, "Give place to this man," and then you begin with shame to take the lowest place. But when you are invited, go and sit down in the lowest place, so that when he who invited you comes, he may say to you, "Friend, go up higher." Then you will have glory in the presence of those who sit at the table with you. For whoever exalts himself will be humbled, and he who humbles himself will be exalted.

In other words, do not put yourself first; do not show off. Then "a great force" – a force from God – will be about us as it was about St Marcarius.

As we begin our annual walk with Christ and His Apostles let us try to cultivate the virtue of humbleness, and avoid the vice and passion of pride; its opposite. It will not be easy as we live in a culture that promotes pride. Yet, with God's help we can make some progress in this struggle, gain power to resist the devil, and lay the foundation for our entrance into the Kingdom of the Father, and the Son, and the Holy Spirit.

There is no measure (or limit) to the beauty of the man who is humble. No passion whatsoever shall be able to draw nigh unto the man who is humble, and there is no measure to his beauty. The humble man is a sacrifice of God. With him that is humble the hearts of God and His angels rest. Moreover, when the angels glorify him, there is the excuse for him that hath produced in himself all virtues; but for him that hath produced humility in himself thou wilt find no excuse whatsoever needed, besides that he hath become humble.
