A few weeks ago, Rev Dr. Dustin Petz from the Kansas Methodist Foundation gave a presentation on Giving Generously and Leaving a Legacy at Hays First United Methodist Church. This month's Endowment Moment will provide highlights from his presentation.

Theology of money:

- · God is the provider and the owner. God has entrusted us with resources we have in our lives.
- · We are the receivers and the stewards of these resources. We are responsible for how we use the resources we are entrusted.
- · We are called to take positive action, using the resources in our lives to make a difference. We are blessed to be a blessing.

Three key questions to leave a legacy:

- · What really matters to you?
- · How do you want to be remembered?
- · What is the legacy you hope to leave behind?

He also highlighted some giving strategies that help gifts make a larger impact:

- · Gifts of appreciated stock.
- · Gifts of other property.
- · Qualified Charitable Distributions from traditional individual retirement accounts (IRA) for those over age 70 ½.

History & Heritage

The Organ

The Hadley family gave the \$25,000 Wick's pipe organ to the church, which was installed ten days prior to the dedication of the church in September 1949. In the late 1800's three Swiss brothers created their first organ in Highland, Illinois. Using only quality materials, the organs were built to a standard, not a price. They were entirely custom built to order, not mass produced. With precision and patience, the Wick's craftsmen were able to produce a beautiful organ with a proven history of performance.

Apart from routine tunings, the organ did not need repair until 1992, when lighting damaged the tower and roof of the sanctuary, which caused water to leak into the pipe chamber. Possibly because of the water damage, some of the pipes did not sound and the swell shutters, which control the volume, did not operate correctly. Jane Brown, church organist since 1982, urged the congregation to repair or replace the organ. Brown worked diligently for two and a half years, but died of cancer in August, 1994. Though she never had an opportunity to play the new organ, her wish made the organ a reality. Her memorials were directed to help defray the cost of \$166,000 for additions and replacements. Barbara Michaelis led the Organ Task Force of 20 members to complete the dream of a refurbished organ.

New pipes and a new console had to be hand crafted at the Wicks Organ Company in Highland, Illinois. For the pipes, sheets of zinc and zinc alloy were hand cast and honed to a uniform thickness. These metal sheets were then spun around mandrels, large cylindrical, steel forms that helped workers shape the sheets into the pipes. After shaping the metal into pipes, the seams were hand soldered. Workers at the factory also hand-crafted wooden wind cases that held the racks of pipes. The largest pipe was 18 feet tall and weighed between 80 & 90 pounds. Volunteers from FHSU helped to lift the mammoth pipes into place. Installation of the new organ took two weeks, including the installation of a new console, which had the keyboard and other controls for the organ. Representatives from the company spent two weeks tuning the organ and adapting its sound to the unique acoustics of the church.

Those who attended church services on May 21, 1995 had the first opportunity to hear the organ. The consecration of the renovated organ was held on Sunday, June 4th, during church services. Dr. Bob Edwards was guest organist. In September, 1998, a rededication service was held to celebrate the organ debt being retired. John Leavitt, composer and conductor, was invited to play at the rededication service. Charmaine Paulin & Jo Kraus were organists at the

Currently we are looking for a company to clean and provide maintenance for the organ. It is hoped that an estimate will be available by the end of the year.

3 Steps to Turn Grumbles into Gratitude by Tricia Goyer

Did you know you can find deep contentment without spending a dollar or changing one thing about your day, your family or your life? In addition to this inner peace, you'll have more joy, more gratitude and be a better example for your family and friends. How? By stopping your grumbling. It's easier to do than you think. Here are three ways to start:

1. Take control of your unrealistic expectations.

We grumble because we expect things to go one way and are thrown off when things don't go as planned. Think about the next few hours. What do you hope will happen? What would be easy and comfortable to you? Now consider your response when something doesn't go as planned. It doesn't matter *what* happens, just think about how you'll respond.

In my effort to stop grumbling, I thought about my unrealistic expectations that I could clean the house and it would stay clean (We have eleven people living in our home after all!) I also considered how unrealistic it was that I could go through a day with my family and it would be conflict-free. There's a lot of interacting happening with eleven people in the house...much of it brings strife.

Instead I thought how I would respond when the house gets messy or the kids start to fight. Rather than being overwhelmed and grumbling, I considered how to help my family get back on track. Some days this meant pausing to do a 10-minute clean up, with all the kids helping. Other days, it meant pausing to help my children communicate with each other better, "How about we try that conversation again, this time with kind words?" When we *plan* for our reactions we *handle* situations better. We look beyond the problems and find solutions. We treat our family, friends, and co-workers with respect, instead of just grumbling about what went wrong.

2. Change your grumbling habit into gratitude.

We can control our reactions, but to truly get to deep contentment, we must replace our grumbling with gratitude. When you feel like grumbling about something, instead take a deep breath and make a mental adjustment. Ask yourself, "I want to grumble about this, but how can I offer gratitude to God instead?" When a car cuts you off on the freeway: "Thank you God for keeping me safe. Thank you for keeping me alert so I could avoid that accident." When you're feeling overscheduled, overwhelmed and unappreciated: "Thank you God that you have given me a sound mind to make healthy changes in my life and the strength to be strong in the things I can't change."

3. Hard-wire praise.

In my striving to stop grumbling (and to guide my family to do the same), my grandmother has been my greatest example. Grandma has dementia, each day she awoke with no memory of her injury. Instead of complaining, she'd thank me for taking care of her. She'd also thank God for how good He was to her. Throughout the day, I'd hear Grandma singing praises to God as she lay immobile on her bed. The lesson is one I won't forget: when Grandma couldn't even remember that her back was broken, she still remembered how to praise.

Stopping grumbling is easier than you think. And contentment can come. The changes you make will impact you for a lifetime. Instead of investing your energy into negative emotions, you can turn your grumbles around to thank God for His goodness. Your family and friends will thank you for it, and you can be an example to prove that they can do the same. Isn't that something to be thankful for?
