We are in Advent, a season of waiting and preparing for the arrival of the Christ Child. When I think about preparation, I remember the days we would be waiting for guests. We would join Mom in the exercise of preparing for their arrival. We would weed the flower gardens, clean the house, and wash bedding for the guests. Preparation was a very intentional exercise.

The prophet Isaiah was sent to bring a message of preparation to God's people. In Isaiah 40:3-5 he says, "A voice of one calling: In the wilderness prepare the way for the LORD; make straight in the desert a highway for our God. Every valley shall be raised up, every mountain and hill made low; the rough ground shall become level, the rugged places a plain. And the glory of the LORD will be revealed, and all people will see it together. For the mouth of the LORD has spoken." Yes, the people were discouraged, they had almost lost all hope. It was then that God reminded them to not give up. God was still in control of history and thus they should not succumb to resignation. They are to actively get ready to receive God's deliverance.

This message of preparation was again echoed by John the Baptist. He called people to prepare and wait for the coming messiah. This was during a period when Israel yearned for the promised Savior. A lot had been going on and people had almost lost hope. But God had promised them that he would send a savior. And he made his promise good on that first advent. Many centuries later we too find ourselves waiting with hope and expectation. There is brokenness in the world that threatens to discourage us and dim out our hope. Advent is a time to look forward to the coming of Christ in our midst. To embrace the one who brings joy, hope, and salvation.

The waiting of Advent is not passive; it is active preparation. Just as Mary and Joseph prepared to welcome Jesus into their lives, we are called to prepare our hearts. This preparation happens in two ways:

- 1. Preparation as prayer and studying God's word. We intentionally slowdown from the holiday crazy and listen to the voice of God as he encourages us to keep on holding to faith, to not give up in our walk with him.
- 2. Preparation as work. We prepare for Christ's coming by using our hands and feet to serve others. In the same way we joined our mom to prepare for and serve our guests, we prepare for Christ by serving people. Jesus showed us how to live our lives for more than just ourselves. To be kind to others, especially the ones in need. Active preparation by Christians tells the world that there is an alternate kingdom than the kingdoms of this world, where God reigns with justice and righteousness. That there is light in the darkness.

This Advent season, may we actively prepare for Christ's coming. May we be filled with the hope and joy that come from knowing that Christ is nearby. Let this be a time of spiritual renewal, where we open ourselves to the wonder of God's presence among us. And as we approach Christmas, may we be ready to receive the Christ Child with hearts full of gratitude and to share that joy with others, knowing that in Him, we are given the gift of life, love, and eternal hope. Amen
