IMPORTANT REMINDER: WATERFOWL LICENSE INFO DUE JULY 4

Hoping to hunt waterfowl with us this fall or winter? If you are not a resident of South Dakota, you will need a nonresident waterfowl hunting permit. The application closes at 8 a.m. central time on July 8, 2024. But don't worry, we can help! You do not have to apply for a license yourself. Our team will apply for you when you hunt with us- and due to our strong relationship with the Game, Fish & Parks Department, we have a 100% success rate in procuring our hunters waterfowl licenses. However, we need your information before the deadline to apply on your behalf. If you have not shared this info or have not scheduled your duck hunt with us, please reach out ASAP!

Prairie dogs might look cute, but they are actually incredibly damaging to the rich soil of South Dakota – and they can completely destroy verdant crop fields. So, we like to round them up and fire away at the varmints! Whether you are part of a

large group or are hunting solo, we will find an active prairie dog town that is perfect for you. This type of shooting is also great for hunters who struggle with mobility. Unlike bird hunting, which often requires a lot of walking, prairie dog hunting is much more stationary.
