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4 MUST-TRY GREAT PLAINS HUNTS

Among any community of hunters, there is hot debate over the best (and worst) places to hunt for your favorite game. If you ask us, however, we will happily tell you why South Dakota is an ideal hunting location. This month, we are excited to explore some of the best hunts in the Great Plains area. How many of these incredible hunts have you tried?

#1: RING-NECKED PHEASANT

The ring-necked pheasant is the state bird of South Dakota and is easily recognized by its colorful plumage. With elegant tail feathers that can exceed two feet in length, pheasants are favored by many as a premier trophy bird and an exciting hunt perfect for companionship with large groups. Pheasant hunting is a classic South Dakota activity – while you may be able to hunt pheasants on preserves on the East Coast, nothing compares to stalking skittish, wild roosters through the corn fields .



#2: PRAIRIE DOG

If you read April's newsletter, then you know a little bit about the joys of prairie dog hunting already. These tiny varmints are well-known pests – and you can shoot them all day long without a limit holding you back. Hunting prairie dogs offers a unique opportunity to test your rifle skills with virtually endless practice as you set your sights on a prairie dog town.



#3: TROPHY BUFFALO

It is not just anywhere that you can hunt trophy buffalo, but at Custer State Park in South Dakota, you may get that chance. Every year, eight trophy bull licenses are granted – and the application pool is open to both residents and nonresidents. On these guided hunts, you will have the opportunity to take home a prize that few hunters get to call theirs.

#4: DUCK

Many people do not think of the Great Plains as a prime duck-hunting area. But in our unique "Prairie Pothole" region, we are situated directly in the migratory path of these birds. With watering holes and sunken ponds abounding on the rolling land here, seasoned and novice duck hunters alike can enjoy the best of bird hunting without wading through marshy wetlands. The Great Plains offers a duck hunting experience like no other – think of it as a brand-new perspective on an age-old hunt.
