



TNVR Application Process


For farmers, colony caregivers, or community members with ongoing colonies—no casual lost-pet reports or low-cost neuters for pet owners.

Step 1: Go to www.woodstockkittennursery/tnvr, fill out the short online service application.

Step 2: If approved, we schedule a home or site visit—check access, count cats, safety, feeding spots etc.

Step 3: After visit, we send a detailed form: exact location, colony size, health notes, preferred return date, etc.

Step 4: We book trapping, vet (spay/neuter/vaccinate/ear-tip), 2–4 day recovery—then return them exactly where they were, or place barn-ready ones if you need rodent patrol. All handled by volunteers, funded by fundraising and donations. You just feed and monitor; we do the rest.



The TNVR Program

What is TNVR?

Trap-Neuter-Vaccinate-Return is a proven, humane method to manage feral and stray cat populations.

How It Works

Trap: Trained volunteers use humane traps to safely capture cats reported by farmers, colony caretakers, or residents.

Neuter & Vaccinate: Partner veterinarians spay/neuter, vaccinate against rabies, and ear-tip for identification.

Recover: Cats rest 2–4 days in a garage, shed, on the farmers or colony caretakers property or foster home.

Return: Feral cats are released back to their colony or barn; friendly or pregnant cats are relocated to partner rescues for adoption.

Barn Cat Placement

Semi-feral, neutered cats are placed on farms or rural properties as natural rodent controllers—providing them a safe, working home.

Benefits

Reduces overpopulation and unwanted litters. Improves cat health and reduces disease spread. Protects livestock and property for farmers. Creates safer, healthier communities.
