Shelter and Mental Health: doing more and doing better

Executive brief

How can the Shelter and Settlements practitioners integrate mental health and psychosocial considerations into programming?

On Thursday 20th May and Friday 28th May, 2021 The Centre for Development and Emergency Practice at Oxford Brookes University (CENDEP) and CARE International UK will convene practitioners and experts from humanitarian and development practice, policy and academia to explore the connections between humanitarian shelter assistance and mental health. We will explore how the shelter and settlements sector is already addressing these linkages, and how the sector can do more and do better.

Learning event context

Awareness of the many connections between shelter and physical and mental health is growing, yet there are large gaps in knowledge, particularly around mental health, which are often reflected in practice. The Global Shelter Cluster has made Shelter and Health one of its priority research areas. There is an appetite for learning more about these connections and increase understanding of the complexities surrounding mental health and psychosocial support (MHPSS) in shelter and settlements programming. Over the course of the learning event, we will explore the intersections between MHPSS, living conditions and Shelter and Settlements programming in a variety of crisis contexts, as shown on the diagram.



Learning event format

The event will be held virtually via Zoom (link available via the [Eventbrite booking](#)). There will be live captioning throughout the event. The event will be recorded, and the recording will be shared with participants after the event. We will endeavour to translate the English transcript soon after the event.

The event will involve:
