
A Fresh Start: Our Roof Replacement By Georgia Pribanic


SGES received several large donations during August.



This month has been quieter at the reference desk, but quiet months give us time to share some small gems you may find useful in your own research.



Did You Know?

Our library has a collection of Jacksonville city directories dating back many years. They are a goldmine for family historians—listing occupations, addresses, and even the names of spouses. If you're tracing ancestors in the area, these directories can help you place them on the map year by year.

This Month in History – Recovery from the Great Fire of 1901



The city was in the process of recovering from the Great Fire of 1901, which occurred on May 3rd. The fire devastated 146 city blocks, destroying over 2,300 buildings and leaving nearly 10,000 people homeless. The intense smoke was visible as far away as Savannah, Georgia. It was one of the worst disasters in Florida history.



FamilySearch.org, a free online database includes many helpful resources. for researching Revolutionary War ancestors. One such collection is the "U.S. Revolutionary Compiled Service Records, 1775-1783" index which contains direct links from the index to the soldiers' file on Fold3.

Do you have Hispanic Ancestors? By Joan Hakala

Then get ready to celebrate **National Hispanic Heritage Month.** This observance "celebrates the contributions of Americans tracing their roots to Spain, Mexico, Central America, South America and the Spanish-speaking nations of the Caribbean. In 1968, Congress set aside a week for this observance and two decades later expanded it to a month stretching from September 15 to October 15. The timing is historically significant as September 15 is the anniversary of independence in Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras and Nicaragua. The designated period is also a nod to those from Mexico and Chile, which celebrate their independence September 16 and September 18, respectively."

Not sure where to start?

Start with the FamilySearch.org Research Wiki

"The sometimes-overlooked FamilySearch Research Wiki is a great starting point when research takes you to an unfamiliar place. How-to information here is primarily user-submitted, so the content on its pages varies. From the wiki homepage, type a country into the search box, or select List All Countries to see an alphabetical list. Country pages may contain historical background, information about administrative divisions and important record groups, details about related records on microfilm at the FHL in Salt Lake City and digitized at FamilySearch, and links to other websites and databases. The Mexico page boasts a particularly exceptional research guide (look under the Research Tools subhead)."

Then expand your search with <u>FamilySearch Online Records</u>

"The superstar of FamilySearch is its online historical records collection. It includes digitized records for 14 Latin American and Caribbean countries: Bahamas, Barbados, Costa Rica, Dominican Republic, Ecuador, El Salvador, Grenada, Guatemala, Honduras, Jamaica, Mexico, Panama, Puerto Rico and the US Virgin Islands. From the FamilySearch home page, scroll down and click on the Caribbean, Central and South America link to see an alphabetical list of available records from this region."
