
## Leadership in Action



I attended the Southeastern Field Training Officers Association's (SEFTOA) fourth annual conference last week. It's consistently one of the best conferences I attend—and somehow, it just keeps getting better.

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As trainers and leaders, we must always be growing—so we can help others grow.

What makes SEFTOA special is its focus on developing "you"—the individual trainer. Whether you're in law enforcement or corrections, you'll walk away with tools and insights you can immediately use.
