Concerto Competition

Two weeks ago, Brian Jewell - a violist with the Mississippi Valley Orchestra who's been "instrumental" in working with SPPTA and promoting the winners' concerts over the years - sent me an exciting email. "This week the entire MVO met and heard Daniel Stein perform in our rehearsal. We were dazzled by his interpretation of the Schumann piano concerto, and look forward to a wonderful concert." Many people came to Sunday's concert anticipating the same thing, filling First Lutheran Church's main floor and balcony seating for "Let the Spirit Sing Free." It was in this setting that **Daniel Stein, winner of this year's SPPTA Concerto Competition**, and student of Richard Tostenson, performed

Schumann's Concerto in A minor. From quiet to commanding, and with expressive artistry throughout, he captivated the audience. When congratulating and speaking with Daniel afterwards I asked him what it felt like to play with an orchestra. His answer, with a smile: "Comfortable." It turns out this is his third opportunity to do so. Daniel's mannerisms on the bench, and his interchanges with artistic director and conductor Brian Dowdy while performing, support that one word description - comfortable, indeed. Thank you, Daniel, and congratulations on a wonderful concert.

Congratulations, also, to the very talented musicians who competed for this performance opportunity, and advanced to play and place as Finalists in December:

- 2nd Place:** Noah Qiu, student of JoAnne Link, playing the third movement of Brahms' Concerto #1 in D Minor
- 2nd Place:** Chen Chen, student of Denis Evstuhin, playing the first movement of Tchaikovsky's Concerto No. 1
- 3rd Place:** Joseph Caswell, student of Paul Wirth, playing the first movement of Beethoven's Concerto No. 2
- Finalists:** Aurora Wang, student of Tina Park, playing the first movement of Chopin's Concerto No. 1 in E minor
Saejin Yoo, student of Joseph Zins, playing the first movement of Grieg's Concerto in A minor

"Well done!" to each of you. Fabulous music filled the auditorium at the finals competition, and we hope you'll share your talents again next year. Those of us in attendance on the snowy day of the January SPPTA meeting, got to sample some of that amazing music, grateful that Saejin, Aurora, and Joseph's schedules permitted them to come and perform their concerto for us.

Thank you, judges, for sharing your expertise with the SPPTA Concerto Competition. Your establishment in your fields, and thoughtful observations given to each participant in your critiques, help to shape, encourage, and challenge each student to continued musical growth. Dr. Amy Grinstiener, and Dr. David Viscoli heard each of the performers in the preliminary round, and selected the finalists to advance. Then, they were joined for the finals competition and to determine the 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place winners by Sue Ruby. Here is a bit about each of them, with links to read more. 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Dr. Amy Grinsteiner is currently an Assistant Professor in the joint College of St. Benedict/St. John's University Department of Music in Minnesota, teaching studio piano, class piano, collaborative piano and Music through History. Born and raised in Montana, she holds a Doctor of Musical Arts degree from the University of Washington, Diploma of Postgraduate Performance and L.R.A.M. Teaching Certificate from the Royal Academy of Music in London, a Master of Music Degree in Piano Performance from the Eastman School of Music, and Bachelor of Music Degree in Piano Performance from the University of Colorado, Boulder. At the University of Washington, Dr. Grinsteiner studied with Dr. Robin McCabe. Her other primary teachers include Dennis Alexander, Angela Cheng, Dr. Nelita True, Christopher Elton, and additional studies with Paul Lewis.

Dr. Grinsteiner enjoys a varied performance schedule that includes solo recitals, concerto performances, chamber music recitals, choral accompanying work, and choral conducting.

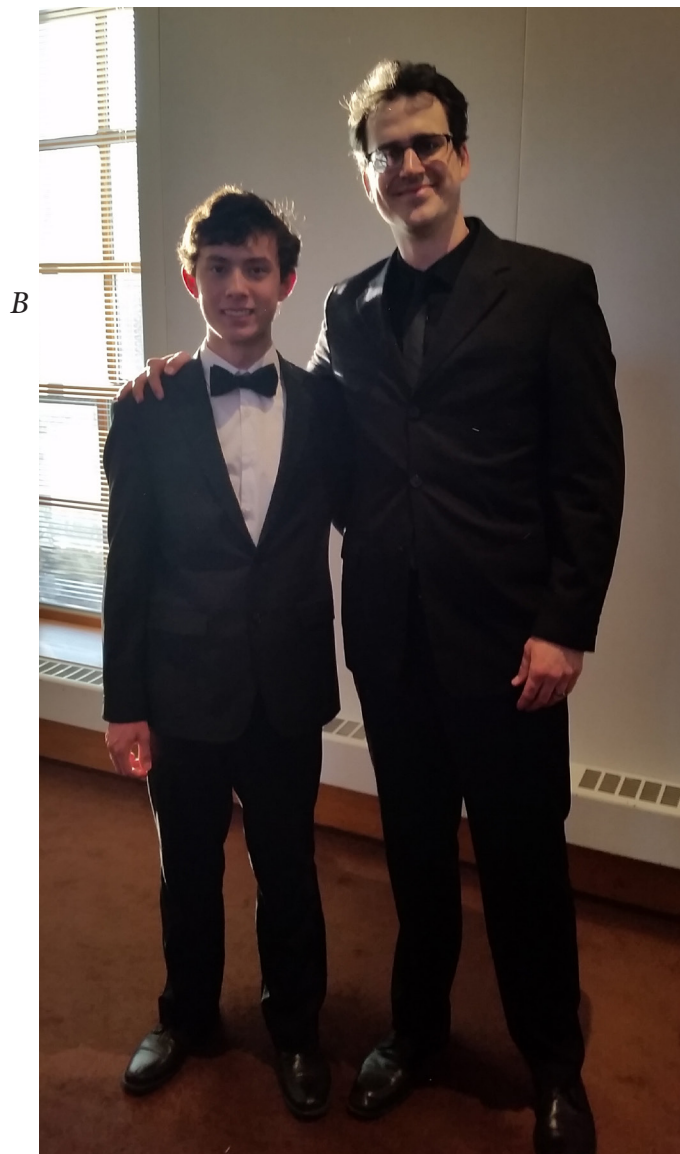
Dr. David Viscoli hails from Santa Fe, New Mexico and attended the Interlochen Arts Academy in Michigan. David obtained his Bachelor of Music at the University of Texas at Austin, his Master of Music and Doctor of Musical Arts degrees from the University of Southern California. David is the most recent recipient of the Distinguished Faculty Scholar Award at MSU, Mankato, for the College of Arts and Humanities, and is currently Professor of Piano at the university. In recent years, his students have won both first and second prize in the Minnesota Music Teachers Association College Young Artist Competition.

Dr. Viscoli is a member of the Chiarina Piano Quartet, the Kasota Piano Trio, and the Viscoli/Rieppel duo and has collaborated with principal members of the Minnesota Orchestra and the Saint Paul Chamber Orchestra. He has performed extensively as a soloist and chamber musician around the globe, including concerts in Panama, Taiwan, Korea, Austria, Germany, and Canada. Sue Ruby graduated summa cum laude with a bachelor's degree in music education, piano pedagogy, from the University of MN-Duluth and received her master's degree in music from Columbus State University (GA) where she studied with John O'Brien and Betty Anne Diaz. Ms. Ruby has been a teaching artist at MacPhail Center for Music since 2001. In addition to teaching private, group and Music Tree piano, Sue serves as collaborative pianist for the Prelude

program and Interlude or the Advanced Music Theater Performance Lab. Ms. Ruby is an avid lover and performer of chamber music and in 2012, co-founded the Fridays in the Valley Chamber Music Series. An active member of Phi Beta Kappa and MMTA, Sue is also co-founder of the Association of Professional Piano Instructors (APPI).
