Yet, paradoxically, time management remains one of the most common struggles faced by students and professionals alike. With constant digital distractions, multitasking has become the norm. Many people pride themselves on being busy rather than being productive. However, true time management is less about filling every minute with activity and more about aligning tasks with purpose and priorities. It is not about doing more, but about doing what truly matters.</p> <p>The most successful individuals are not those who work continuously but those who understand when and where to invest their energy. They prioritise tasks that contribute to long-term goals and delegate or discard those that do not. This approach prevents the mind from being overloaded and allows greater focus on meaningful objectives. Time management, therefore, is a skill rooted in self-awareness. Knowing one’s strengths, weaknesses, and natural rhythms of concentration helps in designing a schedule that maximises efficiency without causing burnout.</p> <p>Ironically, technology—created to save time—often ends up consuming it. Social media notifications, endless scrolling, and constant checking of emails fragment attention and reduce deep focus. Studies show that the brain requires almost twenty minutes to fully refocus after an interruption. Thus, every “quick check” on a device may cost valuable minutes of lost productivity. Technology, therefore, can be both a powerful tool and a persistent distraction, depending on how it is used.</p> <p>To regain control, one must develop digital discipline. This means setting screen limits, disabling unnecessary alerts, and scheduling “no-device” hours to create space for uninterrupted work. Many productivity experts also emphasise the importance of taking short, mindful breaks. Brief pauses between tasks refresh the mind, prevent fatigue, and improve creativity. Such breaks, when used consciously, increase overall output rather than</p>	12


ensured that the sample was representative across gender, academic backgrounds, and employment sectors, ensuring that a broad spectrum of opinions could be accurately recorded. This approach gave the study greater credibility and allowed it to reflect the evolving aspirations of today’s workforce.

According to the survey, 61% of respondents said remote work improved their productivity, while 24% felt less motivated without in-person interaction. Interestingly, 72% preferred hybrid work models, combining both in-office and remote days. The research also revealed a strong connection between flexible work and mental well-being, especially among young professionals who value autonomy, reduced commuting stress, and greater control over their daily schedules.

However, the findings also brought attention to certain challenges. Respondents indicated limited mentorship opportunities and a growing sense of isolation while working remotely. Over 40% of early-career employees believed that learning from experienced professionals had become more difficult in virtual settings, impacting both collaboration and skill development.

To address these concerns, researchers suggested that future studies should explore how digital tools, AI-driven performance trackers, and virtual collaboration platforms might help bridge these gaps. The report concluded that understanding such emerging trends would empower youth to make informed career decisions and guide policymakers and employers in creating more balanced, supportive, and inclusive work environments for the next generation.
