Servant Leadership

At a recent Lions Leadership training class, I learned more about *servant leadership*. Lions International views servant leadership as a core principle that guides its members. The Robert K. Greenleaf Center for Servant Leadership states (see https://greenleaf.org/what-is-servant-leadership/):

"A servant-leader focuses primarily on the growth and well-being of people and the communities to which they belong. While traditional leadership generally involves the accumulation and exercise of power by one at the 'top of the pyramid," servant leadership is different. The servant-leader shares power, puts the needs of others first and helps people develop and perform as highly as possible."

By practicing servant leadership in our Lions Clubs, we involve our members and value their input, regardless of their role in the Club. We can encourage members to develop their own talents and leadership skills. This helps develop strong loyalty to the Club and its service, producing high morale and productivity. And, importantly, we can foster the growth of new leaders, who can guide our Clubs and other community organizations.

As we head into December, let us strive to consciously practice Servant Leadership – which will allow us to better serve our communities. Keep in mind International President A. P. Singh's motto "Lead to Serve, Serve to Lead." Both are needed, especially in this Season of Compassion.

Hey Lions!

When members feel valued, connected & proud of what their club does, they don't leave. Retention isn't about keeping numbers — it's about keeping hearts engaged in service.

December & June drops are often the result of clubs purging their rosters before the semi-annual billing deadlines. But that behavior is symptomatic, not the root cause. Let's stop the drops by addressing both prevention & perception.

DECEMBER & JUNE DROPS HAPPEN BECAUSE:

- Clubs don't want to pay for inactive members.
- Members feel disconnected or unengaged or unheard or unappreciated.
- There's a "clean-up culture" rather than a renewal mindset.

IDENTIFY AT-RISK MEMBERS

- Who hasn't attended meetings?
- Who hasn't participated in service?
- Who might drop?
- Check in personally with every member now.
- Ask why they have become distant or might be considering leaving & listen without judgment.
- Offer flexible dues payment options (installments, sponsorships, or club-level assistance funds).
- Use this as a chance to re-sell the value of being a Lion: friendship, purpose, impact & connection.

2025-2026 Excellence Awards updates

These prestigious awards are available at four levels—club, zone, region and district. Clubs must earn a Club Excellence Award as a prerequisite for Excellence Awards at the zone, region and district level.

<u>Applications will not be necessary for the 2025-2026 award cycle.</u> Awards will be distributed by Lions International to clubs that meet the updated criteria and eligibility requirements. You will find these listed below.

Club Excellence Award criteria

The Club Excellence Award acknowledges the dedication and legacy of service within individual clubs and is the foundation for excellence awards presented to Zone Chairpersons, Region Chairpersons and District Governors.

Membership

- Induct a minimum of two or 20% new members, whichever is greater (not including transfer, reinstated or charter members). Eligibility is determined based on the club's membership count on June 30th of the previous Lion year.
- Or sponsor a new Lions club.

Service

• Report a minimum of four service activities to Lions International. Three of these activities must show participation in each of the three International Weeks of Service.

Leadership

- Report newly elected club officers in Lion Portal by May 15 of the current Lion year.
- A minimum of 10% of the club's members complete any three courses in the <u>Lions Learning Center</u>.
- The club president for the current Lion year must not have served more than two consecutive terms.
- A minimum of two or more club officers (president, vice president, secretary or treasurer. Of which, one must be the club president) complete Club Officer Training (online with the Lions Learning Center or in-person as reported by a GLT coordinator in Learn) between May 1 December 31.

Donations

• <u>Contributed to LCIF</u> a minimum of the club's membership total on June 30th of the previous Lion year, multiplied by US\$20.

Benefits of Service Reporting

Lions and Leos served 410 million people in the 2024-25 Lion year. Our district can take pride in helping with that achievement thanks to each club that reported their service activities last year.

For every club, service reporting benefits include:

- Enabling stronger club communications
- Demonstrating your club's effectiveness
- Providing insight into current and future club leaders

Clubs that report service also become eligible for awards and recognition, including the <u>Kindness Matters Service Award</u> and the <u>Excellence Awards</u>. Your help to ensure service reporting is underway this year is especially appreciated. You can see who is and is not reporting through the <u>insights</u> reports in the <u>Lion Portal</u>.

Sight Equipment

Currently there are no reservations for the District sight equipment. Please email me at <u>WilliamstownLionsClub@yahoo.com</u> if you would like to reserve the equipment for your next vision event.

Below is a summary of the West Virginia Dept of Health and Human Resources Bureau for Medical Resources' guidelines for coverage of vision services. Hopefully this will give your clubs a better idea of what is covered under Medicaid and what is not.

- Eye Examinations: Up to 21 years of age of *enrolled participants* are covered.

 Over 21 years of age are not covered unless there is a medical necessity. Eye examinations to determine the need for eyeglasses are only covered for those under the age of 21.
- Glasses and Frames: Up to 21 years of age of *enrolled participants*, eyeglass frames are covered, replacement frames are covered if they can no longer be used (ie broken) and repair costs exceed replacement costs. Medicaid will not reimburse for both contact lenses and eyeglasses when eyeglasses can be worn.

Adults over 21 years of age, one pair of eyeglasses/frames is covered for members who had documented cataract extraction within the past 60 days.

Lions International Service Week for the Environment April 18-26, 2026

Now is the time to plan a new or additional Environmental project for the week of April 18-26, the international week of service for Lions! Some ideas include:

- Contacting your local Solid Waste Authority or recycler and sponsor a recycling event to collect old paint cans, tires, electronics, and other hazardous materials. Take away: good publicity, done within a few hours, minimal cost to the club and fun!
- Sponsor a tree planting event with your local schools. Take away: work with high schools as an segway to a Leos club, watch the project "grow" during the summer
- Organize a community cleanup: Focus on a park and invite the public and high school to participate. Take away: again, working with the high school.
- Sponsor a community (vegetable, flower or butterfly) garden or a composting program. Educational and fun! Take away: people love pollinators and the honeybee is the state insect.
- Begin a campaign to make your town a Bee City USA, a program run by the Xerces Society for Invertebrate Conservation. Currently, the only WV affiliates are Shepherdstown, Snowshoe, Westover and Williamstown.
