Story of the month

SGES Comes to the Rescue By José I. Ramírez

A great deal of research had taken place as I was writing my most recently published book *Cuba and the "Last" Baseball Season.*

The focus of the book was the period of time (1960-61) when the Fidel Castro regime announced that, at the end of that season, professional baseball in Cuba would be prohibited, thus the word "Last" is shown in quotes. The significant impact of this policy was that players had to decide whether to stay in Cuba with their family and friends and forgo their dream and careers as professionals or leave everyone behind in order to pursue their professional career

elsewhere, namely the United States. It was a heart-wrenching decision for these very young men generally between 17-25 years old.

My research led me to learn much about the ninety six players who were in the Cuban baseball league at that time, but soon learned of many other players who were playing in the U.S. Minors and were also faced with the same decision. Ultimately I would do research on 150 players, all featured in the book.

The 1960 Palatka Redlegs who won the Florida State League Level D championship that season had a number of Cuban players on the roster including Elio Ribet a young pitcher of which little was known.

I was fortunate to find a member of the team who, during our interview, shared the fact that Elio Ribet had died tragically in a drowning accident that very season, but unfortunately the team member did not remember any other information.

Regularly available sources were of no help and I felt it was important to learn details of what had taken place. Researching the files of the Palatka Daily News by Mike Phelps, a high school classmate and friend of mine who lives in Palatka or communicating with the newspaper's Sports Editor led me nowhere as information simply did not appear to exist. Going back to the former player who had provided the information, he assured me that it was indeed a true story as he would never forget the tragic death of a former teammate.

Stepping back, I remembered the valuable assistance and advice from The Southern Genealogist's Exchange Society by Jon Ferguson and Mike Lawson when writing my family's history *Huellas and Footprints*. I donated a copy of the book which is kept at the SGES Library.

I contacted Mike Lawson to ask whether any help he or the Society could provide. His response was immediate and very supportive. Referred to Society member and Research Assistant Darrell D. Kathman I explained my dilemma. Information in other newspapers in Florida, but interestingly not in Palatka, had been published previously. In no time Mr. Kathman responded within a matter of days with information about Ribet. Later on he followed up with other information about Cuban Players coming to the U.S. during that time. Although the information available was limited, it opened the door that allowed me to complete the information needed for the book. The story about Elio Ribet is featured on page 285 and the assistance by SGES and Mr. Kathman is acknowledged on page 286.

The Jacksonville Historic Society will be hosting my presentation and book signing on Thursday, April 25th at the Old St. Andrews Church, 317 A. Philip Randolph Blvd, Jacksonville. This is next door to the Jacksonville Ballgrounds and across street from Veterans' Arena. Social Hour begins at 6:30 pm and presentation will follow at 7:00 pm.

At that time I will acknowledge the assistance provided by the Society as the Elio Ribet story is unique among the 150 stories that are shared in the book. My book is also available at Amazon.com.

I will always be grateful for the invaluable resource SGES represents for those of us doing research for a variety of reasons.
