
The Power of Our Words

Choosing our Words Wisely

Ephesians 4:29

Do not let any unwholesome talk come out of your mouths, but only what is helpful for building others up according to their needs, that it may benefit those who listen.



Unwholesome – Something that is not good for us.

Always think before you speak. Ask yourself if what you are about to say will help or hurt the person it is directed to.

Speak words of encouragement, not discouragement.
