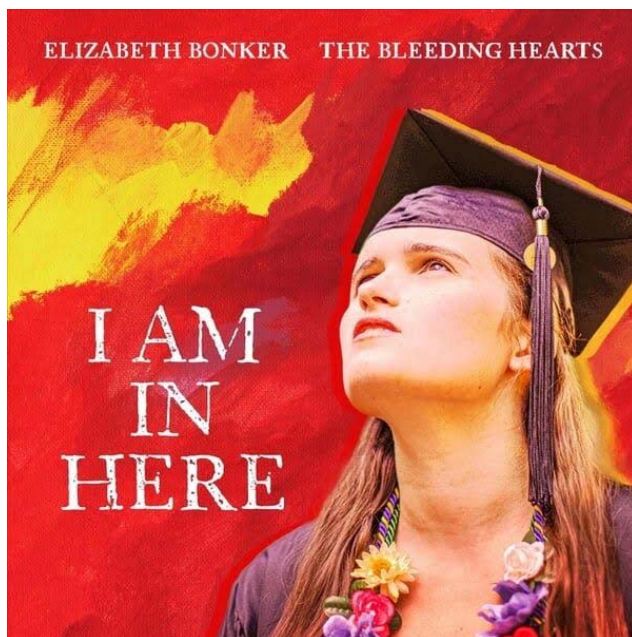


Elizabeth Bonker: “Be The Light”

Hello, friends. I come here today to tell you about my role model, ELIZABETH BONKER. Elizabeth is a nonspeaking AUTISTIC who overcame countless OBSTACLES to graduate top of her class at ROLLINS COLLEGE in 2022. She is also a published AUTHOR and LYRICIST After graduating college, she established Communication 4 ALL, an organization dedicated to helping all nonspeakers find their VOICE. Her accomplishments are an INSPIRATION, and she is just getting started!

Elizabeth was born healthy and developed speech on time. However, when she was 15 months old, she says, “my words were inexplicably taken from me.” Determined to help her, her parents took her to YALE MEDICAL SCHOOL, where she was diagnosed with autism. In spite of the diagnosis, Elizabeth’s parents were convinced she was an intelligent person trapped inside a “SILENT CAGE.” When her GRANDMOTHER saw a technique called the RAPID PROMPTING METHOD (RPM) featured in an episode of a news show called “60 MINUTES,” Elizabeth and her family were off to TEXAS to try it out. RPM uses letterboards to help nonspeakers communicate by pointing

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to letters and numbers to CONVEY (transport, communicate) their thoughts.

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Learning to spell to communicate is not EASY. It takes time, patience, and determination. We start out by using STENCILS, poking letters and numbers with a pencil. Because most of us have APRAXIA, our bodies don't always do what our brains tell them to do. Like me, Elizabeth had a team that supported her JOURNEY. From stencils, she moved to a letterboard and, finally, to a keyboard. She says "With months of practice, I made progress, and the world began to open up to me. I started writing POETRY because it allowed me to say more in fewer words." In fact, Elizabeth was just a teenager when she published her first book, "I AM IN HERE," along with her mother VIRGINIA BREEN.

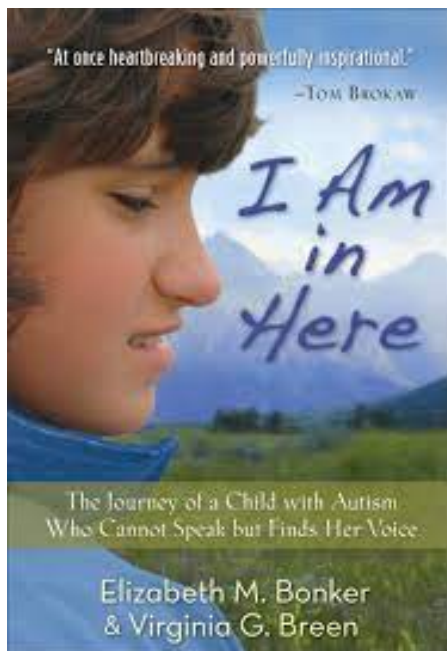

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Elizabeth enrolled in Rollins College because she believed the strong focus on community engagement and social innovation supported her life mission. Her brother, who is also affected by autism, had also attended Rollins, graduating in 2019 with HONORS. Elizabeth had two primary goals and chose her major and minor accordingly. A major in SOCIAL INNOVATION would help her become the changemaker and ADVOCATE she hoped to be. Meanwhile, a minor in ENGLISH would develop and refine her writing skills. She took courses in many other subjects as well – anthropology, sociology, and statistics to name a few. She believes this VARIETY of subjects helped her develop multiple skill sets and she praises Rollins' flexible LIBERAL ARTS program for its diversity.

In 2022, Elizabeth graduated from Rollins at the top of her class. She wrote and delivered a valedictorian speech that went VIRAL and rocked both the speaking and the nonspeaking world. I encourage you to listen to the entire speech, but I chose some HIGHLIGHTS that stood out to me. First, Elizabeth relays a story about one of Rollins' famous alumni, MISTER ROGERS. Mister Rogers was a beloved television host, producer, author, and minister who created a preschool TV series called MISTER ROGERS' NEIGHBORHOOD. Following his death in 2003, a simple note was found in his wallet, saying LIFE IS FOR SERVICE. Elizabeth called his message "So simple, yet so PROFOUND." After telling her story, Elizabeth issued a challenge to her classmates. "Tear off a small piece from your commencement program and write 'Life is for service' on it. ...

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Let's start a new tradition. Take a photo and post it on social media. Then put it in your wallet or some other safe place, just as Mr. Rogers did. And when we see each other at our REUNIONS, we can talk about how our commencement notes reminded us to serve others."

At the end of her speech, Elizabeth gives some incredible examples and quotes to inspire and motivate her classmates. First, she REVEALS her dream: communication for all, saying “There are 31 million nonspeakers with autism in the world who are locked in a silent cage. My life will be dedicated to relieving them from suffering in silence and to giving them voices to choose their own way.” She reminds her classmates “God gave you a voice. Use it. And no, the IRONY of a nonspeaking autistic encouraging you to use your voice is not lost on me. Because if you can see the worth in me, then you can see the worth in everyone you meet...I leave you today with a quote from ALAN TURING, who broke the NAZI ENCRYPTION code to help win World War II. ‘Sometimes, it is the people no one imagines anything of who do the things no one can imagine.’ Be those people. Be the light!”

Note from the author:

I'm sure you can now see why Elizabeth is my role model. Like her, I was also set free by spelling, and now my life is full of possibilities. I am getting a high school DIPLOMA and will go on to college. I can finally show the world how smart I am. We have met other spellers and their families, and it is wonderful to spend time with my PEERS. I am already starting to help spread the word about spelling. Last summer, I was invited to MINNEAPOLIS to be on a panel of spellers at a conference. In September, we presented to interested parents and teachers here in LAS VEGAS, and I answered questions from the audience after the presentation. I also traveled to CHICAGO in November to address some of their school faculty. Like Elizabeth's mission, mine is to help those with no speech find their voice. Each time I see a nonspeaker, I feel DESPAIR. I hope one day that all nonspeakers have access to the communication they deserve. They have so much to offer the world, and without their voices we are missing all the wisdom and compassion they can bring.
