


MULTIPURPOSE FACILITY

COMMUNITY MEMBERS ARE INVITED TO DROP BY THE PROJECT MANAGERS OFFICE ANY TIME TO DISCUSS ANY QUESTIONS THEY MAY HAVE.

DEAR PAKISÓNUK COMMUNITY,

I am pleased to provide you with the current construction of the Multipurpose Center and the latest Housing unit under construction.

The Multipurpose Center is currently installing the foundations for the Administrative, Atrium and Health Components of the Center. Progress on the site has been slow due to Christmas Holidays and colder winter conditions. However, demolition of the existing Administration Building is scheduled for January 28/25. A Bat Specialist will be onsite during demolition, should any Bats be encountered. It is assumed the Building is Bat Free as there is no heat in the Building. A SARA Permit has been issued allowing demolition to proceed. During the remaining months of January and into February Framing will start on the new Administrative component. More information will follow on the progress of the Administrative Component in the next newsletter.

The Housing Department under the direction of the new Housing Manager, Gayle Michel, is proceeding with the new Housing 4Plex now under Construction.

The housing unit was started in September 2024. The Housing Unit is scheduled to be completed in September 2025. To date the exterior framework is completed with interior work underway.

As mentioned in the previous Newsletter, preliminary design review is proceeding for the new Arbor. Should you have any questions regarding the Arbor please contact Danny Burgoyne.





ATTENTION HUNTERS: COMPLETE THESE STEPS

INTACT HE

Cut off antlers

or skull plate.

Leave 3 inches of neck

to keep tissues needed for CWD intact.

ELK, MOOSE, CARIBOU

STEP 1.

Prepare to submit tissues for CWD in one of three ways:

> Submit a head:

Cut head off animal and remove antlers (nose can be removed for elk/moose).

> Keep upper skull for Euro mount:

Cut out lower jaw with the tongue and all tissues at back of throat. Only need lower jaw for der. Also need the obex for elk/moose.

> Submit your own samples:

Remove lymph nodes and tonsils (for deer), or lymph nodes and obex (brainstem - for elk and moose).

STEP 2.

Fill out CWD Ear Card provided at freezer.

STEP 3.

Remove and retain perforated portion of Ear Card to look up results online.


SIEP 4.

Attach CWD Ear Card to head or jaw with ziptie, or put in ziplock with samples.

STEP 5.

Place sample in drop-off freezer.

Hunters, gatherers, harvesters: What you need to know about bird flu in BC


What is avian influenza (bird flu)?

Avian influenza is a virus that spreads quickly among birds. Since 2022, cases have increased globally, affecting wild birds. poultry, and some mammals like skunks and foxes.

Humans can also get sick from handling infected birds or animals because the virus can survive on feathers and surfaces for weeks.

How long the virus can survive at different temperatures:





Do not touch sick or dead birds.



- Weakness or lack of
- movement Sudden death
- Swelling around the head.
- neck, or eyes



- Sneezing
- Difficulty breathing

Update on CWD response in our area:

From Caeley Thacker, Wildlife Veterinarian:

Targeted removal of deer around Cranbrook will be conducted with the goal of decreasing deer density, risk of spread, and environmental contamination. Maps of the targeted removal area are being developed and will be shared as soon as possible.

Planned activities include permitted special hunt – permits will be issued to local licensed hunters. We will be working with East Kootenay Wildlife Association to get these permits issued. Initially, 50 permits will be supplied to local hunters and additional permits may be issued. More information on this process to come.

Contractors may be utilized to remove additional deer if required. This will depend on the success of local hunters.

Community members may be issued a permit to participate in the hunt or they can exercise their right to hunt without a permit. The lead wildlife biologist with the province has indicated that there are many areas surrounding Cranbrook that have high deer populations that could use some additional hunting pressure. Hunters may go out now to have the first opportunity to hunt in this area before the permitted hunters. The hunt will be in areas surrounding the detected positive cases in Cranbrook — a map will be released shortly.

This work should occur at the end of the month, depending on when permits are granted. If anyone has questions, they can email Tyra at tyra.joe@akisqnuk.org or call (250)-342-6301 ext. 3824 and she will relay to 14 the provincial staff in charge of this effort.







1. Poll Workers

If anyone from the community is interested in working at the polls, they are invited to apply already. Apply to work as a poll worker — Elections Canada. 3. Indigenous Elder and Youth Program:

Purpose

The IEYP is intended to make polling places more welcoming and to make voting easier for electors in First Nations, Métis, and Inuit communities by:

- removing barriers to registration and voting on polling day
- creating a comfortable setting through a familiar presence (i.e., members of the community)
- offering translation services in the language of the community, if the elector is not comfortable in French or English

The role

To be appointed as an Elder or a youth in the program, the person is not required to reside in the electoral district, nor required to be eligible to vote in it. On polling day, their role is to:

- split their shifts during the 12 hours of voting (usually the Elder takes the first shift)
- offer translation services to electors, if needed
- help explain to electors the voting process, including registration procedures
- answer electors' questions
- act as a liaison between poll workers and electors
- help with voting procedures, such as reading the ballot before it is handed to an elector

Impartiality

The Elder and youth are not allowed to canvass for a political party or a candidate, or to try to influence electors. In addition, they must:

- · take an oath before they begin work
- · remain non-partisan throughout their duties
- · agree to maintain the secrecy of the vote
