

## WHEN TO CALL 911

- <u>ALLERGIC REACTION</u> swelling of face/lips, difficulty breathing, widespread hives, or an Epi-Pen was used.
- BURNED SEVERELY especially on the face, hands or genitals.
- CHEST PAIN if a child reports their heart hurts (physical pain).
- CHOKING if the child cannot breathe, talk, or cry.
- <u>UNRESPONSIVE</u> the child is unconscious or not breathing.
- <u>FALL</u> if a child fell from a significant height or has experienced an accident.
- POISON if the child has or is claiming they ingested drugs or unknown substances and is acting strange or unresponsive.

## SEIZURES

- Lasts more than a few minutes
- If the child doesn't wake up or is unresponsive after a seizure
- If a child has no history of seizures
- If the Seizure Action Plan instructs you to do so
- <u>SERIOUS INJURY</u> head injury with vomiting, loss of consciousness, severe bleeding, broken bones sticking out of skin (compound fracture).
- TROUBLE BREATHING child is gasping, wheezing, blue lips/face
