

can't wait to see you all at the fair this year!



The livestock auction is not only a place to purchase quality market animals, but also to experience a young person's pride and self-confidence in successfully raising and caring for a young animal through fair.

These kids work hard feeding, sheltering, grooming, and training these animals. The hands-on education they receive is seldom matched by other experiences of their youth. The ability to make decisions, seek advice, when needed, and take responsibility for their animals affects the health and well-being of their projects, as well as market values. Entering the Sherman Co. Fair Who, Where, When & it's Free!

Who can enter? Basically anyone. One must be a resident of the United States. Some special contests are only available to Sherman Co. residents.

<u>When do you enter?</u> Wednesday August 21, 2024 between the hours of 11:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m. Bring your items to the Sherman County Fairgrounds at 66147 Lonerock Road in Moro, Oregon.

What can you enter? Just about anything >> Baked goods, barley, beer, ceramics, chickens, a collection, crocheting, dried fruits or herbs, ducks, flowers, hay, home canning, house plants, knitting, leather craft, macramé, needlework, painting, sewing, soap making, sewing, taking pictures, vegetables, wheat, wine.

<u>What can kids enter in the "Kid's Corner?"</u> Cookies, candy, cake that they baked. A holiday decoration, a garden vegetable, a house plant, a sewing project, a collection or an object of art made from recycled materials. Don't forget about the coloring contest!!

RULES, REGULATIONS, GENERAL INFORMATION FOR OPEN CLASS

Please visit our website or contact the fair board for rules, regulations and Information regarding specific divisions.

(Rules, Regulations and Information subject to change)

1. General Supervision

The Fair Board and law enforcement officers provide supervision of the grounds and exhibits.

2. Superintendents, their Duties and Powers

The superintendents (selected by the fair board) shall be responsible to the Fair Board for his/her respective department and shall have the power, with the consent of the Fair Board, to appoint such aides or assistants as necessary. Said Superintendent shall see that all articles on exhibit or belonging to the association or exhibitor are carefully preserved. They shall also perform such duties as the Board of Directors may find necessary.

3. Interpretation of Rules

The Fair Board reserves the right, final and absolute to interpret these rules and regulations. All matters, questions and differences in regard to, arising from, connected with or incident to the Fair will be arbitrarily settled by the Fair Board.

4. Peddlers and Concessionaires Licenses

No person shall be allowed to sell or give away articles on the Fairgrounds or surrounding Fair owned property at any time without permission being given by the Fair Board. Permission is constituted by a completed, signed registration form to the fair secretary **prior** to fair week (August 24-27) and written receipt given by the fair secretary. Signature gatherers, groups selling raffle tickets and other solicitors must also register at the Fair Office. All concessions on the grounds will be under the supervision of the Fair Board. Proof of insurance and appropriate licenses' must be shown at time of registration.

5. Eligibility to Exhibit

Any resident of the United States will be eligible to exhibit for prizes in the regular exhibitor/premium list. Special Open Classes and/or Contests may be set up by the Board of Directors, if warranted and limited to Sherman County residents.

6. Clerk's Entry Books

No clerk shall, under any circumstances, allow the entry books to leave the clerk's possession or be inspected by anyone other than the clerk or other officials until entries are closed or judging complete.

7. Entry Dates for Livestock, Poultry, Rabbits

All entries for livestock, rabbits and poultry must be complete by 6:00 p.m. on Wednesday of the Fair. Cattle must be in place by Wednesday at 12 noon. Other livestock, poultry and rabbits must be in place by Wednesday at 6 p.m. All entries and fees must be made in the Fair Office. When stalls are full, entries will be closed. First come, first-serve basis only.

No phone requests will be taken.

Entry dates other than livestock: **All open class entries are due by 6 p.m. on Wednesday of the Fair.** Fresh flowers and baked goods need not be in place until 8:15 a.m. on Thursday. All other Open Class entries, including arrangements featuring grain and potted plants, must be in place by 6 p.m. Wednesday. Exhibits must be groomed and ready for exhibit.

8. Livestock entry Fees

Entry Fees --- Open Class

The schedule of fees, due at the Fair Office with completed entry forms, is as follows:

Open Class Cattle	\$ 5.00	per head
Open Class Swine	\$ 4.00	per head
Open Class Sheep	\$ 4.00	per head
Open Class Goats	\$ 4.00	per head
Poultry and Rabbit	\$ 1.00	per head

9. Stall Deposits, User Fees

A \$5.00 non---refundable stall fee, for the entire week will be required for all open class horses and livestock. If stalls are left unclean, all premiums will be forfeited. Barn superintendents will assign stalls and provide a list to the fair office. Bedding is provided by the Sherman County fair Board, however feed, pans and water buckets must be provided by the exhibitors. Stalls will be cleaned by the exhibitor and done by 8:00 a.m. daily, unless barns superintend directs otherwise.

10. Registration Requirements

All purebred livestock, to be eligible to compete for premiums at any Fair held by this association, must be accompanied by certificate of registration, duly certified by the recognized registry of that particular breed or certified pedigree, conforming to all requirements usual demanded to insure acceptance by the established records of said animal for registry. If under one year old, competitors for premiums must be offspring of sire or dam who duly recorded and/or eligible thereto, and it shall be the duty of the entry clerk to reject any and all applications not complying with these conditions. The owner of the dam at the time of service is recognized as the breeder of the offspring. Papers should be kept available in case the judge should call for them in the show ring.

11. 4-H and FFA Members Eligible to Compete & Herdsmanship in all Barns

Club members are limited to two market animals per species to exhibit and sell at the Sherman County Youth Livestock Auction Sale. 4-H and FFA market and breeding livestock will not be allowed to enter open class. <u>All animal exhibitors</u> must and will check in with the barn superintendents for their barn duty schedule. All Exhibitors will have at least one shift per day during the fair week. If exhibitors do not do required barn duty, they will forfeit all premiums monies and animal placement in the auction.

12. Errors in Entry

If it is ascertained that any animal or article is entered in a Division or Class in which it does not properly belong, it is the duty of Superintendent to investigate, and if by mistake, to correct and also notify the fair secretary; otherwise, the judge is instructed not to award a premium.

13. Exhibitor Must Be Bona Fide Owner

Every animal or article must be entered for competition in the name of the bona fide owner. Anyone who tries to

14. Responsibility of Exhibitors

All animals are to be treated in a humane manner. Exhibitors must be in a position to bring out their stock as their classes are called for judging. Exhibitors must at all time give necessary and personal attention to whatever they may have on exhibition, and at the close of the Fair take every precaution in their power for the preservation of all articles and stock on exhibition, but will not be accountable for loss or damage. All exhibitors will properly water, feed and clean animal pens. All exhibitors are required to do barn duty. Check with barn superintendent for your requirements. If exhibitor fails to do so, they will meet with the Grievance Committee and may be subject to removing the animal, class, 4-H and FFA beef animals will have neck ropes/chains to insure control and safety, primarily at night.

15. Premiums

All premiums (Open Class, 4-H & FFA) will be paid by cash at the fair office. Premium payout times will be posted during the fair week. (Friday, Saturday & Sunday). If exhibitor is under the age of 14 a parent/guardian must sign for the premium money. Ribbon/stickers denoting awards will be awarded in the following colors: First Premium -Blue; Second Premium-Red; Third Premium--White. No animal or article deemed unworthy shall be awarded a premium just because there is no competition. If the article is not worthy of a first place, it may be awarded a second, third, etc. Premium money's will not be mailed and will be forfeited back to the Sherman County Fair if not picked up by August 27, 2022. Should any exhibitor select to donate their premiums or ribbons back to the fair, a receipt of donation will be issued from the fair secretary for your tax records. Thank you for your donation!!

16. Special Awards

The management does not guarantee delivery of premiums donated by others. When special awards are offered by various individuals, the donors are responsible for the delivery of the prizes to the Fair Secretary. The Fair Board may have to issue a request for the prize, if not in place, in order for the parties winning the prize to collect it.

17. Superintendents' Exhibits

Superintendents and others who are helping during the receiving of Entries must have their entry blanks filed with the Exhibit Clerk by 6 p.m., Wednesday of Fair week.

18. Release of Exhibits

All exhibits may be picked up before 1 p.m. the last day of fair j. 4-H and Open Class exhibits will be released by 1 p.m. on Sunday of Fair. All articles not claimed by 1 p.m. will be held under lock and key and the key held at the fair office for 7 days, then discarded.

19. Lost and Found

Each year, many articles are turned into the fair office. Please check there whenever you have something missing. After Fair, please feel free to contact the Secretary at 541-565-3510 to see about your lost items getting returned to you.

HOUSEHOLD ARTS & GENERAL INFORMATION

- 1. One (1) entry per class, and or lot.
- 2. Eligibility to Exhibit: Open to any resident of the United States. No 4-H projects can be shown in open class.
- 3. Entry Date: All entries must be made before 6:00 p.m., Wednesday the week of Fair. Baked goods and fresh flowers must be entered by Wednesday, but need not be in place until Thursday morning at 8:30 a.m. All other articles must be in the pavilion by Wednesday at 6:00 p.m. the week of the Fair. No late entries will be judged.
- 4. Errors in Entry: If an article is entered in a division or class to which it does not belong, it is the duty of the superintendent to investigate and to correct the situation; otherwise, the judge is instructed not to award a premium.
- 5. Unworthy Exhibit: No article deemed unworthy shall be awarded a premium and no premium shall be awarded just because there is no competition. If an article is not worthy of a first premium it may be awarded second, third or no premium at all. Rusty lids or rings, sticky or dirty jars for canned articles will be deemed unworthy.
- 6. Entries Limited to One Class: No article will be allowed to compete for more than one premium, nor shall it be entered in more than one class. Articles MUST have been completed in the past 12 months. Every article must be entered in the name of the bona fide maker or creator.
- 7. All canned fruits must be exhibited in canning jars and must have rings and lids. Jelly and jam entries must be in jelly or jam jars. All freezer foods must be exhibited in standard transparent containers with airtight lids.
- 8. We require labels on canned food exhibits listing the processing time and method use (i.e., either pressure canning or boiling water canning). This will enable judges to evaluate safety before tasting products.

Entry Fees:

1. NO ENTRY FEES FOR THIS DIVISION

Entries Accepted:

- 1. Entries will be accepted until 6:00 pm on Wednesday August 21, 2024
- 2. Entries for the Flower Division are made in the Open Class building, located under the main grandstands.
- 3. Entry form follows this section and can also be found on our website on the forms tab.
- 4. **Junior Class** just add the letter "J" behind the class number. You are a junior if you are in the grades of 9-12.
- 5. Floral entries must be made by 6:00 pm on Wednesday of Fair week. The actual flower exhibit must be in place by 8:30 am, Thursday of fair week.
- 6. NO LATE ENTRIES WILL BE JUDGED.

Release of Flower Exhibits:

Exhibits will be released on Saturday, August 24 <u>Between 4:00-6:00 p.m.</u> (no early dismissals) this time is subject to change and will be posted in the Open Class Pavilion and announced during the fair week.

Specific Rules:

- 1. All cut flowers must have been grown by the exhibitor.
- 2. All plants must have been grown in containers, and in possession for at least 60 days before opening of Fair.
- 3. The Fair Board will not be responsible for any plants or containers but will use great care for the preservation.
- 4. PLEASE pay special attention to the following:
- Choose the most perfect specimen in each classification.
- Have the right number of blooms required for the class
- Label with variety name, if possible
- . Containers for fresh flowers will be provided.
- Groom flowers and foliage, includes removing of bugs

Exhibits in this section will be judged as follows:

- 1. Perfection of form, bloom and texture
- 2. Depth and purity of color
- 3. Condition of Flower
- 4. Size, according to type
- 5. Foliage consideration being equal, preference will be given to new and liner varieties in each class.
- 6. Ribbon will not be given unless entry merits it
- 7. One entry per lot, per exhibitor
- 8. All fresh flowers must have foliage attached

Some Helpful Hints for Conditioning Your Flowers

Gather flowers when it is cool, usually early in the morning or late in the evening. Place stems immediately in warm water. Set container in

a cool place. Use a sharp knife and cut stems on slant. Crush woody stems (chrysanthemums, Roses, etc.) for at least 2 inches. Remove foliage for arrangements that will be below the water line. Dahlias can either be singed with a flame, or place the end of the stem in boiling water for no more than 30 seconds (protect the bloom with a collar of

paper). Then place in cool water. Annuals such as marigolds and asters require only immediate submersion in warm water. Gladiolus, snapdragons and larkspur stalks should be cut when approximately half of the lower blossoms are open.

DEFINITIONS:

Bloom --- An individual flower, one bloom to a stem, such as a pansy.

Specimen --- A single bloom stalk, such as zinnia

Spray --- A portion of a plant with a number of flowers on one stem, such as a petunia

Spike --- A stalk carrying many stem--less or nearly stem--less flowers, such as gladiola

Stalk --- Stiff stem, which may branch with one or more flowers, such as phlox

Double --- More than one row of petals

HISTORY TIDBITS: COUNTY FAIR TIMELINE

1909

The first real Sherman County Fair was held in October.

1910

This fair was held in downtown Moro with animals housed in the livery stable.

The County negotiated for grounds adjacent to the Experiment Station and bought it from Eastern Oregon Land Company.

1911

The new fairgrounds opened.

1912

The Children's Industrial Fair started.

1913

A big year at the fairgrounds:

- A site was leveled for a track.
- New cattle and swine barns were built.
- Events included trick riding, Wild West events, chariot races and novelty saddle horse races.

More changes:

- A new barn for racing teams & a combination judge's and band stand were built.
- The grandstand was enlarged to seat 800.
- A building was constructed for fancy work exhibits.
- New events included automobile and motorcycle races, and a race against time by a Ford car that made the amazing 44 miles per hour on the ½ mile track!

1915

A Ferris wheel and other amusements were set up in downtown Moro during the fair. Munter offered aeroplane flights out of the fairgrounds. [Herbert A. Munter, a pioneer Seattle aviator]

1917

There were enough horses in the county to have races of our own plus some free-for-all races.

1918

A short fair because of the war.

1919

The largest attendance so far, 800 paid admissions on Friday alone.

1923

September fairs started this year. A new event, a smoker, was organized with local fighters.

1925

All of the buildings were painted. A new chariot race event was started with newer, lighter chariots.

1931-1934

A 4-H Fair was all that was held because of the depression.

1935

Renewal came. The Civilian Conservation Corps, "the CCC boys," made improvements, repainted buildings, constructed bucking chutes, corrals and arenas, put new windows in the barns and re-wired the buildings. A successful 3-day fair with exciting chariot races and bucking horses.

1936

A successful racing program was developed. Events included a large carnival, bucking show and stock show.

1937

Mac Barbour's Rodeo came to the fair.

1938

Starting gates were built for the racetrack.

We crowned our first fair queen and court.

1942-1945

Only 4-H livestock and 4-H projects were exhibited. Many Sherman County kids took their livestock to the Pacific International Livestock Show and won!

1946

- The draft horse barn was modified for cattle.
- A sale and show ring, calf & steer chutes and washstand were built.
- All the buildings were painted.

1947-

1948

Mid-Columbia Riders Club competitions, a calf scramble, carnival and horse racing events.

1950

The arena was sprinkled for the horse show, races and rodeo. Big carnival.

1952

Sherman County had a large horse show with more classifications than the State Fair!

1953

A hot water tank was installed in the pavilion so 4-H club members could cook.

1957-

1960

- Amateur rodeo started.
- · Horse racing was in big demand.
- Lighting was installed around the arena.

1961

The fair queen and her court put Sherman County on the map by participating in rodeo and fair parades.

1964

A new pavilion was built for 4-H exhibits.

1967-

1969

A new covered show arena was built.

1974

The first grand marshal, Giles French, was chosen as Mr. Sherman County.

Twin Douma and the Bothwell twins: a Twin Contest.

1989

All previous grand marshals were honored – Sherman County Centennial Year.


