Ants and Butterflies... Oh My!

When you think of butterflies, you don't think of ants. However, there is one family of butterflies that has an interesting relationship with ants. The Lycaenidae family, also called the Gossamer Wing family, is the second largest family of butterflies and makes up 30% of known butterfly species. With about 4,700 species worldwide, 2,500 Gossamer Wing species depend upon ants to care for their caterpillars in one way or another and protect them from predators.

Gossamer Wing butterflies are found from southeastern Oregon and southern Idaho to South America, and east through the southwestern quarter of the U.S. to Nebraska, Arkansas and Missouri. These tiny creatures live for a year or less, with some species living only a few months.

The family includes blues, coppers, hairstreaks and harvester butterflies. These tiny butterflies have delicate wings that remind people of sheer, gossamer fabric, hence the name "Gossamer Wing".

The mutualistic relationship some Gossamer butterflies have with ants is called myrmecophily, which means "ant love". Three species of ants (Formicinae, Myrmicinae and Dolichoderinae) are known to protect Gossamer caterpillars. "Ant love" is shown in many ways, depending upon the variety of caterpillar. Some Gossamer caterpillars have pores on their skins that secrete a sugary substance that attracts ants. While feeding on this sweet food, the ants keep predators away from the caterpillars. Others have tentacle-like organs on their backs that pop out and secrete pheromones that alert ants to possible enemies. The ants gather to protect themselves while also protecting the caterpillars from predators.

Some caterpillars secrete a pheromone that lulls the ants and encourages them to stay close to the caterpillars, which helps protect the caterpillars from predators.

Others emit pheromones that make ants think they are ant larvae. The caterpillars are carried into the ant's nest and fed regurgitated leaves or flowers until they turn into pupae. Once these tiny butterflies emerge from their chrysalises, they crawl out of the ant's nest, spread their wings to dry, and fly away.

It is amazing how many ways Gossamer Wing caterpillars rely upon ants for protection.

Information about the 2025 Pacific Region Convention is included in this issue. PRGC Board members (officers, state presidents, former directors and committee chairmen) are expected to attend. Our standing rules state that committee chairmen attend the annual convention and report as requested, and if unable to attend, request permission to be excused from the Region Director, and prepare written reports as requested.

Convention includes committee meetings limited to members of those specific committees, the Board of Directors meeting (all are welcome, but only board members have a vote) and general convention sessions open to all (Board members and official delegates of the member states have a vote). Each of our eight-member state garden clubs is entitled to two to twelve official delegates, depending on its membership numbers as stated in our standing rules. Be sure your state is represented!

Convention is not only when the business and administration of the organization is carried out on behalf of the membership, but is also an opportunity for networking, education, celebration of garden club accomplishments, and planning for the year ahead. There are also workshops, informative speakers at meals, presentation of awards and tours.

Board members and convention delegates should know which meetings they are to attend and be familiar with the issues that are to be voted upon. If in doubt, ask the Parliamentarian or the Director. Come to convention in Arizona to be part of parliamentary procedure in action and to have fun, learn, and get information to share with your clubs, districts and state organizations.

NGC Youth Recycled Sculpture contest


Grades: 4th – 8th grades Reuse, Repurpose, Recycle



Southern California Garden Club, the oldest and largest garden club in the San Fernando Valley, announces that club members and friends dedicated a Blue Star Memorial Marker at 11:11 a.m. on Veterans Day, November 11, 2024 at VFW Post #3834, 111 N. Hagar Street, San Fernando.

The Blue Star program was adopted by National Garden Clubs, Inc. in 1946 as the first program undertaken by garden clubs on a national scale. Initially highways were dedicated as a Blue Star Highway system and large metal Blue Star Memorial Highway Markers were placed at appropriate locations along the way. Two additional markers were added since then. While the program originally began to honor World War II veterans, it enlarged its mission in 1951 to include all men and women who had served, were serving or would serve in the Armed Forces of the United States.

Since its inception, garden clubs have dedicated approximately 3,000 Blue Star Memorials and Markers throughout the country. This is the fifth Memorial Marker sponsored and dedicated by our Southern California Garden Club (four are in the San Fernando Valley and one is at the Ronald Reagan Presidential Library in Simi Valley).

The marker was unveiled by Southern California Garden Club President Gail Vanderhorst and California Garden Clubs, Inc. President Carol Vallens. Southern California Garden Club has 163 members and is responsible for planting many Arbor Day trees throughout the City of San Fernando over a period of many years. Among other philanthropic activities, the club awards more than \$6,000.00 in scholarships annually and is currently renovating the rose garden at the Sepulveda Garden Center.

Club meetings are held on the 3rd Tuesday of the month (Sept. through June).



April 28 – April 30, 2025

Early Registration Closes March 1; Online Registration Closes April 20

ALL garden club members in Pacific Region are invited to attend the 2025 region convention at Wyndham Phoenix Airport/Tempe in Arizona. Full of sunshine, dry air, mountain landscapes, and desert vegetation, this area is known as The Valley of the Sun. It is a sight to be seen and experienced! April typically offers temperatures in the 80s and bright, sunny skies!

What better place to hold a Garden Club Convention?



This year's theme, "Wild and Water-Wise," emphasizes a major issue within our region. Populations are growing, temperatures are rising, and severe droughts are happening! All of this affects water availability. Various PR25 speakers will address water-wise practices promoting sustainability and conservation. Using proper water-wise strategies within our gardens optimizes water resources, reduces water waste, and fosters healthier plants. Keynote speakers will include **Karen Cesare**, the Pima County representative to the Central Arizona Water District who has played a key part in Arizona water rights negotiations and water management and **Kim Grey**, the Executive Director at Boyce Thompson Arboretum, the nation's first botanical garden established in a desert environment. Our awards banquet keynote speaker **Linda Larson**, author of *Traveling Gardens*, will share highlights of her journey visiting 1,000 gardens worldwide. Closing out the convention, representatives of the **National Forest Service** will discuss reforestation programs including the efforts we support through the NGC Plant A Tree program (formerly Penny Pines).

PR25 offers something for all garden club members across the region. Throughout PR25, you can participate in several hands-on workshops such as building a travel-worthy bee/insect "hotel," learning grafting techniques to grow several varieties on the same plant, and "Make and Take" a petite floral design using recycled containers and fresh floral materials. Most of these workshops have limited capacity, so register soon to ensure your spot!

Between business meetings, you can choose from eight educational sessions distributed throughout PR25 with topics ranging from wildlife art and using color theory in design to

low-water use gardening and seed saving. Also be sure to check out NGC Membership Chair **Robin Pokorski's** "25 Tips to Boost Membership" at the very beginning of convention! While PR25 attendees can enjoy the amenities of the newly renovated Wyndham hotel with its courtyard swimming pool, restaurant/coffee shop and bar, you can also use any down time to peruse the Art in Bloom Exhibition Flower Show throughout the Wyndham's lobby, bid on silent auction items, and visit sponsor booths.

But there will be more fun outside the hotel, too! We've set up free guided tours of the Mesa Community College Rose Garden where you can see more than 9,000 roses in bloom, and the Arizona Herb Association's Demonstration Garden with its unique blend of herbs and native herbal plants.

But do not just come for the Convention days! Allow for a longer visit to see Arizona!



Several pre- and post-convention activities have been planned, so come early and stay a few extra days! On Saturday, April 26, join us in a guided walk through Arizona State University's Date Palm farm where rare types of date palms are grown. And/or spend the afternoon in one of Arizona's most famous gardens, Boyce Thompson Arboretum showcasing desert plants from the around on nearly 400 acres. Register for Arizona's State Convention on Sunday, April 27 to hear Brent Leech, Senior Floral Education Coordinator at Arizona Flower Market and former National Board of Directors at Large of the American Institute of Design in a floral design demo and separate hands-on workshop. Post-convention on Wednesday, April 30 and Thursday, May 1 offers some amazing, ONLY-IN-ARIZONA Tours. After closing ceremonies on April 30, you can visit the house and gardens of architect Frank Lloyd Wright's winter home and institute, Taliesin West. Or spend the afternoon exploring nearby Desert Botanical Garden with more than 50,000 drought-tolerant plants on 40 acres; its Plants and People of the Sonoran Desert Trail provides a wonderful introduction to Southwestern ethnobotany (human use of plants).

Then stay Thursday, May 1 to visit one of the most scenic and amazing places on earth, **Sedona. Arizona!**



Sedona is known worldwide for its vibrant red rock colorings, cliffs, and canyons; boutique shopping areas; and beautiful Oak Creek flowing throughout the town. Sedona Area Garden Club will host you on a tour of a member's historical property to learn about the history and culture of the area. After lunch, you can embark on one of three optional tours featuring the Arts District and Chapel of the Holy Cross; western red rock formations and the Sedona Historical Museum; or exploring the area on an ATV and hiking tour into the wilderness! Any will give you an experience of a lifetime!
