These Red Flags Can Make Your House an Easy Target for Burglars!

Burglars don't want to get caught, which is why they usually wait until you're out of your house before they break in. Who's tipping them off that you're out of town and your house is a sitting duck? "A solution for the absence of occupancy cues is to insert randomness at your home," says Campbell. "The U.S. government uses random security measures at its installations in order to deter would-be attackers, so randomness can work at home."




