Gallery lets its art and patrons breathe

Every now and then, a bold underground arts entity comes along with the guts to try to be everything and nothing at all — a blank canvas. Movements Gallery. which quietly opened two years ago, is one those outfits. Its mission isn't to make a lot of money, or to pass aesthetic judgment, or to pose chic or slacker, but to simply let local art breathe, whether it's poetry or transmedia, painting or dance. And the most interesting thing about it may be that it lives in the most commercial, attitudinal district in town - Sixth Street - and survives.

Which warrants a week's glance at Movements' movements. For instance, on Wednesday nights. the space hosts open-mike poetry. This Thursday, the gallery hosts a slam. On Friday, Movements features an art opening with the organic-impressionistic-slightlygeometric paintings of Brian Wootan (accompanied by the jazz of the Blue Noise Band). On Saturday, it's a film installation by Ricardo Aceveo — alternative fare to the upcoming South by South Film Festival. And on any given Tuesday through Thursday, the

gallery's got, of all things, yoga workshops.

In the past, Movements has showcased fringe theater, dance that can't be categorized, experimental music, art that maybe no one else in town would hang which, along with the yoga twist, casts it as a pretty democratic environment. What better place to meditate on compassion or practice the Downward Dog than among the paintings or sculpture of a young, possibly struggling artist? Great marriage, no?

According to Movements coowner Andrew Baron, that was precisely the point when he and Kimberly Zawislak opened the nonfrills space above Marisco's on Sixth:

"We mainly wanted a space that didn't have any sort of subjective guidelines. Everything is open for argumentation" and interpretation, he says. "It's so difficult to determine what's art and what's not art.... Basically, we wanted to support the arts—and not so much the mainstream arts, but any artistic endeavor."

And so they are. That's gutsy.

Now for logistics: Open-mike poetry is at 9 p.m. Wednesdays. The slam is at 9 p.m. Thursday. The art opening is at 8:30 p.m. Friday. The film installation starts at 8 p.m. Saturday. And, oh, the yoga is Tuesdays and Thursdays at 6 p.m., Wednesdays at 7 p.m.
