The Walk by Adam Hamilton

There are three habits or practices that actually play a key part in helping us to experience "the good life." The first was articulated by Stoic philosophers in the Greco-Roman world. These philosophers believed that the really good life was found, not in a life of acquisition of those things you don't yet have, but instead in learning to want what you already have.

How do we cultivate a desire for what we already have? The answer is surprisingly simple. Wanting what you already have comes from giving thanks for what you already possess. As you give thanks for what you have, you find contentment and freedom; you possess your possessions rather your possessions possessing you.

The second key to experiencing the good life is to live purposefully. The writer of Ecclesiastes found that a life of pleasure was meaningless. So, to find the good life, it stands to reason that we might look for what is meaningful. What adds meaning to our lives? What gives us fulfillment and a sense of purpose every day?

For Christians, a significant part of the answer is following Jesus. It was he who said, "I am the way, the truth, and the life." Following Jesus involves seeking to do his will. His will includes caring for others and trying to heal the brokenness in our world. We find meaning not in acquiring things, but in loving God with all our heart, soul, mind and strength, and loving our neighbor as ourselves.

The last of the keys to finding meaning, happiness, and fulfillment-one of the keys to walking with God-is generosity toward God and others. We were made for generosity. It is meant to be both the shape of our heart and the way that we live. By putting love into action and in doing this ,we experience the truth of Jesus' words, "It is more blessed to give than to receive"
