## In Memoriam Cindy Cherry



On November 10, 2025, the Twin City Area Optimist Club lost a long-time member and dear friend, Cindy Cherry. Cindy joined the relatively new Twin City Area Optimist Club in 1993 and embraced its mission of optimism and service with her whole heart. Her radiant optimism and generous spirit were perfect examples of what it meant to be an Optimist.

For 32 years, Cindy faithfully lived out the purpose of our organization—bringing out the best in children, in her community, and in herself. Her service with the club included acting as club treasurer twice, in 2007-2008 and 2009-2010, and as club president in 2016-2017. During her time as an Optimist, she sponsored eight new members, including two who are still active today.

Cindy's giving nature was well known. When the Twin City Optimist Club launched its community sponsorship program in 2018, Cynthia R. Cherry, CPA, LLC became the first Gold Sponsor. In 2014, Cindy offered the use of her office's basement as storage for the Coats for Kids project, disregarding the potential impact of increased traffic and noise to her business.

Visiting with Cindy was always a joy. She loved to talk about her family, her dogs, and her love for travel. She was a fan of Elvis and Johnny Cash, whose pictures were included with the many family pictures displayed in her office. Cindy showed interest in others' families and thoughtfully remembered the details they shared. She lifted others with words of encouragement and offered quiet reassurance when a listening ear was needed.

More than her actions, it was Cindy's *spirit* that embodied what it means to be an Optimist. She showed her faith in God, her love for her family and friends, and her belief in the good that shines within each of us. She loved being an Optimist. Cindy didn't just recite the Optimist Creed—she lived it.

#### Family Empowerment Program

Marian Bozak introduced our guest speaker Wendy Wulf from the Family Empowerment Center, a community-based program run by the St. Louis Crisis Nursery. The Family Empowerment Center provides support to help families move from crisis into stability. One of the main goals of the program is to prevent child abuse by helping in these family situations.

In addition to immediate crisis intervention, the program includes home visitations, case management, counseling, parenting support, and



parenting education at no charge. The services are designed to meet the specific needs of each family with an emphasis on family safety and stability. The program may also help families with utility payments or needed supplies such as food, toiletries, cleaning supplies and even Christmas toys. The Twin City Area Optimist Club also has provided coats through the Coats for Kids program on request.

Family Empowerment services are available in Jefferson County through Mercy Hospital. Families are referred through a variety of paths including a 24-hour help line, (314) 768-3201.





#### Parents as Teachers (PAT)

Our guest speaker today was Kim Richardson from Parents as Teachers. This program services children from birth up to 5 years old to increase school readiness. It was initially developed in Missouri in 1981 by a kindergarten teacher as a pilot project. It is now mandatory in all Missouri school districts, and is implemented across the United States and in several other countries.

Parents as Teachers develops curricula that support a parent's role in promoting school readiness and healthy development of





Parents as Teachers is a universal access program. Families do not have to be low income or have children with special needs.

The Twin City Area Optimist Club supports Parents as Teachers by providing PAT Boxes that are distributed to families in need. The supplies provided in the boxes help parents continue working with their children at home.

Kim mentioned several times the impact of screen time on child development and explained that post-covid, many young children displayed autism symptoms while not diagnosed as being fully autistic. This is known as digital or virtual autism. This is a topic Kim is very passionate about and many members expressed interest in having her return to speak specifically about this issue.

Taking first place in photography was Ryot Schmidt, De Soto High School, with his entry "Dull Eyes". Three-dimensional art first place winners were Emma Rowden and Faith Smith, Herculaneum High School, with their joint entry "Band Together". Graphic design/Digital art first place winner was Ryan McFarland, De Soto Middle School, with his entry "Billy Eillish".



#### ORATORICAL CONTEST

Beginning in 1928, the Oratorical Contest has become the longest-running program of Optimist International. The contest is designed for young people to gain experience in public speaking and provide them with an opportunity to compete for multiple college scholarships with a pre-assigned topic.

#### **ESSAY CONTEST**

The Essay Contest is sponsored by Optimist International to give young people the opportunity to write about their own opinions regarding the world in which they live. The approach can encompass a young person's personal experience, the experience of their country or a more historical perspective. In addition to developing skills for written expression, participants also have the opportunity to win a college scholarship!

#### COMMUNICATION CONTEST FOR THE DEAF & HARD OF HEARING

This contest offers an opportunity for students who are Deaf or Hard-of-Hearing to present their thoughts in the community, gaining skills, which can only come from signing or speaking to a large audience. Patterned after the Optimist Oratorical Contest, the contest offers youth the chance to compete in speech or sign language with the chance to win a college scholarship.

#### KIDS SPEAK OUT! SPEECH CONTEST

All young people can compete in the Optimist Oratorical Contest. The "Kids Speak Out" contest is a "pre-Oratorical" program that provides a more equitable competition for younger speakers.

The **Optimist International Essay and Oratorical Contests** are annual scholarship competitions sponsored by Optimist International to provide young people with the opportunity to express their views and win college scholarships.

The Essay Contest gives students a chance to write about their opinions on a preassigned topic related to the world they live in. **Prizes:** Winners at the club level advance to the District contest to compete for a scholarship, typically **\$2,500** at the District level, funded by the Optimist International Foundation.

The Oratorical Contest is a public speaking competition where youngsters prepare and deliver a speech on a pre-assigned topic. It's one of the longest-running programs of Optimist International. **Prizes:** More than **\$150,000** in college scholarships is awarded

annually. District winners can receive \$2,500 for first place, with a chance to win up to \$22,500 at the World Championships level.


