Greetings in the Name of Christ!

Christmas is coming! The season of Advent is upon us and begins on Sunday, December 2nd this year and culminates on Sunday, December 23rd. The season of Advent is a season of four weeks that we prepare our hearts, minds, and souls on the coming Christ child. The word 'advent' comes from the Latin word 'Adventus', which means "coming". The Advent season proclaims the coming of Christ- whose birth we prepare to celebrate once again, who comes continually in Word and Spirit, and whose return in final victory we anticipate as Christians. Each year during the season of Advent, the church focuses on a particular part of or person related to the Christmas story, the story of Jesus birth. Inasmuch, this year we will focus on Jesus' earthly father, Joseph.

There is little written about Jesus' earthly father, Joseph, and he speaks no words in the scriptural text related to him, but his actions speak louder than words, and so we can take what we do know of him and relate it to a better understanding of the man that God chose to be God's only Son's earthly father, Faithful Joseph.

Below are the themes for each week of Advent regarding Faithful Joseph:

- * Week 1; Sunday, December 2nd- "A Carpenter Named Joseph"
- * Week 2; Sunday, December 9th- "Whose Child is This?"
- * Week 3; Sunday, December 16th- "Raising a Child Not Your Own"
- * Week 4; Sunday, December 23rd- "The Journey to Bethlehem"

This year, I invite you to be a part of one of the study groups that will meet weekly during this special season of Advent, as we prepare for Christmas...especially if you or a family member has experienced adoption in your family tree. This study is especially meaningful to me because Theresa and I, in addition to our three other children, have two adopted children. Additionally, within my immediate family, I have an older brother and sister-in-law that adopted two children, and one of Theresa's sisters adopted a child. In our church family, we have those who were adopted and those who adopted children as their own. There are also many families that due to death or divorce or other family issues, are raising children who are 'not their own'.

Our stories of adoption are affirmed and offered as holy blessings, just as Joseph adopted Jesus as a holy blessing long ago. Still, there is more to Joseph than that. Not only did he adopt Jesus, but he loved Jesus' mother, Mary, so much that instead of 'quietly divorcing her', he strongly stood beside her, enduring the whispers and rebukes of a community of people, many who would have taken his betrothed, Mary, to the city gates and stoned her to death. The kind of love, kindness, compassion, and courage that Joseph displayed is what Christmas is truly about.

Classic Pecan Pie

Ingredients:

Crust: 1 cup all-purpose flour 2 Tbsp. sugar 1/2 tsp. baking powder 1/4 tsp. salt 1/4 cup fat-free milk 1 Tbsp. butter or stick margarine, melted Cooking spray

Filling:

large egg
large egg whites
cup light or dark-colored corn syrup
2/3 cup packed dark brown sugar
1/4 tsp. salt
cup pecan halves
tsp. vanilla extract

Preheat oven to 350 degrees

To prepare crust: Combine flour, sugar, baking powder, and 1/4 tsp. salt in a bowl. Add milk and butter, toss with a fork until moist.

Press mixture gently into a 4 inch circle on heavy-duty plastic wrap; cover with additional plastic wrap. Roll dough, still covered to an 11 inch circle. Freeze 10 minutes or until plastic wrap can be easily removed. Fit dough into a 9 inch pie plate coated with cooking spray. Remove top sheet of plastic wrap. Fold edges under and flute. To prepare filling: Beat the egg and next 4 ingredients at medium speed of a mixer until well blended. Stir in the pecan halves and the vanilla. Pour the mixture into the prepared crust.

Bake at 350 for 20 minutes, then cover with foil. Bake an additional 20 minutes or until a knife inserted 1 inch from the edge comes out clean. Do not overbake, Cool on a wire rack.

Dear friends & family,

I pray this letter finds you well as the end of 2018 quickly approaches. Thank you so much for all your support for God's work in Thailand for the past year. I moved to Bangkok 15 months ago now, and it has been an incredible season of challenges, growth, and victories working with NightLight International and women in the Thai sex industry.

Your prayerful support on this journey has been greatly appreciated.

NightLight has been working with women in Thailand for 13 years now, specifically in the Nana red light district. We offer employment opportunities for women who choose to leave the sex industry, including jewelry production, t-shirt screen-printing, and coffee barista positions. My role at NightLight is in the outreach center located in the heart of the red light district. At the outreach center, our aim is to build and maintain relationships with the women currently working in prostitution so they know where they can turn if they choose to leave their current situation. Our outreach center staff comprises of both Thais and foreigners, and we facilitate various activities such as English classes and salon services while creating a safe, nonjudgmental environment for the women to come and relax or seek help.

This position is challenging, and we face many difficult cases and situations every day. Another component to our ministry is going to the bars, clubs, streets, and brothels on a regular basis to meet women, build relationships, and invite them to the center. We do not approach the girls in an accusatory way, condemning them and telling them to leave their current occupation. Rather, we approach them with the love of Christ, meeting them where they are at, and build relationships based on trust and security.

My original commitment with NightLight was for 18 months, until February of 2019. However, I have decided to extend my time to a full two years, until August 2019. I came to Thailand to learn about outreach and intervention strategies in order to be equipped with skills and knowledge to take back to Africa in the future. I have learned so much so far, and I am confident there is more on the horizon. I am learning about anti-trafficking efforts through conferences and other organizations.

My position at Night Light is fully support-raised. In order to extend my time in Thailand, I will need \$575 of monthly support, plus funds for plane tickets and a visit home. I would appreciate your continued prayers and financial support.
