Greetings in the Name of the Christ Who Cares!

The Apostle Paul, in his letter long ago to the early church in Galatia, wrote... "So then, while we have opportunity, let us do good to all people, and especially to those who are of the household of the faith. Let us not lose heart in doing good, for in due time we will reap at harvest time, if we do not grow weary." (Galatians 6:9-10)

Echoing the Apostle Paul, our founder, John Wesley, wrote to the people called Methodists, then and now, "Do all the good you can, by all the means you can, in all the ways you can, in all the places you can, at all the times you can, to all the people you can, as long as ever you can."

In our effort to 'do good to all people' or as our Mission Statement affirms, to 'share the Word of God with all people, through spiritual growth, worship, fellowship, and service', we do so with great joy. This church displays a caring-heart attitude in so much of what we do through the many caring ministries needs of the church. Last year, the SPPRC Committee determined that we could best meet those needs with a full-time Youth Director to care for our youth. Stephen Ministry was re-established to help develop one-on-one lay caring ministry, and both our Youth Director and our Stephen Ministers have provided hundreds of hours of care for our church and community. Additionally, our Prayer Shawl Ministry continues to be a blessing of care for those who undergo difficult times. These special shawls are hand knitted by our Loving Hands, Loving Hearts Team, and are an outward and visible sign of an inward spirit of care.

I continue, of course, to joyfully work in pastoral care ministry, but as a few of my colleagues might say, "It's been like drinking from a fire hose." In a church of our size, when it comes to congregational and community care, 'the harvest is plentiful, but the workers are few.'

That's why I'm pleased to announce to you that a new worker in the harvest, Troy Miller, has been hired as the new Director of Congregational and Community Care for Hays 1st UMC. He was introduced during worship on September 16th and began his first 'office day' on September 17th. Troy will work with me, the Stephen Ministers, the Nursing Homes, and many of you in the areas of care ministry for the church and community. Troy will also help with funerals and weddings and provide care through home visitation.

By the way, you can get personally involved in the care ministry of home visitation in this church by becoming a part of our 'Home Visitor Team'. Troy and I are working with our Church and Society Committee to form a team of trained and supervised 'Home Visitors' to visit and care for our homebound and hospitalized members. So, if you'd like to make a difference in the life of someone who is lonely and would enjoy bringing a little joy into their life, I'd encourage you to be a part of the "Home Visitor Team". Additional information on how you can be a part of this important ministry will be coming soon!

Troy's picture is on both our Facebook page and our web site. However, I would encourage you to call and schedule a time to visit with Troy. He grew up in Hays, was in pastoral ministry for 17 years before becoming an assistant Funeral Director in Plainville for the last 5 years, and now is looking forward to being a part of our church-family. He is warm, personable, and caring and would love to get to know as many folks as soon as possible.

Start your morning off with this refreshing smoothie. Almond milk is lower in carbs than regular milk and is great for people with milk or lactose intolerance.


Prep time 5 min. Servings 2 Serving size 1 cup

The Fourth and Fifth Graders have decorated their room and started a "Bible Cookies" curriculum.

You are also very welcome to walk OUT the fire doors to help with flow. These doors are only locked so no one can get into our secured area, anyone can get out.

On Wednesdays for WOW, we have a check in kiosk in the Fellowship Hall/D nine at by the big TV until 6:10 pm. For anyone coming after this time, please use the kiosk on the 2nd 1 oor 1 tock in your kids to Kids Club. Parents can check out their children using the 2nd floor kiosk and wait in the adway. We end KC with a giant circle prayer in the 2/3 Grade Classroom so all children will be released from this stace when we're finished around 7:15.

Dear friends,

I can hardly believe it's already August, and 2018 is well over halfway finished! I pray all is well for each and every one of you, and that summer has been full of blessings and adventures.

The past three months have been eventful! In May, I was blessed with the opportunity to return to eSwatini and visit my friends and former ministry. It was a short trip (roughly 10 days, plus travel), but a much needed respite from the chaos of Bangkok. I spent quality time debriefing my time so far in Thailand with friends and my mentor, and reconnected with many familiar faces. As much as I love my current position with NightLight in Bangkok, eSwatini is still home to me.

A few short weeks after I returned to Bangkok from Africa, Africa came to me! In June, my dear friend and former director, Mary-Kate, and her brother Garrett spent a week in Bangkok for a conference, and I was so blessed to spend time with them and show them around my current city. Also in June, our outreach team prayerfully decided to resume focus on one particular brothel in our area, which we had started to lose touch with earlier this year. We've started returning regularly to that particular hotel, and refreshed relationships with the management and women working there.

July proved to be a particularly challenging month, which has bled over into August. At the beginning of July, I began my online graduate program through Liberty University. It has been an incredible experience so far, but very stretching in many ways, especially with the workload (on top of everything I already do with NightLight). July also saw many heavy cases and situations in the outreach center, including some severe mental breakdowns, abandoned babies, and housing shortage for our trafficked clients, which weighed on us all working there. We need your continued support through prayer as we persevere in this season.



One of Jesus' great teaching parables involves a sower who cast seed along the ground. The sower hoped the seeds would sprout, grow, and bear good fruit. Some seeds did just that, producing a great harvest. But others, Jesus said, fell among thorns and, though they began to grow, these good plants were quickly choked out. Jesus said the thorns were "the cares of the world and the lure of wealth" (Matthew 13:22).

In a culture where having "enough" seems to have become a never-ending pursuit, Jesus' parable remains incredibly relevant. Many of us are chasing the American dream in ways that lead to stress, anxiety, and fear—thorns that can rob us of the ability to enjoy the abundant lives of purpose that God intended for us.

All of us have struggled with these issues at one time or another. They are important issues that we cannot ignore. This is why, over 4 weeks in October, we will be having a church wide study and worship emphasis called Enough: Discovering Joy Through Simplicity and Generosity. During this time we will explore what the Bible teaches us about financial management through worship and small group study. We'll hear expert advice and stories about what others have learned by working through financial challenges. Each week we will provide you with some practical tools you can use to assess your financial situation and develop a financial plan with a biblical foundation.

At the conclusion of the emphasis, we will have the opportunity to make personal commitments of our offerings to God through our church in the coming year. We will consecrate these commitments in the worship service on two consecutive Sundays. (See the schedule that follows.)

I hope you will join us in the coming weeks as we look at how we can manage our financial resources and truly experience simplicity, generosity, and joy.
