

Important information for the Club Secretary / Treasurer of ALL Clubs

990-N Non-Profit Tax Reporting

Lions Clubs whose gross receipts are normally \$50,000 or less must file Form 990-N, Electronic Notice (e-postcard).

A Lions Club that fails to file the required e-postcard (or annual return) for three (3) consecutive years automatically loses its tax-exempt status.

The first time to be re-instated will cost the club \$400.

The second time will cost the club \$800.

Filing period begins on July 1st and ends on November 15th of each year.






Here is how to find the reports I sent you on the Lions Portal.

1. Once in the Portal, click on "More" at the top. (Last option on right) Then click on "My Club."




At the right, you'll see a box with Member Actions and Club Actions at the top. "Member Actions" is highlighted, but you don't want that. You want to click on "Club Actioms/

Now, you can click on "View Reports (3rd from top of the list).



Now you should see a "View Reports" window on top of everything else. Click on the Down arrow at the right of "Select a Report" and you have a list of reports to view and/or print (they will be ready to download as pdf files.



Take your pick and click on "Submit." I renamed the files to be a little more explanatory when I sent them to you. It takes a long time for some of these to load. Don't ask me why. And when the wheel stops spinning, it may take awhile for the actual page (report) to appear, but it does in time.

I lost count of the number of times I had to delete some of these instructions because I wasn't doing it right. There is nothing about this new system that is intuitive. Some of these will be impossible to read without downloading or printing them first.



THREE MEMBERSHIP RECRUITING PROGRAMS

<u>Program 1</u>: Club membership is divided into 2 or more teams, depending on the size of the club. Each team will have a captain who will organize their group to contact prospective Lions as members for your club. The President & Board of Directors will establish the dates the drive will begin & end. All members, regardless of office or position, will be a member of one of the teams. Recognition of the winning team will be given at a subsequent meeting after the close of the contest.

<u>Program 2</u>: The President will poll the entire membership, asking each member to commit themselves to bringing in one or more new Lions during the campaign. Each member who accepts the challenge will be listed on a permanent record board to be displayed at all meetings. Here again, recognition for the winners should be planned.

Program 3: A "Special Guest Night" is arranged featuring a popular speaker, an entertainer or entertainment group. Prospective members are invited by the club to this gala event. Prior to the event, the secretary is advised of the name & address of each guest prospect. A letter on club stationery outlining the many features & advantages of the club will be mailed to the prospect.


