



Legislative Update



As a reminder -

- In 2022, WACCRA secured funding for the Office of the Insurance Commissioner report which identified that Washington's CCRC regulations do not provide adequate financial oversight or consumer protections.
- In 2023, WACCRA secured funding for DSHS/OIC/AGO to provide the legislature with recommendations for improvement in financial oversight and consumer protection in conjunction with stakeholders.

In 2024 -

- DSHS/OIC/AGO held "listening sessions" with CCRC stakeholders including WACCRA.
- April June: DSHS/OIC/AGO held seven "show and share" sessions with stakeholders to solicit feedback on their initial investigative findings.
- Final DSHS/OIC/AGO report was sent to the Legislature on December 1, 2024.





As part of DSHS report development, WACCRA presented our key legislative asks and examples of other state's regulatory frameworks in 10 key areas:

- CCRC Licensure by the State.
- Residents' Rights and Ombuds Support.
- Meaningful enforcement of regulations.
- Periodic financial reviews by the State.
- Actuarial reviews by the State.
- Board of Directors representation by independently elected residents.
- State oversight of and requirements for use of a CCRC's funds.
- Bankruptcy protection of residents' contracts and entrance fee.
- Timely repayment of entrance fees.
- Guarantee of **promised lifetime care**.





Senator Annette Cleveland has introduced SENATE BILL 5691 to the Senate Health and Long Term Care Committee to:

"...adopt the department of health and social services' report recommendations addressing a regulatory oversight plan for continuing care retirement communities amending" ...changing and amending current codes sections and ..."creating a new section;"





Representatives Nicole Macri and Lisa Callan have just introduced House Bill 1889 to the House Health and Wellness Committee.

HB 1889 is a companion bill – meaning it is identical to the Senate bill – which will make the bills easier to get through the legislative hurdles.

This is the first time that WACCRA has had the same bills in BOTH THE HOUSE AND SENATE – **A HUGE WIN!**





WACCRA is in general agreement with the report and the bills but does have legislative suggestions that we hope can be added to strengthen protections for residents.
