From Lanna & Karl Lebkuchner:

Our News: Thank you for all your prayers for us and Karl's brother, Mark during this last month. Unfortunately, Mark died on December 7. Sadly, we arrived back in Rhode Island on December 8.

How are we doing? We swing back and forth between grieving and busyness. As you know, when we returned to Central Asia on November 7, Mark was stable, and we were planning to stay till December 18 to allow Janet and Karl to finish the second quarter of the school year. Upon returning to Central Asia, Lanna, Janet, and Mae got sick which kept us all from doing much with others for almost a month and kept Janet home for a week or so. Janet was able to get back to school in time to prepare for the Christmas musical on December 2. That same morning, Karl and his family were told by Mark's doctor that Mark was not recovering, and that his kidneys were failing. The family made the decision to put him into hospice.

December 3 and 4, Lanna got our tickets changed from December 18, to December 8. We quickly packed up our stuff in Central Asia and moved it to Khat friend's houses. December 5 and 6 Janet and Karl had our last two days at school saying quick "Goodbyes" to many friends. December 6 our car broke down and Karl got it towed to a neighbor's house to be repaired. December 7, we packed the last of our things into suitcases to bring to the USA and cleaned up the rented house a bit. That night Karl got the message that Mark had died. At midnight we got in a taxi to the airport to begin our long journey back to USA.

December 9, Karl met with his dad. Stepmom and sister to plan Mark's funeral. That day, Karl tested positive for COVID, thankfully he had a mild case, no one else caught it, and he was finished with isolation in time for Mark's funeral on December 17th.

These last few months have been hard, stressful, confusing, sad, and disappointing at times. Your prayers have sustained us. Amid the difficulties we have experienced a lot of God grace and seen His care for us through His people on both sides of the Ocean. Local friends offering to keep our things, (and helping us get them moved). People providing meals for us, neighbors providing a car when ours broke down. His church giving special gifts to make this hard Christmas a little brighter for our family. Getting comfort from sisters and brothers in Christ at Mark's funeral. As well as in countless other ways.

The Ten Commandments on How to Get Along With Other People

- 1. Keep skid chains on your tongue; always say less than you think. Cultivate a low, persuasive voice. How you say it often counts more than what you say.
- 2. Make promises sparingly, and keep them faithfully, no matter what it costs.
- 3. Never let an opportunity pass to say a kind and encouraging word to or about somebody. Praise good work, regardless of who did it. If criticism is needed, criticize helpfully, never spitefully.
- 4. Be interested in others, their pursuits, their work, their homes and families. Make merry with those who rejoice; with those who weep, mourn. Let everyone you meet, however humble, feel that you regard him as a person of importance.
- 5. Be cheerful. Don't burden or depress those around you by dwelling on your minor aches and pains and small disappointments. Remember, everyone is carrying some kind of a load.
- 6. Keep an open mind. Discuss but don't argue. It is a mark of a superior mind to be able to disagree without being disagreeable.
- 7. Let your virtues, if you have any, speak for themselves. Refuse to talk of another's vices. Discourage gossip. It is a waste of valuable time and can be extremely destructive.
- 8. Be careful of another's feelings. Wit and humor at the other person's expense are rarely worth it and may hurt when least expected.
- 9. Pay no attention to ill-natured remarks about you. Remember, the person who carried the message may not be the most accurate reporter in the world. Simply live so that nobody will believe them. Disordered nerves and bad digestion are a common cause of back-biting.
- 10. Don't be too anxious about the credit due you. Do your best, and be patient. Forget about yourself, and let others "remember." Success is much sweeter that way.
