

Why Mortality?

The essay reminds me of what the Prophet Joseph Smith said about “experiences:” “all these things [meaning everything we do in mortality] shall give thee experience, and shall be for thy good” (Doctrine and Covenants | Section 122:7). If we make the right choices. If we make the wrong choices, it can still be for our good if we repent and change our thinking.

What the Prophet Joseph Smith taught when he was alive is different from what the LDS Church claims today with respect to D&C 132, which is diametrically opposed to D&C 42: 22-26 and D&C 49:15-17 which has created many offshoots and paradoxes. I’ve been a member all my life and am still a temple going member at 72 and believe that the Prophet Joseph Smith never received D&C 132, it was a construct of Brigham Young’s fallen nature according to the laws taught in ten commandments.

My focus and testimony over the years has evolved from the “letter of the law” (which gives us experiences) with all its ordinances and ceremonies (which I have learned is all symbolism); to the “spirit of the law,” which is co-equal and co-eternal to all, for “Peter opened *his* mouth, and said, Of a truth I perceive that God is no respecter of persons: But in **every** nation he that feareth (loveth unconditionally) him, and worketh righteousness, [virtue and holiness of character] is accepted with him” (New Testament | Acts 10:34 - 35).

I think the best theological explanation for why we are here in mortality is from the LDS Bible Dictionary under the word, “Holiness,” look it up, it is beautiful! “Life” is not about *formalism* and what our egos accumulate or authority one may claim; but what we “become inside,” when we do what we do in all our “experiences.” For me, Celestial Glory with Father, is the potential of every person who chooses to “become” a manifestation of holiness, a “temple of the living God!” [1 Corinthians 2: 16-18]; which is all about “becoming” in character and divine attribute, a holy virtuous person! It’s not about the “letter of the law” [*formalism*] and the competition or prejudices found in race or religion, unless we want a Terrestrial or Telesstial “experience” [D&C 76].

I love the simple gospel truths found in the Sermon on the Mount and the two great commandments [Matthew 22: 37-40] because it can develop a godly character of holiness and virtue; and this can be so true for everyone, in every nation, no matter what race or religion one belongs too!
