These are papers from TVA when they were relocating bodies from old cemeteries that were to be flooded by the lake. These are also papers of TVA notifying citizens that there property was to be flooded and determining the citizens plans to find new homes. This is only a small samples of these papers to give you the idea of the method that TVA took before flooding the lake.



Mr. F. is a Presbyterian minister who is a Resident Mission Worker in Waterloo. He will be transferred to another field of church work within a short time, probably in October, 1936.

The church will cancel former plans, and will not build a vocational school in Waterloo. They will have no Resident Mission Worker in the town, and the limited amount of work to be done by them in the future will be performed through a visiting Mission Worker from the church at Sheffield.

The withdrawal from planned activities by the church fall as a result of the Authority's purchases of lands for the Pickwick Reservoir.

Mr. F. has not yet been reassigned, but his readjustment will be made through the offices of the church.



10/28/36 (Salter)

Mr. C's house has been moved to its permanent location. Mr. C. became drunk and it is alledged that he assaulted Mr. Handback. As a result he is in the County jail in Florence, Alabama, charged with assault with intent to commit murder.

Although this family has moved from TVA property it is not considered that this relocation is satisfactory, because there is no land which Mr. C. can cultivate and he will be forced to move again in order to locate a crop for next year. If any provision is made for follow-up work with families after they move from Authority owned property, it is thought advisable that this family be contacted.

Mr. C. resides with his wife and one child in the home of his mother, Mrs. Florence Cherry, on the west side of Main Street in Waterloo. The house is the second residence north of the L. G. Threet store.

Mr. C. owns no property himself, although his mother owns 1/3 interest in the home and in the Joe L. Newman heirs tract #710, forty acres of which have been sold to the Authority.

Mr.Cherry was a farmer until he secured employed as truck driver at Wheeler Dam in 1935. He is now employed, stacking lumber for Mr. Chandler in Waterloo.

The opportunity to farm will not be available for Mr. C. in the future, and he sees no permanency in the kind of work in which he is now engaged. He wishes to remain in Waterloo, provided that new activities are developed which will provide the opportunity for future employment.

DAVENPORT, SARAH (Colored)

9/14/36 (Kennedy)

Sarah Davenport is a colored widow who owns her home in Waterloo with less than one acre of ground. The house is reached by following College Street to its northern end and turning to the left. It is the third house on the right hand side. In the household are a son, Isaac Rivers, unmarried, a daughter and two grandchildren. Rivers is over thirty years old and is the employable member of the family. He was a farm tenant for many years, but has not made a crop this year or last year. His only employment now are odd jobs of farm labor.

Sarah Davenport inherited the home and has lived here nine years. The family is not prospering at present, and she would like to remove if she could find some place better to make a living. She feels that there will be no chance here in the future after the withdrawal of bottom lands from cultivation. Her son has had no work experience other than in farming and in general rough labor.

This family is apparently in need of economic rehabilitation without considering any future adverse affects, resulting from the withdrawal of farm lands. A steady job of some kind is needed for Isaac Rivers. 8/3/36 (Salter) REFERENCE

Mr. J. L. Potts stated that Mr. C. is a poor tenant, and that he would not have given him a place had Mr. C. attempted to rent from him instead of sub-renting from Mr. Jim Handback. Mr. Potts will not provide for this family next year, and he plans to begin dismantling the building in which Mr. C. lives by December, 1936.

8/31/36 (Salter) NOTE

No definite plans have been made, and this family will have very little clear profit after all debts have been paid. Mr. C. stated that he believed that he could get a place from his present landlord, Mr. Handback, next year, but that he would not know definitely until after the crop was gathered, at which time he shall know how well he comes out financially.

9/8/36 (Salter) REFERENCE

Jim Handback advised that he will not provide for Mr. C. next year.

10/19/36 (Salter) NOTE

Mr. C. has not found a place as yot.

Mr. J. L. Potts, land owner, was contacted and advised that unless his buildings were removed he would lose them. It was suggested that since he was planning to roll his buildings across the severance line that this work be done before wet weather set in. This he agreed to do in the near future. He plans to move the house regardless of whether Mr. C. is able to move. He has been advised that the house could be moved with Mr. C's furniture in it.

10/27/36 (Salter) CLOSING SUMMARY

Mr. and Mrs. B. are an aged couple who own their home on Pine Street in the southern part of Waterloo. In the home also are a daughter and a two year old grandson of the daughter. Mr. B. came to Waterloo fourteen years ago from Savannah, Tennessee. They subsist on a pension or War insurance which comes to them as a result of the death of a son from influenza during the World War. They are not affected economically by the Pickwick Reservoir except in so far as the values of real-estate in the town may be affected. They believe the Authority should "do something" to protect the town.

A son-in-law, Otis Haggard, resides in a house on the same lot. (See file)

CULVER, LUTHER A. (White)

9/10/36 (Kennedy)

This family lives at the north edge of Waterloo on the Second Creek road in a home which Mr. C. rents from his mother, Mrs. Jennie Culver a widow of Waterloo. Mr. C. has a wife and two children. He is a carpenter by trade who is now endeavoring, with little success, to earn a living as insurance agent.

Mr. C. plans to remain in Waterloo in the hope that the town will be sustained by new industries as substitute for agriculture. He has no definite ideas concerning the kinds of industries which might be suitable for the town. He is pessimistic concerning the outlook except for the hope that the Authority will develop and promote ideas and plans which will counteract the evident injuries to be sustained by the withdrawal from cultivation of the farm lands. He does not consider it likely that ideas will be originated among the citizens of the town.

Mr. and Mrs. B. are a young couple who are residing temporarily in the home of Mrs. B's grandmother, Mrs. D. C. Higgins of Main Street, Waterloo.

Mr. B. has for four years been a mail carrier on a tri-weekly rural route out of Waterloo. This route will be mostly outside the reservoir area, but Mr. B. is apprehensive as he feels that he may be released in order that the carrier who had served for nearly thirty years may be shifted. (J. H. McCorkle, see file.)

The financial earnings of Mr. B. have never been satisfactory due to the fact that his route is tri-weekly. His wife taught school for three years in Waterloo, but was displaced in a turn over in the school management, after which she served as teacher for a few years in some locality south of Birmingham. She has not been engaged as yet for the coming year.

Mr. B. has had little experience in any work other than in delivering mail. It will appear that his future status will depend upon circumstances governing readjustment among postal employees.

AUSTIN, WARDEN ("hite)

9/18/36 (Kennedy)

Mr. A. with his wife and three children reside on the north side of Pine Street in Waterloo. The home is at the foot of the hill and is opposite the W. O. Harrison lot. Mr. A. rents from Mr. Shanner Till. The house is small and in a bad condition of repair, and the family appear to have a very low standard of living.

Mr. A. was a farm tenant on river bottom lands for several years until last year when he secured a job with the Republic Creasoting Company. In January he lost one finger and had another one broken in an accident suffering while at work. He still works for this company, but irregularly. His conditions are unsatisfactory, and Mr. A. plans to relocate elsewhere as a farm tenant. He hopes to secure a team of mules, and be able to find a farm to cultivate in 1937. The withdrawal of Pickwick Reservoir lands from cultivation will cause him to relocate.

Mr. and Mrs. B. and their daughter reside on the S. H. Beckham, et al, tract on the south edge of Waterloo. Mrs. B. owns the home and both she and her husband are farm owners. The wife, Mayflower Shaw Beckham, has sold about 912 acres of land to the Authority. The husband has sold more than 100 acres. Both had debts, however, according to Mrs. B., and will have insufficient money to purchase a new farm and home. Mrs. B. was found to be very despondent at the turn of events. It seems that the sale of their lands has brought their economic affairs to a crisis, and they are now situated in their home with no means of support. Their interests lies in agriculture, but they will be unable to secure sufficient land in this vicinity for subsistence. They have lived as landlords with the wife managing her own farm and with the husband looking after the interest of his mother and sister who reside on an adjoining tract in Waterloo. (Mrs. Ella Beckham)

Mrs. B. says that she has cried and cried, she is so blue. She and her husband believe that the Authority should buy their home as well as the others in the town of Waterloo. They have no definite plans, but consider that they must face the prospect of abandoning or renting their home.

BECKHAM, MRS. ELLA (White)

Mrs. B. resides at the end of College Street in the southern most part of Waterloo. She owns her home with about four acres on a knowl at the end of a ridge. She is a widow whose farm lands have been given to her son, S. H. Beckham, and her daughter, Mrs. Olie B. Shaw. Mrs. S. is separated from her husband and resides with her son in the home of Mrs. B. S. H. Beckham resides near by on an adjoining tract. Mrs. Ella Beckham, like her daughter-in-law, Mrs. S. H. Beckham is very despondent, and she believes that the Authority should buy her home. Her home will be ruined, and the reservoir waters will be entirely too close for her comfort, in addition her son will have no means of subsistence at this location. He and his sister have each sold over 100 acres of land to the Authority, and his wife has sold 912 acres, but the family financies are not in good shape due to previous indebtedness.

Mrs. B. is a clerk in the Dan George store in Waterloo at \$1.00 per day.

CENETERY RELOCATION --- PICKWICK RESERVOIR

is explained to you in telephone conversation of yesterday, it will be appreciated if you will essist Mr. Fred Wendt, of the Engineering Service Division, working in our Wilson Dam office, to develop a trade with the trustees of the Richardson Cometery in the town of Materico. Mr. Wendt has informally discussed this matter with certain of the trustees, and it is believed that the suggested idee will be favorable to them.

The attached maps indicate the creas involved. The proposed severance lines indicated on the maps are tentative and may be altered upon further investigation. It is suggested that the creas C & D be acquired in fee simple by the fathority, and erem E be deeded to the Richardson Genetery. There are no graves located in the creas C and D, as they are on steep slopes, and will extend in the reservoir. The present erem used by the Richardson Genetery is well filled and affords little space for future buriels. It is planned to reinter most of the graves from the old Esterloo Genetery in the area E. There may be some graves from the old Esterloo Geneteries in the near vicinity of Estation. The total reinterments to be made by the Authority in this area E sill probably be between 200 and 300. It is believed that this additional area E will also allow sufficient space for future buriels to be made as desired by the Sichardson Genetery.

The negro cemetery (New Waterloo) adjoining at the southwest corner of the Richardson Cemetery, should also be severed, as the lower portion of this cemetery will be flooded. There are no graves located in this area. If additional space is required by this megro cometery, the area B can be decded to them. It is understood from Mr. Baker that this land, E and B, included in Land Tract PR-845, has not yet passed title from the Cherokes Land Company to the Authority, and Mr. Evans Duan suggests that to simplify the procedure we arrange a direct transfer of deed from the Cherokee Land Company to the trustees of the two cemeteries.

The scosss road to both the negro cenatory and the Bichardson Cenatory is now along the west boundary of the Richardson Cenatory. The Highway Division plans to make these two cenatories accessible after flooding by constructing a bridge and road across the arm of the Pickwick Reservoir immediately north of this property. If the area 8 is deeded to the Richardson Cenatory, a right-of-way should be reserved for access to the negro cenatory. TVA 299 (5-1-37)
