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Indigenous History Month Celebration

ʔAFN Community Strengthening Dinner

June was National Indigenous History Month; a time to recognize and celebrate the rich cultures, histories, languages, and traditions of First Nations, Inuit, and Métis Peoples across Canada. This year, ʔakisq̓nuk First Nation gathered at Lakeshore Campground for an afternoon of cultural sharing and community celebration both as Ktunaxa First Nations as well as with the larger public.

Made possible through funding from Canadian Heritage and the First Nations Health Authority (FNHA), the celebration welcomed community members of all ages while also inviting the broader public to engage respectfully with Indigenous culture and teachings.

A heartfelt thank you goes to Susapnana for leading a community drum practice and sharing songs with resonant drumbeats and voices that beautifully echoed throughout the gathering. Appreciation is also extended to Leona, Richard, and Cheyanne for sharing traditional artifacts/practices and demonstrating the hide tanning process, offering participants a firsthand opportunity to learn about skills and knowledge that have been passed down through generations. Leona also created an informative Ktunaxa Land Acknowledgement Zine, which is featured on page 2 and provides readers with an

opportunity to learn more about the significance of acknowledging the lands and the Ktunaxa peoples.

One of the highlights of the day was learning about the traditional uses of the kamquq̓ukuᑦ ʔiyamu (buffalo). As Nasuʔkin Donald Sam explained, for many Indigenous Nations the buffalo is far more than a source of food, it is a symbol of respect, reciprocity, and abundance. Described by the Canada History Project, every part of the animal was used with intention and care. Hides became clothing, shelter, blankets, and drums; bones were crafted into tools, needles, scrapers, and ceremonial items; sinew served as strong thread and cordage; and horns and hooves were transformed into utensils, cups, and other practical tools. These teachings offered insight into a way of living rooted in respect for the land, thoughtful use of resources, and gratitude for the gifts of Creation.

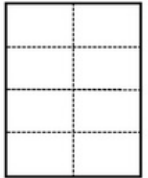
Events like these provide opportunities to strengthen community connections by supporting intergenerational learning, and celebrating the continued vitality of Indigenous cultures and traditions. Should you have any questions within the following Month please drop by the ʔakisq̓nuk site trailer, we would be happy to answer any questions you may have.

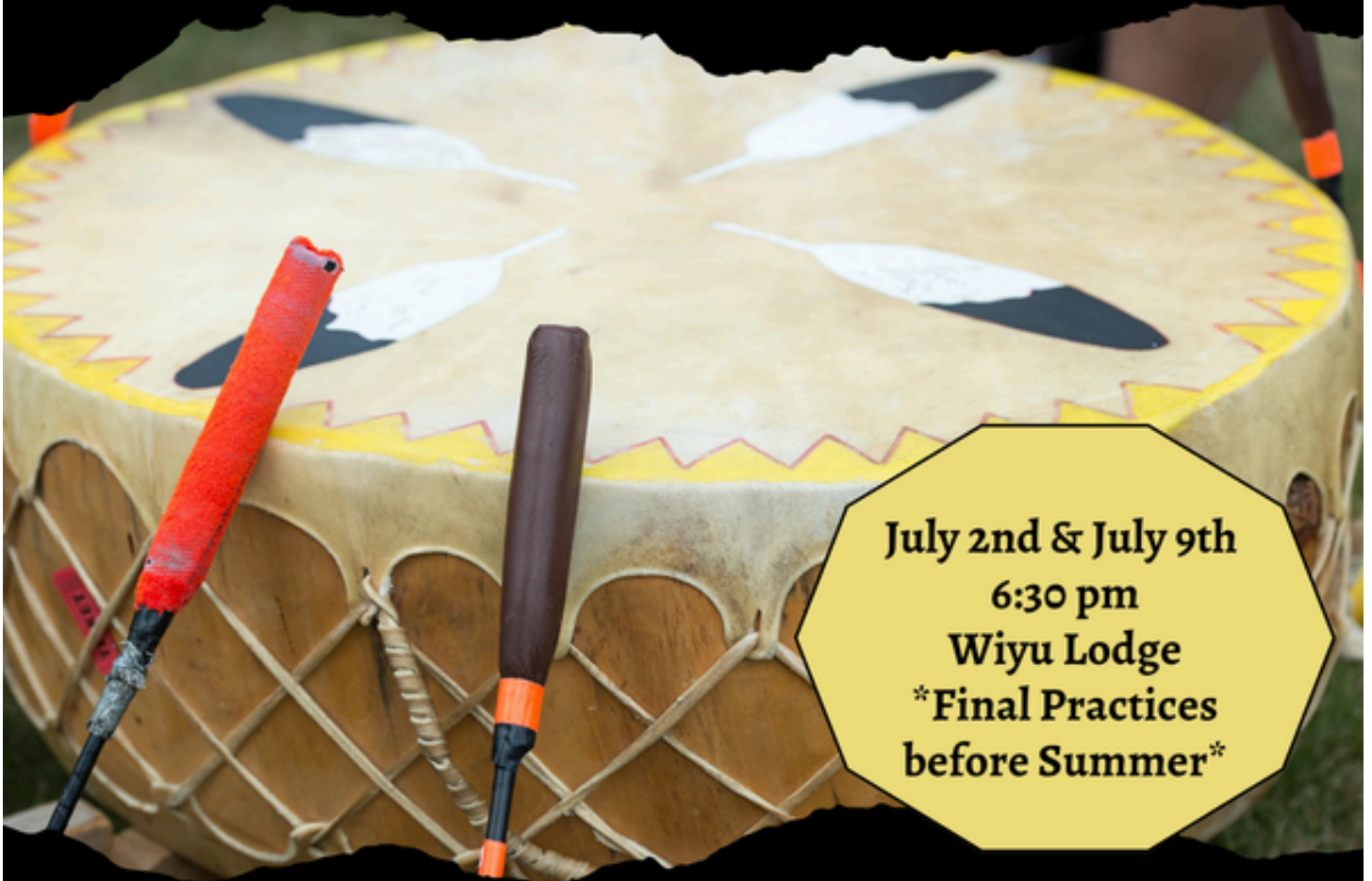

Welcome to the Team, New ʔakisqnuq Guardians!

A huge welcome to Dion Burgoyne and Kevin McNab, who joined the ʔakisqnuq Guardians team in June!

They have already hit the ground running, joining Ursus Heritage Consulting in Ktunwakanmituk Miꞌꞑaꞑas (Revelstoke) to learn about hydro dam impacts on archaeological sites along Arrow Lakes and discuss how best to protect these important places. Dion has also been out at Kootenay Crossing with Parks Canada as work moves forward toward establishing a cultural use area, and in the CBT block, checking kiꞑaꞑi (elk) cameras to support wildlife monitoring.

This is only the beginning. Over the coming

months, the Guardians will support lake stewardship for Windermere and Columbia Lakes, wildlife and habitat monitoring, cultural site protection, and land-based learning. Guided by ʔaꞑxaꞑis ǰapi ǰapsin (All Living Things), this work reflects a responsibility to care for ʔamak (land), wuꞑu (water), and Ktunaxa places.

We are excited to have Kevin and Dion on the team and look forward to all that is ahead as the ʔakisqnuq Guardians program continues to grow.

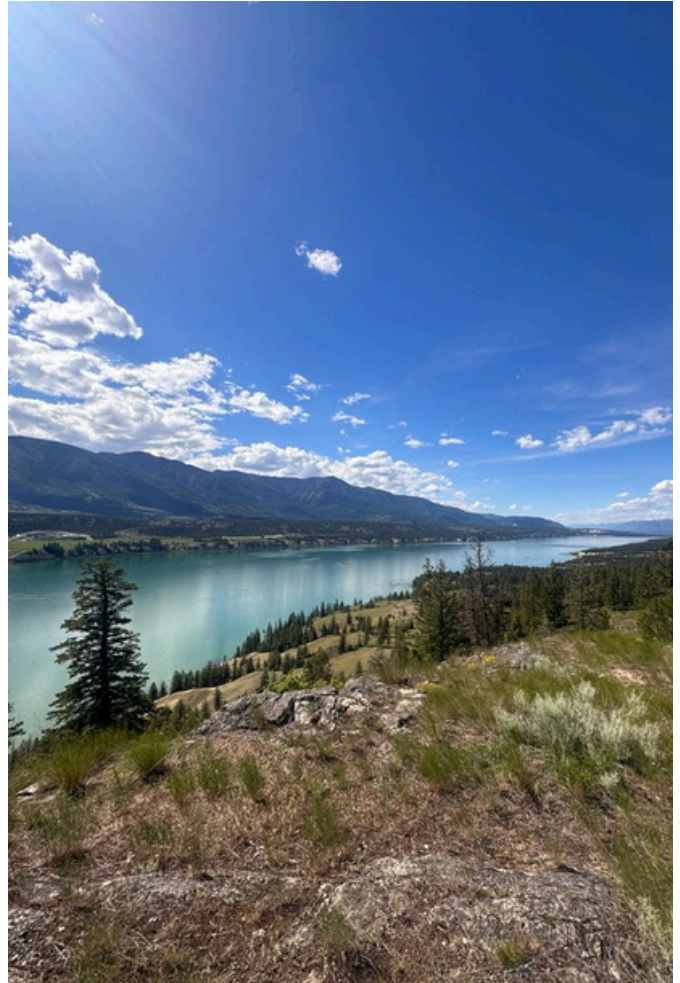

ʔakisq̓nuk First Nation’s Lands and Resources Department continues to advance stewardship efforts for Columbia Lake and Lake Windermere. One important project currently underway is bathymetric mapping, which measures and maps the depth of a lake. Existing bathymetry information for both lakes is outdated, with the most recent maps for Columbia Lake dating to August 28, 1958, and Lake Windermere to May 27, 1974. Updated mapping of both lakes is currently underway, with data collection expected to be completed by August 2026, and final maps to be generated by early 2027.

A Lake Stewardship page will soon be launched on the ʔakisq̓nuk First Nation website. The page will provide answers to frequently asked questions, information regarding ongoing projects and initiatives, and updates as stewardship work progresses.

Discussions with the Ministry of Water, Land and Resource Stewardship continue to move forward as we work together to develop coordinated approaches to addressing the cumulative impacts affecting Columbia Lake and Lake Windermere.

The Lands and Resources Department welcomes several ʔakisq̓nuk Guardians starting this month, whose contributions will play an important role in supporting and advancing water stewardship efforts throughout ʔamakʔis Ktunaxa.

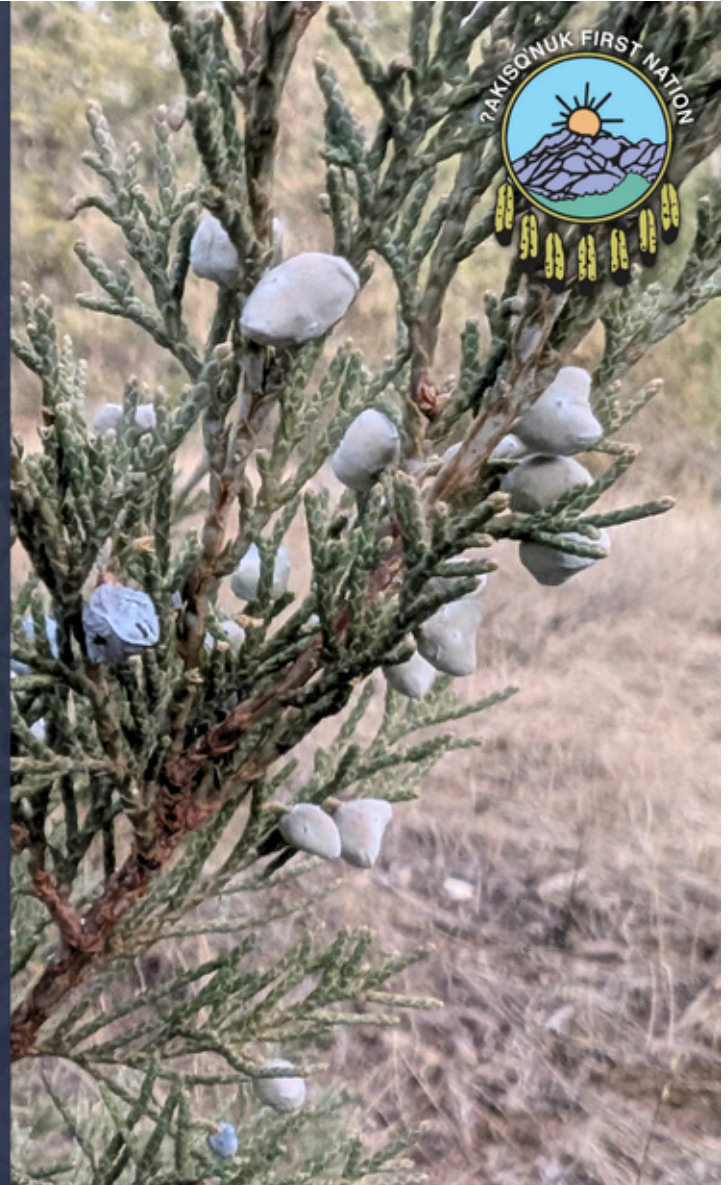

We are most excited to welcome community members into the building prior to the staff move in. We're exploring opportunities to offer guided walkthroughs during the week of July 20th, giving members a chance to experience the new Band Hall and Multipurpose Facility before it officially opens. More information will be shared as dates and times are confirmed.

We can't wait to welcome you into this beautiful space built not just for today, but for the future of ʔakisq̓nuᓃ—a place where community can gather, grow, and be together for many years to come.

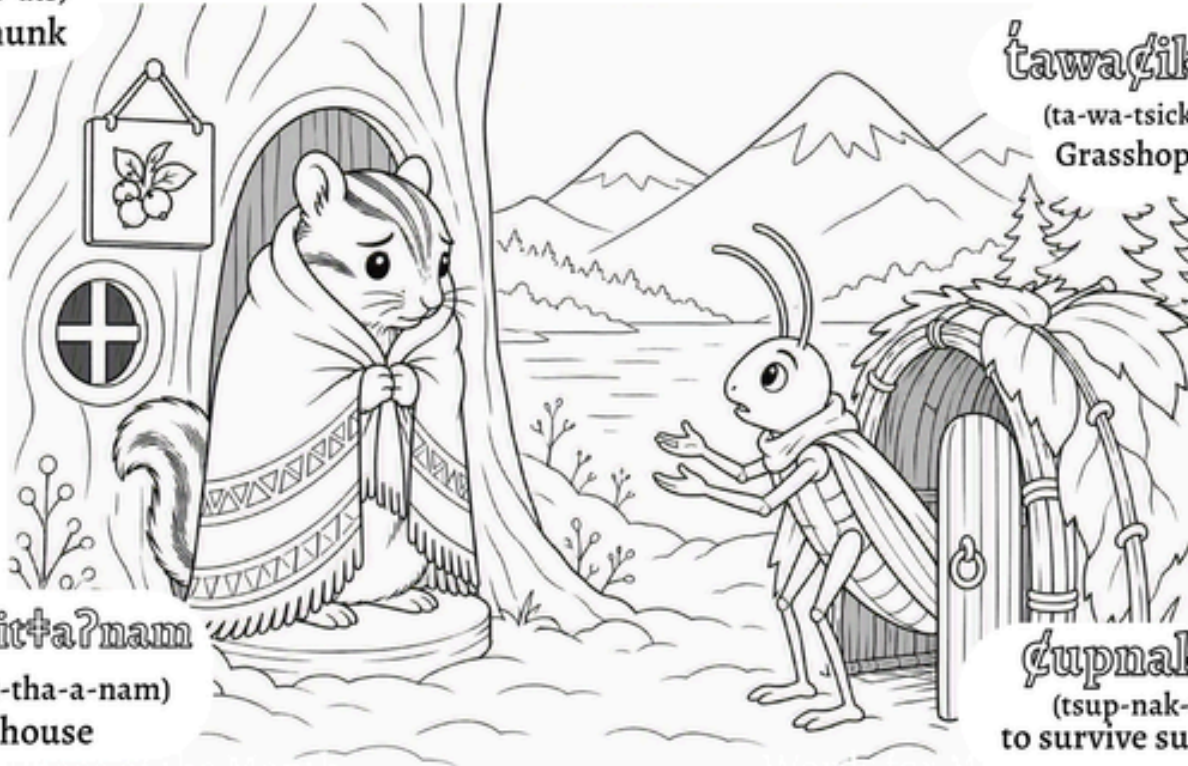
