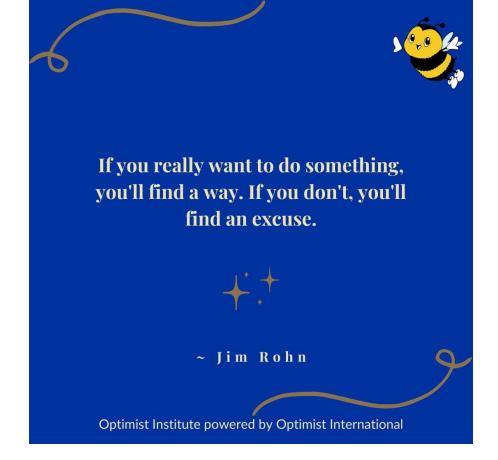

January 4, 2024 Board Update

Highlights from January 4, 2024 Board Meeting:

- Marketing/Sponsorships Jean Naeger sent a news release for the Head Start parties to Leader Publications.
- Sponsorship letters were hand delivered or mailed by January 4.
 Sponsorship Chair Katie Huck reported a total of \$3,250 has already been received.
- Cathy Elliott reported that the Head Start parties were successful and parents appreciated the age-appropriate gifts.
- Coats for Kids program has distributed 200 plus coats. As temperatures drop the demand will increase.
- Treasurer Elect Becky Francis has researched digital banking flatforms the club can use to receive payments. A motion was passed to initiate the use of Givebutter. (More information will be available as the club moves forward using this fundraising platform.)
- The East Missouri Optimist District is asking all clubs within the district to hold a food drive from January 1- February 24, 2024 for their local community food pantry or school backpack program, etc. Refer to EMO section of this newsletter to see how our club will participate.
- Peggy Scott provided information for a new Leader event. A women's conference to celebrate women in our community will be held Friday March 8, 2024. A motion was passed to be the Title Sponsor for this event. Networking with women in our community has marketing potential to recruit new members, community partnerships, and sponsoring. (More information will be shared as it becomes available.)
- The post project report for the \$1000 matching Optimist International Foundation (OIF) grant for Homeless Youth Initiative has

- been completed and submitted to OIF by Jean Naeger.
- Sarah Bauman's application for membership was approved.
- Fundraiser chairs are needed to meet our project commitments. Suggestions open for fundraising ideas/events.
- Carroll Metzger and Ellen Bridgewater continue to move forward with the process to form a 501(c)(3) foundation. They have met with the attorney and have completed some of the necessary forms. (Post board meeting update: As of January 15, 2024, The Foundation of the Twin City Optimist Club is incorporated in the State of Missouri as a public charity! Next step obtaining IRS designation as 501(c)(3).

January 11, 2024 Warren Robinson Director of the Jefferson County Emergency Management Department



The speaker for our January 11th meeting was Warren Robinson from the Jefferson County Office of Emergency Management (OEM). The focus of this office is to make Jefferson County more disaster resilient and to engage with community partners in the coordination of public safety initiatives.

As one of three full time employees, Mr. Robinson has spent the past 10

years at OEM enabling our community to mitigate, prepare for, respond to and recover from disasters. This office works directly with Fire Protection, Emergency Medical Services, the Police and other first responders. Opened in 2017 and located in Herculaneum, the Emergency Operation Center (EOC) enables the team to coordinate and respond to emergencies as necessary.

The Office of Emergency Management also works to educate the public to better handle emergency situations by offering Community Emergency Response Training (CERT). This 20-hour course teaches how to protect yourself, your loved ones, and your community when professional responders are not available.

January 18, 2024 Meeting

Our speakers today were Heidi Rosenthal, the co-founder and CEO of Little House of Neurodiversity, and Tracy McManus, the parent of a program participant.

Little House of Neurodiversity is a non-profit agency with a mission of helping individuals with autism, a variety of learning disabilities and attention deficit disorders to maximize their potential. Little House provides socialization activities including gaming, art and cooking to not only provide a sense of community, but to explore the talents of each participant. Ideally, finding their talents and passion can lead to mentorships and possible jobs for individuals in unique fields. Ms. McManus spoke about the mentorship her son receives in learning the skill of piano tuning.

Little House, founded about a year and a half ago, uses an all-volunteer staff to provide services in various locations in the community, notably Jefferson College and Sunny Hill Presbyterian Church, with hopes of purchasing a permanent location in the future.

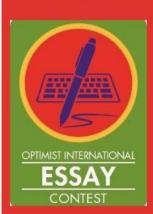
Little House operates on donations from the community and a grant from the Jefferson Foundation. Future goals include funding for direct support staff, class offerings for study and social skills, counseling and respite services for families and an enhanced gaming therapy program. 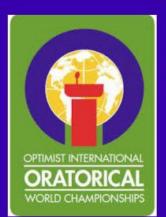

Slow Cooker Chicken Stew

A creamy chicken stew without the cream, this hearty slow cooker chicken stew recipe is perfect for a cold day.

• Trep Time: 15 minutes . O Cook Time: 7 hours

Total Time: 7 hours 15 minutes

. Y1 Yield: 4 servings 1x

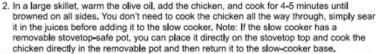
UNITS US M SCALE 1X 2x 3x

Ingredients

- · 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 1 1/2 pounds chicken thighs, cut into 1-inch pieces
 3 tablespoons all-purpose flour
- · 1 teaspoon dried thyme
- 1 teaspoon dried rosemary
- · 1/2 teaspoon salt, plus more to season
- · 6 cloves garlic, minced
- · 1 onion, diced
- · 3 carrots, peeled and sliced
- · 2 large potatoes, cut into 1/2-inch cubes (1 pound)
- · 3 cups chicken broth
- · 1 bay leaf
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1 cup green peas, frozen
- · Black pepper, to season

Instructions

1. Place chicken on a cutting board, dice into 1-inch pieces, and season generously with salt and pepper.



Once the chicken is seared, place it in the slow cooker, add flour, thyme, rosemary, and salt, and stir until the chicken is well coated in the flour and herbs.

Add the garlic, onion, carrots, and potatoes to the slow cooker, and stir to combine. Then pour in the broth and add the bay leaf.

5. Cover and cook on low for 7-8 hours or on high for 3-4 hours.

- 6. Once cooked, add the frozen peas and milk, stir to combine, and cook for an additional 10-15 minutes on high until the peas are warmed through. At this point, you can also adjust the thickness of the stew by adding a bit more flour if it's too thin or a splash of chicken broth if it's too thick.
- 7. Once complete, taste the stew and adjust the salt and pepper as needed before serving.
- The stew can be served immediately, and leftovers can be stored in an airtight container in the fridge for up to 5 days or frozen for up to 3 months.
