

The "Johnny Bower Arms"

It was an unseasonably warm first of October 2019 when thirteen Naval Club members attended a special ceremony at the Sunnybrook Veterans' Centre. We assembled for the rededication of the veterans' pub. With the push from the Sunnybrook Veterans' Council, led by S/M Richard Ratcliffe the pub was renamed "The Johnny Bower Arms" in honour of the Toronto Maple Leafs' goalie.

Johnny Bower was, himself, a veteran of WW II. He kept a close relationship with the veterans at Sunnybrook and introduced many Maple Leafs players to them.

We assembled in the main lounge and were welcomed by the Hospital's administration. The programme then was turned over to "the voice" of the Leafs, play-by-play announcer, Joe Bowen. The Maple Leafs Alumni presented a photo montage of Joe Bowen: a picture of a very young Joe in his Army uniform; making an announcement on the ice; wearing combat gear with General Rick Hiller; and with an airman at a Forces Appreciation night.





S/M Richard Ratcliffe spoke briefly about how he and his daughter had worked hard to make the rededication of the Veterans' Pub happen, then the new pub sign was unveiled by Johnny Bower II and S/M Donna Murakami (in her role as a member of the Fort York Legion who runs the pub).



We then retired below to the pub itself, where Richard said a few words to christen it, presented flowers to Nancy, Johnny's wife of over 70 years, and then we did what one does in a pub – we visited with friends!

It was a lovely afternoon honouring a special man!
