Yesteryear in Las Vegas

Tony Messina loves researching the history of early Las Vegas history: 1900—1910. Below are some articles from old Las Vegas newspapers featuring music in early Las Vegas.

"One thing that often pops up is the presence of music at many celebrations and other social events ... like the dances held by the volunteer fire department and the Elks Lodge. I've attached a couple of clippings from the Las Vegas AGE ... our most established pioneer newspaper ... from 1905 forward. Note that besides the piano, we had locals playing violin (Beckley and Park were both standout pioneer family names), guitar, and even banjo (Rev. Harry Grey was one of the first Church rectors). When the musicians tired out, they took a break and the "phonograph" was called into service. The music needed to keep playing! The quartets listed in the programs likely sang barbershop harmonies. Music was important to our pioneer ancestors ... it rejuvenated them and distracted them from hardship and worry. Let's carry on the tradition - enjoy the music - play the tunes - and use them to build fellowship in the community." -Submitted by Tony Messina
