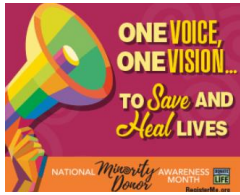

August is National Minority Donor Awareness Month (NMDAM)

National Minority Donor Awareness Month is a collaborative initiative of the National Organ, Eye and Tissue Donation Multicultural Action Group to save and improve the quality of life of diverse communities by creating a positive culture for organ, eye and tissue donation. National Minority Donor Awareness Month stems from National Minority Donor Awareness Week, founded in 1996 by the National MOTTEP to bring heightened awareness to donation and transplantation in multicultural communities – focusing primarily on African American/Black, Hispanic/Latino, Asian Pacific Islander and American Indian/Alaskan Native communities

National Minority Donor Awareness Month is focused on outreach and education including virtual events and messaging to:

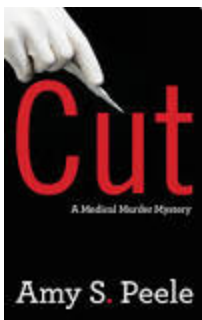
- Provide education about organ, eye and tissue donation and transplantation
- Encourage donor registration & family conversations about donation
- Promote healthy living and disease prevention to decrease the need for transplantation

Amy Peele, a retired transplant administrator wrote this medical mystery which takes us through a journey within the complicated realm of organ transplantation.

As a transplant nurse, I found this read excellent. A mystery full of heart, compassion, and a bit of comic relief just at the right times made it an easy read that kept my attention throughout and represented fairly the concerns we have regarding organ allocation and transplantation in general.

A CEO flies across the country to receive a liver transplant and a transplant nurse picks up on some fishy behavior while ironically caring for her in both locations. The transplant nurse and her friend investigate this behavior and their journey was fun, exciting, but also dangerous. You'll have to read the book, though, to find out what happens!
