Hunting Dogs:

Everyone has heard the quote that "a dog is man's best friend", and that sentiment is especially true for hunting dogs who share the love of this sport with their owners. There is something special about spending a day in the field with your dog, both of you working hard, and finally going home with the birds that denote your success. Certainly not all our hunters bring their dogs with them, or even own hunting dogs, but we believe that hunting with your dog enhances an already amazing experience.



Three main categories are generally used to classify hunting dogs: retriever, flusher and pointer. To help any of our guests who might be interested in finding their best four-legged friend, we are developing a three-part series of informational segments about hunting dogs. Although not designed to provide an exhaustive wealth of information, we hope this helps you decide which dog is best suited for your personal situation.

Retrievers:

The Labrador Retriever is the most popular registered breed in the world, probably due to their exceptional social skills and versatility. They are intelligent, have a strong work ethic, and tend to be easily trained. Their social nature makes them good companions but not guardians. For hunting, Labs are well suited to adverse weather conditions and very cold water. They are a tough and durable breed combining a sturdy build with good speed and agility.





The second most popular retriever is the Golden Retriever. With a dense outer coat that is water repellant, they are also well suited to cold hunting conditions. Golden Retrievers are a tough and durable breed with good speed and agility and a great love of water. Due to their exceptionally social nature, Golden Retrievers are one of the most popular family companions. They are generally intelligent, very eager to please and easily trained. While not aggressive, they can be good watchdogs because they will raise an alarm with the arrival of strangers.

Other popular members of the retriever family include the Chesapeake Bay Retriever, Curly-Haired Retriever, Flat-Coated Retriever, and Nova Scotia Duck Tolling Retriever (Toller). Most of these share many of the same traits as Labs and Goldens, especially their affinity to water and excellent socialization. Most retrieving breeds will range in front of the hunter to flush upland birds within comfortable gun range. With the exception of Tollers which are a bit smaller, most retrievers range from about 55 to 75 pounds in weight and about 20 to 25 inches in height from the ground to the highest point of the shoulders.
