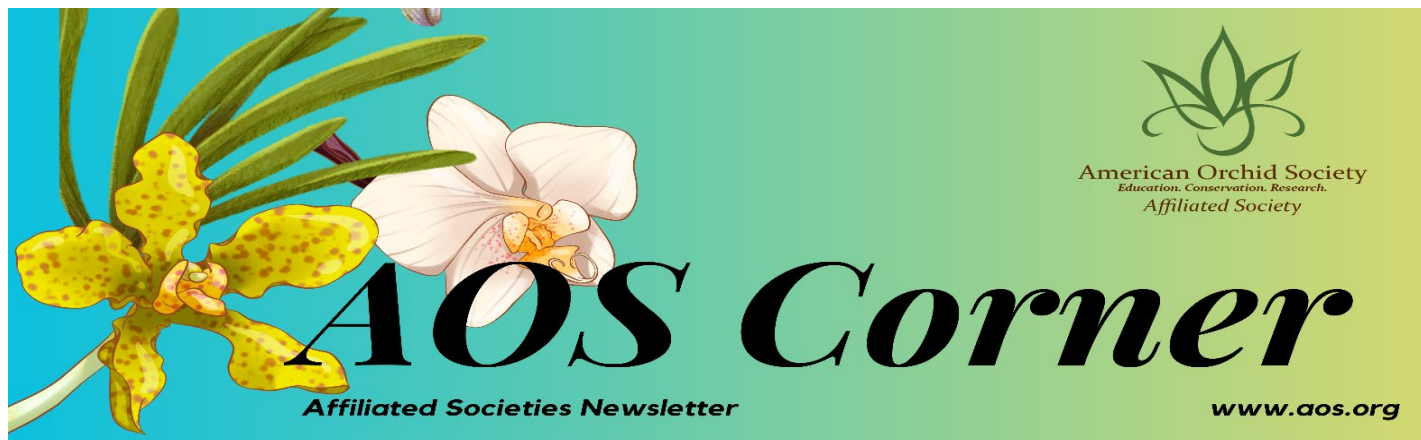




AUGUST 2026

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MESSAGE FROM THE AMERICAN ORCHID SOCIETY PRESIDENT

Welcome, I keep talking about judging and awards, because a big part of what you see in Orchids magazine—especially in the annual April issue—is the direct result of what happens at affiliated society shows, monthly judging center judging, and even outreach judging.

One thing most of us can agree on is that the beauty of the orchids displayed in the magazine is exactly why we open it as soon as it arrives. If you read it online, you get a head start—but for those of us who are old school enough to want to hold something in our hands, that first flip through still feels special.

Every April issue also gives us a moment to celebrate the plants that received the Special Award in each category for the year covered by that issue. For example, the April 2026 edition showcases the winners from 2024.

If you're new to orchids, the Special Awards are endowed and named in honor of people who were special in the orchid world. I didn't have the pleasure of meeting Herbert Hager, but I know the genus *Phalaenopsis* was near and dear to his heart, because it's his name that graces the Special Award for *Phalaenopsis*. I chose to mention it because a *Phalaenopsis* is often the "gateway orchid" into the orchid-growing mania that affects—or at least charms—many of us judges. There are currently 25 endowed Special Awards for specific species, or hybrids, or intergeneric hybrids. I encourage you to re-read the April 2026 issue to learn about all of the Awards.

One of those awards, the Merritt W. Huntington Award—given for the most outstanding flower awarded a First Class Certificate (FCC)—can only recognize one flower. Well in 2025 there were 116 FCC awards. Carol Klonowski's article on the 2025 FCC winners in the April 2026 magazine, "Pointed Praise," highlights and includes pictures of all 116 FCC winners.

Another thing you might not realize is how long it takes for that recognition—and the award photos—to make it into the magazine. The April 2026 issue recognizes plants awarded in 2024. Part of the reason for the lag is that it takes time to enter all the awards, and then each Judging Center votes to select its best candidate for each Special Award category. Some categories have many choices, which makes the decision especially challenging, while other categories may have fewer plants grown, shown, and awarded. Often, a specific Judging Center has a particularly beneficial climate or particularly strong growers for a certain type of orchid. When fewer than about 15 plants are awarded in a Special Award category each year, all the plants in that category are added to the candidate pool so that judges around the country can see and vote on a variety of flowers.

There are two rounds in the selection process. In the first round, each Judging Center makes its selection from all its awards for that year and sends it to Laura Newton for compilation. Laura is the Director of Awards and Special Projects, she is integral to the Special Award process. In the second round, after the Special Award categories are populated by Laura, each active

judge—whether emeritus, senior, accredited, associate, or student—votes on each Special Award.

Once the votes are tallied, the results are presented each April, along with a picture of the winning orchid and a brief description that includes the award, the exhibitor, where the award was granted, and, of course, the photographer—Nile Dusdieker is the author of the 2026 article featuring all of the 2024 Special Award winners.

There are also awards especially for the grower. These are granted to the person who grew a plant that was awarded a CCM (Certificate of Cultural Merit) or a CCE (Certificate of Cultural Excellence). The “trick” to this kind of award is that the plant itself has to be as spectacular as the flowers—it’s not enough to have beautiful blooms. This is truly one of the highest honors one can receive.

If you see a plant with a tag that has AM/CCM/AOS, that means it has both a quality award and a cultural award. When you spot a plant on the vendor bench at a show, or at your society auction, with multiple awards shown on the tag snag it. It’s a great plant to acquire—because it should grow really well. Happy growing!

ANOTHER ALTERNATIVE WAY TO GROW OUR ORCHIDS

Last month we included an article about growing orchids in cork coozies and if you've decided to try this growing method, we wish you good luck and humbly request that you give us a report on how it's working for you! Although we all grow our orchids in pots, baskets, or on mounts, there are alternative ways to grow and display our beauties. These unusual and sometimes experimental methods make it more interesting and yes, fun!

There are Wardian Cases, attributed to Nathaniel Ward back in the 1800's, which were decorative and often ornate glass enclosed containers used for both displays and transporting plants. These cases eventually morphed into what we generally refer to today as terrariums. Terrariums can be open at the top or completely closed. Flowering plants like succulents and orchids can grow surrounded by mosses and ferns to replicate a tropical environment.



One of our top orchid growers in the Fort Lauderdale Orchid Society is Vicki Hallock and she loves “all things tiny!” She, herself, is small in stature and she loves to grow little bitty orchids. In the past few years as she looked into growing in terrariums and creating stunning designs with suitable plants, she discovered the concept of the biOrb. BiOrbs are a special type of pricey terrarium with all the bells and whistles—a 360 degree covered terrarium with automated humidity, a mister, LED lighting and adjustable air flow created by tiny fans. As her minute orchids bloom on a fence behind her home, she moves them into one of her several biOrbs, perfectly placed to complete the tropical design. Vicki also prefers to choose species orchids of the genera *Lepanthes*, *Grosourdia*, *Schoenorchis*, *Specklinia*, *Platystele*. With her extreme patience and good tweezers, she might also incorporate miniature ornamental figurines, a park bench, a bunny during the Easter season, a Santa at Christmas, a tiny sun dial—Vicki even has a diminutive dragon as well as an alligator! Pieces of bark or wood with ferns and moss also give an outdoorsy feel to the display. These small touches add an air of whimsy to the beautiful mini rain forest she has created in the biOrb. Vicki's work is most appreciated by our AOS judges! Her terrariums have won five Artistic Certificates as well as Best in Show at the Flamingo Gardens Orchid Society Show.

BiOrbs are becoming more and more popular, especially with folks who prefer to grow indoors and with those who enjoy “minis.” But keep in mind, patience and creativity are musts. If you seem to be in a growing rut with the same old same old, maybe it's time to give your attention to something different! Try a biOrb!
