And, as always, we're looking forward to Spring!



A visit this summer to the beautiful cobalt blue alpine Lake Tahoe is a good example of what is happening to our aquatic ecosystem. From the top of a ski mountain gondola ride, a docent pointed out the changes in the lake surface. Within the last 10 years, private homes and new condos were built on the California side of Lake Tahoe. The runoff from lawns and storm drains now clouds hundreds of feet of water with sediment.

Lake Tahoe is the second deepest lake in the United States, at 1,645 feet. It trails only Oregon's Crater Lake, at 1,945 feet. Only the surface water drains after a rainstorm or after melting snow, leaving accelerated inputs of nutrients behind.

Four rivers made the list of Most Endangered Rivers of 2011: Bristol Bay River (Alaska); Yuba River (California); Green River (Washington); and Hoback River (Wyoming – which drains into the Snake River of Idaho).

The mining and smelter waste in the Silver Valley, Idaho has drained into rivers and streams, ending in Lake Coeur d'Alene and the Spokane River of Washington. Toxic metals such as lead and arsenic have sickened humans, fish and birds.

With all the government cutbacks, water is not monitored for mercury or hazardous waste. Conservation programs and environmental regulations have been scaled back. Now, more than ever, we must consider promoting alternatives to chemical use in our homes and yards, and to educate the general public. Educational displays in our libraries, flower shows, schools and garden club meetings are a great start.

Google *Water Pollution*. It will take you to many different sites such as *EPA Home*, and *American Rivers*. The educational information is priceless.

Let's join our National President, Shirley Nicolai, in *Protecting our Aquatic Ecosystems!*

The Pension Reform Act of 2006 requires most nonprofit organizations, REGARDLESS OF SIZE, to be registered with and reporting to the IRS in some manner annually. The IRS has recently begun to strenuously enforce registration. The IRS is also conducting a transitional relief program for nonprofits, with reduced fees and paperwork depending on

size of the organization, which will run through Dec. 31, 2012. Virtually all garden club organizations should be filing a form 990-N (e-Postcard; electronically over the Internet), short-form 990-EZ, or long-form 990 annually, depending on gross receipts and total assets. Annual gross receipts of the nonprofit are particularly important in determining the IRS form to be used, and some major cutoff points involve gross receipts that are normally \$5,000 or less; \$25,000 or less; or \$50,000 or less.

If a nonprofit has failed to file its required IRS tax form for three consecutive years, starting with fiscal years that ended in 2007, it may be subject to automatic revocation of its tax status [501(c)(3), 501(c)(4), 501(c)(7) etc.] by the IRS at any time. The IRS has issued guidelines for organizations to regain their tax status, and the rules are available on the IRS website [www.irs.gov; look under heading Charities and Nonprofits]. For example, organizations which have lost their 501(c)(3) status (whether as an independent organization or as a participant in a state umbrella organization's group exemption program) can reestablish tax-exempt status, but these guidelines forbid a state group exemption program from reinstating the organization in the state group exemption program.

Many states have also enacted enhanced registration requirements. For example, in California, in 2011 all 501(c)(3) organizations became subject to state reporting requirements with both the Franchise Tax Board and the Attorney General's Registry of Charitable Trusts. Organizations in other states are advised to review their state reporting requirements for recent changes.

If you have driven on our desert highways, you have probably seen the Creosote Bush (*Larrea tridentata*). It is the airy olive-green shrub that seems so evenly spaced in the desert landscape. It can grow as high as 12 feet, but we usually see it about chest-high or head-high in the Mojave Desert. After a rain, the leaves are a rich yellow-green and you may see small yellow flowers. (These will mature into fuzzy round capsules.) In dry conditions, the leaves will show as olive-drab. In very dry conditions, the leaves that are not shed are a dead-looking brown - but if the bush is well-established, it is not dead!

Some people consider the creosote bush the quintessential desert plant. It has that aroma after a rain that is the true and familiar scent of the desert - sharp, cleansing and invigorating. It is a lovely addition to any residential desert landscape, providing needed shade for smaller plants, especially cacti and succulents.



Creosote bush may prevent certain other plants from growing nearby, though. The reason we see it so well-spaced in the desert is that its roots secrete a substance that keeps roots of other nearby creosote bushes from growing, and prevents other young creosote bushes from becoming established. (This doesn't prevent the bush itself from rejuvenating, as new growth arises from the outer edges of the root crown, away from this growth inhibitor.) In addition, the oils leached into the soil from the bush will inhibit seeds from sprouting. Seeds will sprout only after a

rain has washed away those oils. Plants which are not grown from seed should do well around the bush, however.

Creosote bush leaves are double-lobed, like a puffy V. They are unpalatable to most insects and animals. (Exceptions include a small desert grasshopper and a walking stick; these have adapted so well to the resinous leaves that they can eat nothing else.) However, the flowers are visited by dozens of species of bees and other insects. The berries will attract several species of birds.

These are extremely slow-growing plants. Specimens over 13,000 years old have been found in the California desert. Even in the nursery, with regular watering, it may take several years for the plant to reach a foot high. Individual branches usually live 20-60 years. As old stems in the center die, new ones sprout on the perimeter.

Generally, pruning is not necessary for its appearance. You may want to remove old branches. If the plant is pruned heavily, it will revive, but it will never be as pretty. When transplanted, it needs a fair amount of water to get established - daily for a week, then weekly until it is settled in its new home.
