St. Louis Metro Area YTD Home Sales Show Steady Increase in 2024

The St. Louis metropolitan area, which covers counties in both Missouri and Illinois, has seen a strong start to the year in terms of home sales. According to data from MORE, REALTORS®, there have been 9,035 homes sold in the St. Louis metro area through the end of April 2024. This represents a 5.54% increase from the same period last year, where 8,561 homes were sold.

While this year's YTD home sales may be lower compared to four years ago, with a decrease of 11.78%, it is important to note that the overall trend is still positive. This is great news for both potential home buyers and sellers in the St. Louis metro area, as it indicates a stable and growing real estate market.



Festival season is fast-approaching, and St. Louis has an electrifying lineup of concerts, performances and community celebrations that will leave you with barely a moment to rest.

1. Whitaker Music Festival | May 29 - July 31

The Missouri Botanical Garden is an idyllic place to listen to live music, and on Wednesday evenings throughout the summer, the garden hosts free, open-air concerts as part of the annual Whitaker Music Festival. To date, more



than one million people have participated in the cherished St. Louis tradition, which promotes common heritage, celebrates diversity and encourages vitality within the community. Visitors can bring their own picnics, and food, beer, wine and sno-cones will be available for purchase.

2. St. Louis Shakespeare Festival | May 29 - August 25

Meet us in St. Louis' most beautiful parks for theater productions designed to reach hearts. The 2024 season of the St. Louis Shakespeare Festival brings a funny, lusty production of As You Like It to Forest Park for Shakespeare in the Park from May 29 to June 23. Further into summer, TourCO will take a larger-than-life production of The Tempest on the road, performing in 24 parks in Missouri and Illinois from July 30 to Aug. 25. The St. Louis Shakespeare Festival is "free forever to everyone always." No reservations required.

3. Strawberry Festival | June 1 & 2

Take a day trip to Kimmswick, Missouri, for the annual Strawberry Festival. At more than 125 stalls, strawberries will inform delicious drinks, dishes and desserts. There will also be craft booths, home and garden vendors, bounce houses, a petting zoo and pony rides for people of all ages and interests.

4. Pond-O-Rama | June 22 & 23

In its 24th year, the St. Louis Water Garden Society's annual tour features amazing ponds and water gardens in the St. Louis metro area owned and maintained by its members. As a society, it has also maintained the lily ponds at the Jewel Box in Forest Park for more than 34 years. Its members work from May through October to plant and maintain the lily ponds, and Pond-O-Rama supports that effort. The water garden tour will take place on June 22 and 23 from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. each day, and tickets are \$20 for both days.

5. <u>Marooned | June 6 - 23</u>

Circus Flora, a theater company that performs at The Big Top in the <u>Grand Center Arts District</u>, will celebrate its 38th season with *Marooned*, a thrilling tale of survival. Inspired by the allure and mystery of deserted islands, *Marooned* will transport audiences to a world of adventure, discovery and enchantment. In this production, you'll witness the resilience and ingenuity of Circus Flora performers as they navigate the challenges of the unknown.

6. Juneteenth Celebration in the Delmar Loop | June 15

Juneteenth is an essential commemoration of freedom. To reflect and celebrate, the Delmar Loop will host a special event featuring an energizing 5K run/walk in the morning, a fair with art, retail, food and drink vendors in the afternoon and a spectacle with live music and a car show in the evening.

7. Pedal and Paddle | June 23

Outdoor enthusiasts – this is the tour for you! Join Big Muddy Adventures for a full day of biking and paddling in St. Louis this summer. Every eight-hour trip features a different route, highlighting the bounty of adventure throughout the region. Lunch is included, and all the necessary gear is supplied. No paddling experience required.

8. Grand Pride Parade | June 30

The Grand Pride Parade, which travels down Market Street through downtown St. Louis, is the culmination of the spirited PrideFest celebrations that happen at the end of every June to coincide with the Stonewall Riots, which occurred in New York City on June 28, 1969, in response to a police raid of the Stonewall Inn, a gay club located in Greenwich Village. The historic uprising served as a catalyst for the gay rights movement in the U.S. "PrideFest is always a good time," Jordan Braxton, an educator and advocate for LGBTQIA+ rights, says. "Last year, the festival drew more than 325,000 people to downtown St. Louis, and this year, we're expecting a similarly sized crowd – plus, the same great energy!"



June 8: <u>Central West End Cocktail Party.</u> Many people claim that the first cocktail party on record was held in the Central West End in 1917, with Mrs. Julius S. Walsh, Jr. hosting in her home at 4510 Lindell Blvd. Every year, the St. Louis neighborhood pays tribute to the important anniversary by celebrating in style. This year, expect aerial performers, fire dancers, unicyclists and music by Marquise Knox, The Grooveliner, Monkh and Sarah Jane and the Blue Notes among cocktails and cotton candy at the event.

June 10: <u>Vinofile Plus Pickup Party: Create Your Own Sangria</u>. City Winery will hold their Vinofile Plus Pickup Party: Create Your Own Sangria on Monday, June 10th at 6:00 PM.

June 13: <u>Beer and Food Pairing Dinner at The Biergarten</u>. The Anheuser-Busch Biergarten will host a beer and food pairing dinner on June 13. The four-course meal will begin with pulled pork sliders on Hawaiian buns and a Hawaiian salad featuring cherry tomatoes, cucumber, mango, avocado and goat cheese, paired with Kona Longboard Lager and Kona Light Blonde Ale respectively. - 3. **Property's Condition**: The overall condition of your home, including any updates or renovations you've made, will affect the listing price. For example, a newly renovated kitchen can increase the value.

Demystifying the Escrow Process



The escrow process is a critical component of real estate transactions, providing security and assurance to both buyers and sellers. Here's a simplified explanation of the escrow process:

- 1. Opening Escrow: Once the buyer and seller agree on a sale price and sign a purchase agreement, an escrow account is opened with a neutral third party, known as an escrow agent.
- 2. **Deposit of Earnest Money:** The buyer deposits earnest money into the escrow account as a sign of good faith that they intend to purchase the property.
- 3.**Inspection and Appraisal:** The buyer arranges for a property inspection and the lender orders an appraisal to confirm the property's value.
- 4. **Securing Financing:** The buyer works with a lender to secure mortgage financing based on the agreed-upon purchase price.
- 5. **Title Search:** A title company conducts a search to ensure there are no liens or disputes on the property's title.
- 6. **Purchase of Insurance:** The buyer obtains necessary insurance, such as homeowner's insurance, which may be required by the lender.
- 7. **Fulfilling Contingencies:** Any contingencies outlined in the purchase agreement, such as repairs or other conditions, must be met.
- 8. **Closing Documents:** Both parties sign all the necessary closing documents, including the deed and loan paperwork.
- 9. **Final Walk-Through:** The buyer does a final walk-through of the property to ensure all conditions are as expected.
- 10. **Closing Escrow:** Once all conditions are met and both parties fulfill their obligations, the escrow agent disburses funds to the seller, and the buyer receives the keys to their new home.

The escrow process protects both the buyer and seller by ensuring that no funds or property change hands until all of the terms and conditions of the purchase agreement are met. It's a system that ensures fairness and security for both parties during the transaction.
