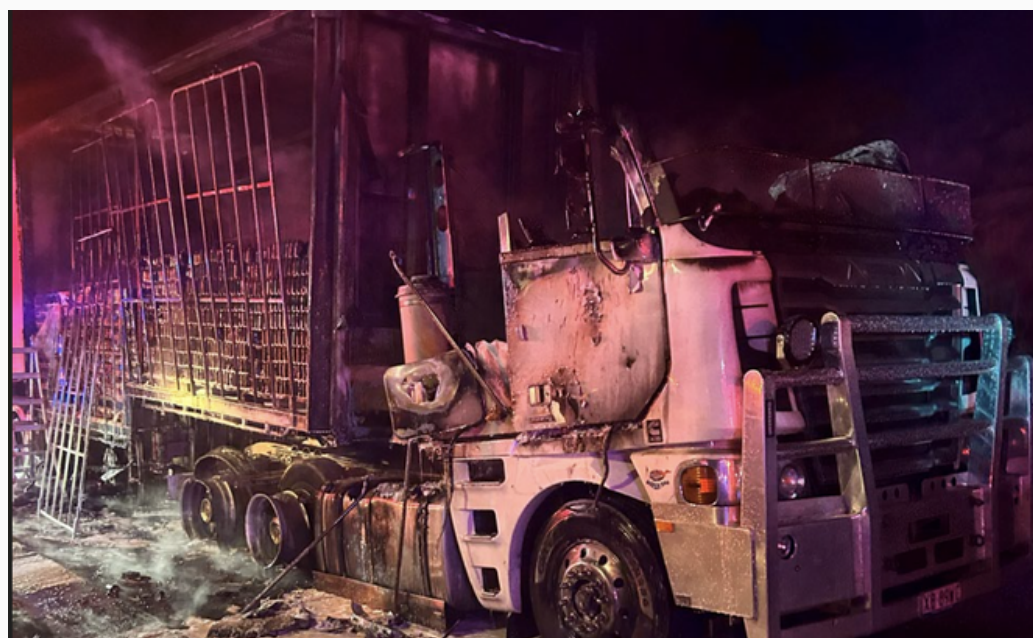
KEEPING THE HUME MOVING...

The South West Slopes Zone has fire protection responsibilities for approximately 90 kilometres of the Hume Highway running from Berremangra in the north to Mundarlo in the south. On average about 11,200 vehicles travel this section of the Hume each day, including 4,500 heavy vehicles and 6,700 light vehicles.

It is important to recognise the significant contribution that several of our brigades undertake by attending Motor Vehicle Accidents (MVAs) on the Hume Highway. These brigades provide crucial support to motorists and emergency services across the districts busiest road corridors.

With such high traffic volumes, motor vehicle accidents are a somewhat regular occurrence. Incidents can range from a minor single vehicle incident with no injuries, through to multiple heavy vehicle collisions involving full highway closures, significant damage/cost, injuries and in the worst cases, loss of life.

At any one of these incidents there will be an RFS crew or multiple crews in attendance to provide fire protection/suppression, assisting other emergency services, managing hazards, and supporting motorists who may be experiencing one of the most challenging moments of their lives.

From 1 July 2025 until the end of June 2026, SWSZ brigades attended 55 motor vehicle accidents, including truck fires on the Hume Hwy. This figure does not include grass or bush fires that occurred adjacent to the roadway. It is common for up to six RFS appliances (sometimes more) to attend a fully involved truck fire on the Hume Highway, and especially during summer where there is a greater risk of the fire spreading into grass and scrub on the highway verges.

Our brigades that have jurisdiction along the South West Slopes stretch of the Hume Highway include:

- **Berremangra**
- **Jugiong**
- **Coolac**
- **North Gundagai**
- **South Gundagai**
- **Tumblong**
- **Mundarlo**

While these brigades form the backbone of the districts highway response capability, larger or more complex incidents regularly require assistance from neighbouring brigades and districts. In turn, South West Slopes crews frequently provide support beyond district boundaries when required.



Motor vehicle accidents on the Hume Highway rarely involve a single organisation. Depending on the nature and complexity of the incident, responses often require close cooperation between the Rural Fire Service, NSW Police, NSW Ambulance, the State Emergency Service, Fire and Rescue NSW, and Transport for NSW.

The effectiveness of these responses relies heavily on strong inter-agency relationships, coordinated decision-making and clear communication under often difficult and rapidly changing conditions.

Keeping the Hume moving Continued...

An example of a recent complex incident occurred in Mundarlo's brigade area on the night of the 29th of April 2026, where crews were called to a truck alight near Mount Adrah on the Hume Highway.

The incident involved a B-double with both the prime mover and the A-trailer alight. The incident required:

- 1 x Cat 1 from Mundarlo brigade
- 2 x Cat 1 from Tarcutta brigade
- 1 x SWS RFS Group Captain
- Fire Rescue NSW from Gundagai
- 1 x Cat 1 from Tumblong brigade
- 1 x Cat 1 from South Gundagai brigade.
- Transport for NSW
- NSW Police



One of the south bound lanes of the Hume was closed, with traffic being controlled by NSW Police and Transport for NSW. RFS crews worked to extinguish the fire, with FRNSW decanting fuel that was leaking.

The ongoing commitment shown by brigades protecting the Hume Highway corridor deserves recognition. Volunteers regularly leave their homes, workplaces, and families at all hours of the day and night to attend incidents that can be physically demanding, technically complex, and emotionally challenging.

Whether attending a minor crash, a serious collision, or a fully involved truck fire, these crews provide an essential service to the travelling public and contribute significantly to keeping one of Australia's busiest freight and transport routes operating safely.

The recent Mt Adrah truck fire serves as just one example of the important work undertaken by highway brigades every week. It is an opportunity to acknowledge and thank the volunteers from Berremangra, Jugiong, Coolac, North Gundagai, South Gundagai, Tumblong, and Mundarlo brigades, along with supporting brigades and partner agencies for the outstanding service they provide to the South West Slopes community.

COMMUNITY EDUCATION TRAILER - Taking Fire Safety on the Road

The newly built Community Education trailer provides brigades with a powerful tool to connect with local communities.

Designed specifically with community events in mind, the trailer provides brigades with a professional and highly visible platform to showcase the work of the Rural Fire Service whilst delivering important safety information to residents and general members of the public.

Funded through the NSW Rural Fire Service Deductible Gift Recipient (DGR) Fund, the trailer represents a significant investment in community education, with a total value of \$42,000.



From preparedness and planning, to bush fire awareness and hazard reduction, the trailer gives volunteers everything they need to have meaningful face-to-face conversations with members of the public.

Although recently delivered, the trailer has already been put to work across the district. It has featured at school career education days in Young, Boorowa, and Cootamundra helping students gain a better understanding of emergency services and volunteer opportunities within the RFS.

The trailer has also supported this year's Gumtree meetings, along with several local community engagement events, proving its versatility and value as a mobile education resource.

The new trailer isn't just eye-catching, it's packed with features designed to make community engagement easier and more effective. Stocked with a range of bush fire safety publications, educational resources and engagement tools, it provides brigades with everything needed to support public information activities.

The trailer also includes:

- A small Weber BBQ to support engagement activities
- A power management system
- A refrigerator for food and refreshments
- Storage for educational resources and equipment
- A large 180-degree awning providing shade and shelter throughout the day
- A MDT and Portable Radio Communications for incidents



These additions help ensure volunteers can comfortably operate the trailer during long events whilst creating an attractive and welcoming space for visitors.

Importantly, this isn't a resource intended for just a handful of events or brigades. The trailer has been purchased for the benefit of the entire South West Slopes Zone and is available for brigades to utilise at community engagement activities throughout the year.

Whether supporting a local show, school visit, field day, festival or preparedness event, brigades are encouraged to take advantage of this valuable new resource.

Community education remains one of the most effective ways to reduce risk and improve preparedness across the district, it is a valuable addition to the South West Slopes Zone.

RFS YOUTH WEEK - COOTAMUNDRA HQ

Two of our young valuable members – Oscar Philp and Katie Paulissen from Cootamundra HQ Brigade were showcased by the RFS during Youth Week this year.

Both Oscar and Katie are a significant part of their brigade, local communities, and the South West Slopes district. Their involvement within the brigade and their own personal development in training within the RFS is enabling them to gain the relevant skills and experience which may one day see them move towards a more leadership role within the RFS.

When asked what their journey with the RFS looked like, and what opportunities stood out along the way, Oscar said “The opportunities within the RFS are extensive – from assisting at community events, to seeing the relief on people’s faces when you arrive at an incident to help. Even small moments like participating in Santa runs and seeing the smiles on kids’ faces are incredibly rewarding. The RFS has given me a strong sense of purpose within my community, along with valuable life skills such as communication, teamwork and problem-solving. It has also allowed me to build lasting friendships and continue learning in a practical, hands-on environment”

Katie and Oscar also commented that they are a part of a close-knit team that supports one another, and a connection that makes it feel like you are part of a big family.

Comments like these from two young members are a credit to the excellent work that Captain Adam Manwaring, Group Officer Marc Bickerdike, and their team at the Cootamundra HQ brigade have been doing to ensure that their members feel valued, supported, and proud to be a part of the brigade. Below is the article that was shared by the NSW Rural Fire Service during Youth Week.



Every day, young members across the RFS make vital contributions to their communities, and Oscar Philp and Katie Paulissen from the Cootamundra Headquarters Brigade are no exception.

Katie joined the RFS less than a year ago but says it already feels like home. "I've been in the brigade for about eight months, but it feels like it's been forever," she says. Inspired by her father, a long-time RFS member, Katie quickly found her place. "It doesn't just feel like something you do when you're bored, the connection makes it feel like you're part of a big family."

Oscar has been a member for nearly three years and was inspired to join after a conversation with his grandfather. "I knew I wanted to contribute to my community but hadn't found the right path, until that moment," he says. Since joining, Oscar has attended a range of incidents and continued developing his skills, which he says are also highly valuable in the workplace.

For Katie, her first call stands out as a defining moment, when she had the opportunity to join an out-of-area strike team travelling to Temora to support local communities. For Oscar, a large-scale hazard reduction burn demonstrated the importance of teamwork, as aircraft and ground crews operated seamlessly together.

Like other young members, their message to other young people is simple: give it a go. "I would most definitely recommend joining the RFS, it's the best thing you could ever do," says Katie. Oscar agrees, adding, "It gives you the opportunity to give back to your community, build valuable skills and create memories that will last a lifetime."



FIREFIGHTER 1 AND 2 TRAINING - TUMBLONG

Local Firefighters Strengthen Skills Through Successful Training at Tumblong

Tumblong Brigade hosted a highly successful Firefighter 1 and 2 training course at their station in June. A total of 20 members took part in the course, with participants from Tumblong, Mundarlo, Nangus, Darbalara, North Gundagai, and South Gundagai brigades.

The training provided volunteers with the opportunity to gain valuable operational knowledge and practical experience whilst learning alongside fellow members from neighbouring brigades. Working together in a learning environment like this, helps foster teamwork, encourages the sharing of knowledge and experience, and enhances cooperation during incidents and major campaign fires.

The success of the course was made possible through the commitment and hard work of a dedicated group of volunteers and trainers. Special thanks to Stephen Luff, Chris Peel, Kevin Paton, Dan Luff, Megan Luff and John Eccleston, whose efforts in organising, delivering and supporting the training ensured a positive experience for all participants.

By hosting a course at a brigade station, participants are able to access training opportunities closer to home, reducing travel requirements whilst ensuring they remain equipped with the skills needed to support their communities during emergencies.

Where brigades can attract sufficient participant numbers and work together with neighbouring brigades, support is available to help make these training opportunities a reality.

Captains and Group Captains are encouraged to engage with nearby brigades and promote upcoming training activities among their members. By collaborating at a local level, brigades can maximise participation, minimise travel commitments and create opportunities for volunteers to meet and learn alongside like-minded members from across the district.

The strong turnout and enthusiastic participation at Tumblong demonstrates the value of locally delivered training.

YOUNG BRIGADE TANKER ARTWORK - “One Fire, Shared Purpose” Stewart James

The Young Brigade has unveiled a new look Category 1 tanker, wrapped in the striking artwork “One Fire, Shared Purpose”, created for the NSW Rural Fire Service by Young-based artist and cultural educator Stewart James. The artwork represents the strength, unity and shared commitment of the people who serve and protect communities across the Western Area.

The vibrant design transforms the tanker into more than just a firefighting appliance, it becomes a moving symbol of connection, cooperation and community spirit. “One Fire, Shared Purpose” reflects the collective efforts of volunteers, staff, families and communities who come together in times of need.

The artwork compliments the tanker’s operational markings, with colours that blend with the familiar RFS red, yellow and white. The result is a vehicle that not only performs a critical role on the fireground but also serves as a powerful ambassador for inclusiveness and community engagement.

When the opportunity arose for the brigade to receive the artwork wrap, the Young brigade executive quickly recognised its significance. Brigade Captain John Tarrant identified the potential for the project to assist in strengthening connections with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people whilst also creating opportunities to engage more broadly with the wider community. The initiative received support from the Young Aboriginal Lands Council, highlighting the collaborative approach that helped bring the project to life.

The brigade and tanker most recently attended NAIDOC Week celebrations at Young Hospital, featuring a Welcome to Country, smoking ceremony, and morning tea. The tanker was a welcomed inclusion with attendees admiring the artwork and posing in front of the tanker for photos.



The brigade is scheduled to attend the Young Show in September, where visitors will have the chance to view the tanker up close and learn more about the meaning and inspiration behind the design.

Thank you to the support of the Young Rural Fire Brigade, Young Aboriginal Lands Council and the creativity of local artist Stewart James, that message is now travelling the district in unmistakable style.

"One Fire, Shared Purpose"

This artwork, titled *"One Fire, Shared Purpose"* was created for the NSW Rural Fire Service Western Area Command. It visually represents the strength, unity, and shared commitment of the people who serve and protect communities across the Western Area. Detailing a combination of Aboriginal ways of storytelling and symbolism, the artwork reflects the collective spirit of the RFS and the communities they serve, under the guiding principles: *Prepared, Capable, Engaged*.

The central part of this artwork represents the shared purpose that connects all who serve - volunteers, staff, and community members - while other elements speak to the connection to all people who share the responsibilities of caring for Country.

The artwork honours the land, the people, and the enduring cultural connection to fire as a tool for protection, renewal, and care. It is both a tribute to the traditions of First Nations people and a celebration of the community coming together as one, united by fire and the purpose it represents.

The central component of this design emphasises a network of important connections that collectively recognise the many First Nations communities within the Western Area Command footprint of the RFS.

The layered patterns in this artwork represent diverse landscapes and embody a design found on significant artefacts like battle shields and weaponry used to defend and protect their lands.

The artwork uses blends of Red Ochre, Yellow, and White to represent connections to Country and RFS values and mottos.



These circular patterns identify the different communities within the larger Western Area Command and serve to represent the RFS Values and Philosophy, which highlight Professionalism, Accountability, Integrity, and Respect.

These patterns acknowledge the long-standing connection to the Traditional Burning Practices of all the First Nations people across all area. Depicting the patch/mosaic style in which this burning was conducted.

These swirling patterns represent the waterways and river systems that connect with many communities in the Western Area Command.

"I am a proud Wiradjuri man from the Riverina, with over 20 years experience as an artist and more than 15 years working in education. I am committed to sharing quality insights into First Nations culture. I aim to "Influence Change Through Art & Education" and strengthen First Nations cultural identity within communities."

2026 GUMTREE MEETINGS

Five Gumtree meetings were held this year throughout April at Rye Park, Frogmore, Gundagai, Gobarraalong and Harden.

The morning meetings, starting at 8am were down on numbers from previous years, with 31 members in attendance. However, the feedback and discussions were meaningful which always helps the district staff understand the key items our members are thinking about.

The top three items raised during these meetings then become a focus point for the district staff.

Just a reminder – A Gumtree meeting is where the District Manager invites members to a neutral location (normally under a gumtree) and encourages attendees to speak freely about RFS matters. A BBQ is cooked and thoughts are documented on butcher's paper.

The top three items raised at this this year's five gumtree meetings were:

- **The e-membership process** – concerns were raised at 4 of the 5 meetings about it being difficult for people to join the RFS online.
- **The RFS drill shirts should stay yellow** – this was raised at 3 of the 5 meetings where attendees support the move to a more comfortable cut shirt, but do not want the colour of the shirts to be black. Members advised that they want the new style shirts to stay yellow.
- **Fire trail questions and requests for specific fire trails** – this was raised at 2 of the 5 meetings with specific questions centred around local fire trails.

Other singular items that were brought up during the meetings included – Magnetic radio handpiece holders, PPE being worn at every job, brigade recruitment and questions on tanker servicing.

So, what is the FCC doing about these issues raised?

The e-membership process – The FCC can arrange to send someone to your AGM with a computer to sign potential new members up on the night. This can occur an hour before the meeting starts.

The FCC can also sign potential new members up over the phone, as long as they are able to provide copies of the required identification documents to the FCC in advance. A list of identification documents can be provided prior to the phone call so that they know what they need to provide.

It is also likely in the near future that a paper membership form can be used under certain circumstances.

The RFS drill shirts should stay yellow – this matter has been raised at the Command Leadership Team level, as well as through the workplace health and safety HSR state level group.

Fire trail questions and requests for specific fire trails – The SWSZ has a draft Next Generation Fire Access and Fire Trail (FAFT) Plan completed. The South West Slopes Bush Fire Management Committee developed this plan in consultation with senior volunteers and land management agencies. Funding is extremely limited across the State for fire trail work, Priority strategic trails within this plan may be funded in the future.

ATTENDING 'TREE DOWN' INCIDENT CALLS DURING STORMS

During damaging storm events, the SES, local Councils, and other agencies, including the RFS are all likely to be activated to ensure the community remains safe from flood damage and debris. In these circumstances the RFS is commonly dispatched to assist with trees down on roads. In situations where numerous trees are down on multiple high use roads, the RFS is likely to be the closest emergency vehicle that can clear a tree, or stop motorists from colliding with a tree in a particular area.

During localised severe storm events where multiple 000 calls are made by the public, the RFS will be activated to respond to 'Tree down - Incident calls' to ensure motorists are kept safe by reducing their risk of injury, or fatality, by driving into a large tree in the middle of a road.

On the night of the 1st of July 2026 during a damaging storm event, several RFS crews were paged and dispatched around the district to deal with multiple trees that had fallen onto and blocked roads.

Unfortunately, there have been cases where motorists have been seriously injured, or killed as a result of colliding with a tree that has fallen onto a road. RFS brigades play a pivotal role in keeping the community safe during these incidents, particularly when all emergency services are stretched to capacity.

We appreciate your brigade turnout and ask that you please continue to undertake this important line of work when requested.
