Historical Newspapers in Genealogy Research – Essential

I have been a fan of newspaper research dating from 1963 when I received a clipping detailing a visit my husband and his parents undertook to visit his grandmother. This ordinary, common event noted in a local paper would be a goldmine of facts for a genealogist as it names relationships, locations, and length of stay. They are a source that can often provide key information and perhaps unlock a mystery.

There are more and more newspapers being digitized and available online, sometimes free, sometimes through a paid subscription; sometimes only the index is available, other times the full text is available and even searchable.

One helpful site is **The Directory of U.S. Newspapers in American Libraries** which is a searchable index of newspapers published in the United States since 1690 and found at https://www.loc.gov/collections/directory-of-us-newspapers-in-american-libraries/about-this-collection/. This directory can help identify what titles exist for a specific place and time, and how to access them. It only identifies potential titles and where to find them

For international titles, try searching the <u>Wikipedia list of online newspaper archives</u>. This is a **list of online newspaper archives** and some magazines and journals, including both free and <u>pay wall</u> blocked digital archives per their site.

Try searching **Google** or another browser and see what you discover. Searches such as historical newspapers Trenton new jersey might yield a paper that could be helpful.

<u>TheAncestorHunt.com/newspaper-research-links</u> has a large collection of newspaper links organized by state or country, then provides the direct link to the digitized newspaper under the various sources. Cindy's List (<u>www.cyndislist.com</u>) can provide information such as the following example:

Geo. P. Rowell & Co's American Newspaper Directory, 1869 FREE From the University of North Texas, Digital Library. Containing Accurate lists of all the newspapers and periodicals published in the United States and Territories, and the Dominion of Canada, and British Colonies of North America; together with a description of the towns and cities in which they are published.

The FamilySearch Wiki is always a helpful source for a myriad of topics including newspapers. See <u>https://www.familysearch.org/en/wiki/Newspapers</u>.

If these sources don't yield the needed information, there are several subscription sites available. Their fees and availability of titles and years vary between the various sites. Before paying for a subscription site, be sure to look at the titles that they offer to ensure that that have the areas and dates you are interested in. Some of the subscription sites are <u>GenealogyBank.com</u>, <u>NewspaperArchive.com</u> and <u>Newspapers.com</u>. Although bigger is often touted as the gold standard, having unique titles is a better option. Each site has its own priorities and methods for sourcing digitized pages with varying cultural, geographical and chronological strengths.

- Family Search online has a list with summarizes of each site, Best Historical Newspaper websites of 2024. <u>https://familytreemagazine.com/best-historical-newspapers-websites/</u> Adds additional sites such as

<u>Arcanum Newspapers</u> which they note has more than 58 million pages from newspapers and other historic periodicals published in Eastern Europe. You can search for full text or even upload a photo and search for faces. You can try it for free or subscribe starting at about \$8.50 per month.

Access full-text articles from 1996 to forward. Issues before 1996 can be found on microfilm or the Florida Times-Union vertical files located in Special Collections at the Main Library of Jacksonville Public Library. Available in person only.



2. Resident News https://residentnews.net/ ISSUE ARCHIVES

This local paper is geographically restricted to Riverside/Avondale/Ortega/Murray Hill and San Marco. You can search online from 2012 to current and the inaugural issue of 2007.



3. The Florida and Georgia Star are committed to providing you with the latest and most accurate news possible that affects the African American Community. That is how we became Northeast Florida's oldest African American – owned newspaper with the most news and the largest circulation. We now have a subsidiary, The Georgia Star (website.) https://www.thefloridastar.com/archives/ Can search issues from April 2017 to current.

4. Jacksonville Free Press found at https://jacksonvillefreepress.com/

The Free Press of Jacksonville was first published as the Jacksonville Free Press in September 1986. A weekly publication, the Free Press is circulated in the tri-county area of Duval, Clay and St. Johns counties, St. Mary's, Brunswick and King's Bay, Georgia. Has a search box in the upper right corner. When I did a search for Hurst, Rodney, articles from 2024 back to 2015 were noted.

5. UNF Carpenter Library The Thomas G. Carpenter Library is free and open to the public with photo identification. For in-house use of their online subscription databases such as ONESEARCH. A great resource
