- 5. "On Nov. 30, while my daughter sleeps, I change her bedding to a Christmas-themed one. And when she wakes on Dec. 1, she is always amazed at the elves' and Santa's magic. I'm just grateful that she is a heavy sleeper!" Olly P.
- 6. "With four kids aged 3 to 16, our secret to a magical holiday season in our home is loosening up: extra late bedtimes, pancakes for dinner, indulging in sweets and extra screen time. Running a tight household is crucial for us, but during the holidays, we welcome a bit of turmoil. For our kids, late nights, outdoor play after dark and unexpected Robux are the equivalent of winning the lottery. - 7. "We keep a bucket of fake snowballs in the living room and have snowball fights all season." April L.
- 8. "We have a very large and elaborate key that is on a long red ribbon. Until Christmas Eve, it hangs on the tree, but then it goes on our door 'to let Santa in' because we don't have a fireplace. We also go out and drive around the village looking at lights and listening to the NORAD Santa report on the radio after dinner on Christmas Eve." Kathy H.
- 9. "My wife and I have family that is Jewish and Catholic, but neither of us are religious. Before kids, we struggled trying to navigate the holidays authentically. We wanted to try something new as parents, so we recently adopted New Year's Day. We exchange gifts and spend the entire day together as a family. Our kids still get to celebrate Hannukah and Christmas with our extended families, but New Year's Day is ours. Knowing it's a special day just for us really adds to it. A holiday I didn't give much thought to before kids has become my favorite day of the year!" Aaron Martin
- 10. "I would have an indoor camp-out with my son. We set up a tent next to the Christmas tree, ordered pizza, made cookies and watched Christmas movies until we fell asleep in the tent." Allison S.

If you're looking for fewer things, more experiences, and better control over the gifts you give and receive, let me introduce you to The 4 Gift Rule for Christmas. Trust me, it's a game-changer!



As kids, we naturally want more things, and as parents, we want to give our kids the world. But sometimes, that's where we fall into a cycle—buying more, only to end up purging those things a few months later.

Honestly? I'm over it. I'm over the idea that love is measured by a mountain of gifts. I'm over the overspending and the holiday shopping stress. All I want is to sip my <u>spiked eggnog</u> and watch <u>Christmas movies</u> with my family. Is that too much to ask? I think not.

So, let's talk about How to Do The 4 Gift Rule for Christmas. This simple approach will completely change how we think about gift-giving while helping us save money and ease some of that holiday stress.

How to Do The 4 Gift Rule for Christmas

The 4 Gift Rule is just as it sounds—four gifts total for each person, but with a twist. Instead of just any four gifts, each one falls into a specific category: something they want, something they need, something to wear, and something to read.

Some gifts can certainly fit into more than one category so it's up to you to decide which gift fits into which category. It truly doesn't matter as long as you have 1 gift per category and 4 gifts total.

Examples of Wants

Wants can be really anything as long as it falls into your Christmas budget. I like to think of these gifts as things someone can live without but would rather not. Examples include:

- Favorite toy or gadget
- Tickets to a concert, movie, or sporting event
- Video game or game console
- Money or gift cards to shop at their favorite store
- Art supplies or hobby kits (like a LEGO set or craft supplies)
- Gift card to their favorite store or for an experience, like a zoo or amusement park

Examples of Needs

Needs are more specific in the sense that these are items needed and typically something they can't live without. Examples include:

- School supplies or a new backpack
- Organizational items (like a storage bin or desk organizer)
- New bedding, pillows, or blankets
- Practical tech (like headphones, chargers, smartwatch)
- Sports equipment or gear for activities they enjoy

Examples of Something to Wear

This gift is pretty self explanatory but basically anything they can wear. Examples include:

- Cozy pajamas, slippers, or a bathrobe
- Stylish jacket or hoodie
- New hat, belt or other accessory
- New piece of jewelry
- Personalized clothing or accessories (like a monogrammed hat or bag)
- Fun or themed socks
- New shoes, sneakers, or winter boots

Examples of Something to Read

This can be anything that can qualify as reading. Examples

- A new book from a favorite series or a new release by a favorite author
- A new magazine or magazine subscription based on their interests (like science, animals, art)
- A new comic book
- Interactive books (pop-up, 3D, or activity-based books)
- Educational books (STEM topics, history, or cultural studies)
- Journal or sketchbook if they enjoy writing or drawing


The Benefits of The 4 Gift Rule

4 Things Guests Immediately Notice About Your Holiday Decor, According to Designers

If you're planning on hosting guests this year, you may want to reconsider what holiday decorations you use to make a lasting impression (and not a bad one). Nobody wants to have a party with holiday decor that stands out like an eyesore, after all.

We tapped some designers to share the things guests immediately notice about your holiday decor, so you know exactly what to avoid and what to use instead.



Hayley McAteer, an interior designer and co-founder of Cushee, explains how low-quality materials can cheapen the overall holiday decor. Accessories like bows or ribbons may seem minor, but frayed edges can ruin their overall look, McAteer says.

Opt for higher-quality materials like fabric or velvet, so it looks polished and will last longer over time.



An Empty Entryway

Since the entryway is the very first space guests walk into, you'll want to make sure it's filled with decor that creates a warm and ambient setting. This will help set the tone for the rest of the house, and even the whole night. "The entryway is the first impression of your holiday spirit," McAteer says.



Clashing Color Schemes

If you love bringing festive colors into your home, you may want to reevaluate what colors you want to mix before doing so, so your home doesn't look like a color explosion.

"Using too many mismatched colors, like neon lights paired with classic gold and silver ornaments, can create visual chaos," McAteer explains.

Since color harmony is key to making your home feel cohesive, McAteer suggests choosing two to three colors in your palette to create a unified look. Your colors should look like they're complementing one another and not competing.



Too Much Scent

We all love a good seasonal scent to help set the tone for the holidays, but overusing them can actually make your guests feel overstimulated or even uncomfortable.

Stay away from an overload of scented candles or potpourri and lean more into subtle scents that are thoughtfully placed throughout your home and spread out, so it feels inviting and pleasant, McAteer advises.


