

How Lions and Leos measure their service impact

These are called metrics. Metrics allow all Lions around the world to report their service and see how local service adds up to make a huge global impact. The metrics used to measure success depend on the type of service.

Metrics that are currently collected by Lions International include:

- Number of activities: Each activity reported by a club, district or multiple district is counted as one activity.
- Number of people served: These are the direct beneficiaries of Lions service. Sometimes the number of people served can be counted precisely, and sometimes it must be estimated.
- Number of volunteers: The number of people who participate in the planning or implementation of a service project. As Lions often invite friends to join their service activities, the number of volunteers can include both Lions and non-Lions.

- Number of volunteer hours: The number of hours spent planning and implementing a service project.
- Funds raised: The amount of money collected to fund service activities or charitable donations. This can be from Lions making personal contributions, or funds, raised from non-Lions during a fundraising event.
- Funds donated: The amount of charitable funds given to an individual or organization. Funds donated to LCIF are tracked by the foundation and need not be reported as a service activity, but if an event was held to raise those funds, that event can be reported as a fundraising activity.

What is not reportable service?

Many Lions and Leos serve their communities individually, outside of the activities planned by their clubs, districts or multiple districts. Some examples include bringing a meal to a neighbor, driving a parent to a medical appointment, or volunteering at their place of worship. This type of work is important and commendable; however, it should not be reported as a Lions' service activity.

990-N Non-Profit Tax Reporting

Lions Clubs whose gross receipts are normally \$50,000 or less must file Form 990-N, Electronic Notice (epostcard).

A Lions Club that fails to file the required e-postcard (or annual return) for three (3) consecutive years automatically loses its tax-exempt status.

The first time to be re-instated will cost a club \$400, the second time will cost the club \$800.

Filing period begins on July 1st and ends on November 15th of each year.



Thank you for being a great partner and helping us raise fund for Leader Dog. As we start the new fiscal year, I wanted to share an update that I hope you can celebrate and share with your district.

In fiscal year 2024-25, Leader Dogs for the Blind served 323 clients. Of those, 5 clients were from West Virginia, and over the past 85 years Lions have helped us serve 100 people from West Virginia at zero cost to them!

We received donations from 16 Lion Clubs from MD-29-L, amounting to \$5,700.00! Together, all clubs from MD-29 helped us raise \$22,270.00!

In fiscal year 2024-25 Lions Clubs both nationally and internationally helped raise over \$2.2 million for Leader Dogs for the Blind, serving around 1,400 individuals. This new fiscal year we are hopeful to serve even more people who are blind or have low vision and have a **goal to raise \$2.5 million**. We hope to also have one West Virginia Club become a Top Dog Club this new fiscal year, so they can join our Summer Visits next year if possible.

With your continued support, we can help more clients like Ryan.



Ryan came to Leader Dog for Orientation & Mobility training last spring and came back this year for the Guide Dog program. He is a father who enjoys camping, hiking and swimming, and he does adaptive skiing through the National Sports Center for the Disabled. He said, "Leader Dog Lexie is going to help me travel to and from work and leisure activities I like to do. She'll help me go to the grocery store, the gym or the rec center. She's going to open up a lot of things that I wasn't able to do before."

It is because of your unwavering support that, together, we can serve so many people!



Youth Exchange Reflections

My LYE Experience in Germany - Kaydence Cain

My LYE Experience in Germany, June 27, 2025th through July 19, 2025 was the best and fastest three weeks of my life. It feels like I was just on the airplane on my way to Germany thinking about all the possibilities of what could happen. Will the people be nice? Will I have fun? Will I be home sick? Will this be the best experience of my life?

When I arrived at the Frankfurt airport my host family as well as two other exchange students were waiting for me. Little did I know one of the exchange students standing there would be one of my best friends after leaving the country. My host family was very nice and welcoming. During the week I spent with them I experienced the German family culture. They prepared a delicious dinner every day and we mostly sat outside where the gorgeous view of the village was to eat. I also got the opportunity to go to school one day with my host sister Paula. It was very interesting to see how different it was compared to my school. One thing that stood out was how small their classes were and that they all knew English well. While I was there, I was able to attend her school's prom because she was volunteering for it. It was so much bigger compared to my school because families, teachers, and the students attend for the graduating class. During that week some of the other exchange students and I explored the country with our host families. I am so happy we did that because it made camp 100 times better because we all already knew each other. I am grateful for the host family I stayed with because we now carry a special bond. I am so excited to go back and visit them one day.

After one week it was time to go to the camp, I was sad to leave my host family, but also excited for what the camp would bring. When we all arrived at the hostel, we put our stuff in our rooms and all the girls talked until dinner. At dinner we told something about ourselves and what country we were from to show how diverse our group was. We did many things over the two weeks that made it go by in a blink of an eye. One of the first places we visited was Kassel where we explored the nature part of the city. There were flowers from all over the world planted there and sceneries that were breath taking. Something we did a lot was bob riding. We did so many that I lost track of how many we actually did. We also went to a Par 3 golf course which was fun because I was the only one who had played before.

One day we explored the city we were staying in, Korbach. We learned about the history of the city and walked around during the day. In the evening, we climbed the church tower with a spiral staircase that had over 200 steps. I thought up would be the hard part but going down was worse because it makes you very dizzy. On another day we went to a wildlife park. It stood out to me that they had racoons there because I have never seen a racoon in a zoo before. The brown bear was my favorite part that day because it was very cute. We got to watch the workers feed the animals as well. The next day we went on a Swiss bridge. Let's just say that bridge felt a million miles long and it was the slowest 10 minutes of my life walking across it. That same day we saw where a ski jump competition takes place. The tour guide said not many accidents happen, but it looked scary to me.

When we left that place walking back to the bus, I saw the most motorcycles I have ever seen at once. We stopped for a minute to watch them drive by. We visited the Wartburg castle. This was my favorite castle that we saw there. The history was great and the castle itself was beautiful. One of my favorite days was going to Marburg. We did a city tour, ate lunch, and explored the city. It was very pretty, and I had a lot of fun with everyone. On one of the last days, we went to the Eder Dam. We walked around and saw the gorgeous view. Due to weather that was supposed to happen we couldn't do what we previously planned, so we went on another bob. That same day a member from a Lions Club invited us to go eat dinner. He brought his two red Porsche tractors to show us as a surprise.

On the second to last day, we went to a mine. It was cool to see how everything was set up, the machines, and how hard they had to work there. On the very last day we all started to get sad, and it was starting to hit us that we had to leave each other. That day we spent every minute with each other. We signed our shirts, wrote to each other in our own languages, and just enjoyed our last day together. We all went and got Turkish Kebab for the last time there for lunch. There was a farewell party where the host families came to, and we had a barbeque. We took lots of pictures and shared our favorite memories.

Suddenly it was 5am and my stuff was all packed up. It was time to say goodbye to everyone and to the hostel that holds two weeks of memories. This goodbye was so hard that I cried a lot on the way home. All I could think about was the times we shared together. I won't ever forget the endless laughs we had or all the inside jokes we made along the way. This experience made me learn a lot about myself, but also gave me friendships that will last a lifetime. I learned so much about different cultures and all the people at the camp that it feels like I've known them my whole life. I hope in the future our paths cross again and I can visit them. Especially a girl from Romania named Eva. We clicked instantly and we haven't gone a day without talking since we left. I wish I had one more day at this camp with these people. I can't even explain how much I miss everyone there. All I know now is that I have so many memories that I will carry with me for the rest of my life, new friends from across the world, and many inside jokes that no one will understand except us. I will forever be grateful for the Lions Youth Camp & Exchange. I was able to follow my dreams of traveling and experience a new culture. However, I learned in the end the place means nothing when the people mean everything.
