Going Green Christ Community Church

Christ Community Church is committed to be a zero solid waste community to landfill campus. The industry accepted definition of “zero waste” is a 90% diversion rate via recycling, composting and reuse. We are committed to getting as close to 100% zero waste as the current market allows.

Campus events are one of Christ community’s largest waste streams. **It is the responsibility of all vendors operating on Christ Community’s campus to ensure that their events are close to zero waste as possible.** Therefore, at least 90% of the waste generated by your activities must be compostable or recyclable. Below is some helpful information regarding “Zero Waste Acceptable” products and appropriate alternatives for vendors.

Where Do I Begin?

When planning for an event, it is important to ask yourself a few questions that can help make the event successfully zero waste. Please consider the following:

1. Is the event indoors or outdoors?

-) **Indoors:** Consider using plastic reusable plates, everyday dishware or China and reusable flat wear as a first option. In china is not an option for the event, please consider the guidelines for appropriate recyclable and compostable disposable items outlined below.
-) **Outdoors:** If the event is outdoors, you will probably be using disposables instead of reusable dishware. Follow the guidelines below and select appropriate disposable products.

2. Will you be serving food? Yes or No.

-) **Yes:** Any disposable product that will be contaminated by food must be compostable.
 - o Paper products (i.e. paper plates, and paper napkins) are compostable and acceptable
 - o Special Plastic Products (i.e. compostable plastics) are also acceptable, but the product must be ASTM 6400 certified. See below for more details, including where to purchase these items.
-) **No:** All waste generated can either be recyclable or compostable, depending on your product of choice. See below for a list of acceptable items.

3. How can I reduce the overall amount of waste I generate?

-) Avoid selling individual drinks such as water bottles and pop cans. Provide bring stations with compostable paper cups or ask your attendees to bring their own reusable cup.
-) Avoid providing individual condiment packets such as ketchup and mustard. You can offer bulk condiment options and provide small paper cups or another compostable option as outlines below. Buying items in bulk instead of individually packaged items can eliminate unnecessary packaging waste (which is generally not compostable or recyclable).

Acceptable Items

Recyclable Waste

Like residential recycling in Kent County, all recyclable waste generated at Christ Community Church is sent to the Kent Count Materials Recovery Facility. Therefore, please use the Access Kent guidelines to determine if an item is recyclable.

Of course, the most important memo with recycling us that the **waste must be clean and food free**. Waste from event produces common recyclable plastics (#1 - #7) and (food free) paper.

-) Example...If you choose to serve a hamburger on a #5 plastic plate, the grease will have to be cleaned off before the plate is recycled. For that reason, we discourage using recyclable items if there is a chance of food contamination. Instead, consider compostable products like paper plates.

Common Recyclable Items:

-) Milk Jugs
-) Red Solo Cup (must be almost completely clean. A little drink residue is okay, please do not use for greasy/sticky food items.)
-) Office paper (i.e. brochures, magazines, agendas)
-) Water bottles
-) Cardboard
-) All clear and colored glass containers (must be food free)
-) Plastic grocery bags (#2 and #4 only)
-) Aluminum foil (must be food free)
-) Plastic ketchup bottles (must be food free)
-) Pop cans
-) tin cans (must be food free)

Compostable Waste

All paper waste, bio-based plastic, and food waste can be composted at Christ Community Church. Compostable plastics must meet the ASTM 6400 standard. Here are a few examples:

Common Compostable Items

-) Paper plates
-) Paper napkins
-) Paper towels
-) Paper cups – if they have a thin wax coating on the inside, they are still compostable
-) Pizza boxes
-) Food soiled cardboard/paperboard (i.e. paper boats)
-) Bio-based plastic utensils
-) Wax paper (i.e. basket liners, McDonald's wrappers)
-) Bio-based plastic cups
-) Bio-based plastic straws
-) Wooden stir sticks
-) Paper packets of sugar
-) Paper bags
-) Tissue paper
-) Wax lined cardboard containers (i.e. the paper milk carton we got in grade school)
