Through advocacy, community collaboration and education, the coalition identifies victims, exposes traffickers and buyers, promotes slave-free practices and supports survivors of human trafficking on their journey toward wholeness.

The coalition also provides a toll-free number to help survivors in need or provide direction to concerned community members who may witness a trafficking situation.

Through advocacy, community collaboration, and education we work to eradicate human trafficking and exploitation in our communities.

"More than 90 percent of domestic, minor sex trafficking victims were enrolled in school at the time of their exploitation." ~ Federal Human Trafficking Report

Pimps and other sex traffickers prey on young girls between the ages of 12-14, from low-income neighborhoods with bad family lives. These girls are looking for a way out of their situations and when a trafficker promises that to them, they often believe the lie. Unfortunately, reality strikes when the traffickers exploit the girls with sex trafficking.

Experts in the field recognize four different types of sex traffickers. One type preys on minors online and when alone in public. They buy them gifts and make them feel special. Another type offers to buy minors alcohol and drugs. Once the minors are addicted to drugs, it becomes easier for the traffickers to force them into prostitution. A third type sends other already trafficked girls out to recruit new girls for the pimps to abuse. The last type kidnaps minors and forces them into trafficking.

70% of Child Sex Trafficking Victims Were Sold Online. The common age a child enters sex trafficking is 14 to 16 or younger. Too young and naïve to realize what's happening to them. Where pimps find their victims are from social network, Home Neighborhood, Clubs or Bars, Internet, school and bus stops.

Understanding Recruitment: Understanding the red flags and warning signs of a recruitment phase is crucial especially for vulnerable person, but also for friends, families, and bystanders; as we can all play a role in exposing the schemes of traffickers.
